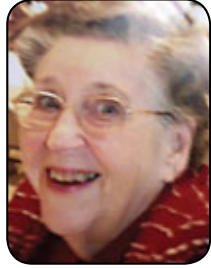
# High still missing

The search continues for South Belt resident Lillian High, who went missing Sunday, Oct. 2.

High, 82, was last seen around 7:30 p.m. at her home in the 200 block of Outlook in the Arlington Heights subdivision near Edgebrook and Shaver. She was reported missing the morning of Monday, Oct. 3, after she failed to show up for work at the Chase Bank at Beltway 8 and the Gulf Freeway, where she works as a part-time teller.

Chase Bank has reportedly launched its own independent investigation into High's disappearance.

The Laura Recovery Center, which has set up

a command post in the AMC movie theater parking lot on Beltway 8 near the Gulf Freeway, and Texas EquuSearch have also helped search for the woman.

According to the Houston Police Department, vast resources have been utilized to try to find High, including using helicopters to canvas the area and dive teams to search local bodies of water.

HPD's Homicide Division has also now joined the search for the woman.

High is described as 5 feet 2 inches tall and 103 pounds. She has gray hair and hazel eyes. She may be wearing a blue, collared Chase Bank shirt, black slacks and black shoes.

She was believed to be driving a black four-door Dodge Avenger with Texas license plate CD6 J492. The car is a rental, as High's own car was in the shop for repairs.

# County collects hazardous waste

Harris County will hold a household hazardous waste (HHW) collection event Saturday, Oct. 15, at El Franco Lee Park, 9400 Hall Road, from 8 to 11 a.m.

The event will feature the county's HazMobile, a 36-foot-long gooseneck trailer specially designed to haul HHW items to a facility for proper disposal. Custom flooring has been installed to make sure that hazardous materials are safely contained during transport.

The HazMobile collection system can accommodate HHW from approximately 100 households. Waste will be collected on a first-come, first-served basis until the unit reaches full capacity.

Containers must be 5 gallons or less. Containers should be sealed and in their original packaging. Leaking containers should be placed in a larger nonleaking container. Containers should be placed upright in a box or plastic bin and packed with newspapers around them to prevent breakage. Materials should be placed in the trunk

of vehicles to prevent fumes from being breathed during transport.

Items accepted include household quantities of paint products, pesticides, fertilizers, motor oil, gasoline, pool chemicals, household cleaners, antifreeze, glues and solvents, thermometers, aerosols, and batteries.

Items not accepted include business waste, electronics, tires, medical waste, radioactive waste, ammunition, explosives, compressed gas cylinders, washers, dryers, refrigerators, freezers, PCBs or dioxins, air conditioners, photocopy machines, microwaves, smoke detectors or household trash.

The event is free to all residents of Harris County.

The HazMobile is financed through grants from the State of Texas through the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the Houston-Galveston Area Council.

# Much-needed rain hits South Belt

The South Belt area received some much-needed rain Sunday, Oct. 9.

According to the Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management, the rain gauge located at Beamer and Hughes Road registered 4.4 inches of rainfall over a 24-hour period – or roughly half as much as recorded altogether the previous eight months.

The rain gauge located at Clear Creek and Country Club Drive in the Green Tee subdivision recorded 5.2 inches of rainfall on Sunday.

Despite the downpour, rainfall deficits remain between 25 and 30 inches drier than the 30-year climatological normals, and the year is still the driest on record for the city of Houston, according to the National Weather Service.

Worsening matters, it is also Houston's warmest year to date, with more than 50 100-degree days this year – 40 percent more than any previous year.

While flooding was not rampant in the community, several streets were still under water.

# Annual airshow soars Oct. 15-16

The 27th annual Wings Over Houston airshow is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 15, and Sunday, Oct. 16, at Ellington Airport.

This year's event will feature the Canadian Forces Snowbirds, who will captivate audiences with an aerial ballet of high-speed jet flight featuring dozens of formation passes.

Other highlights include the *Tora! Tora! Tora!* re-enactment of the World War II attack on Pearl Harbor, the AD-4 Skyraider, O-2 Forward Air Command "Oscar Ducee," AC-47 Spooky Gunship and the Boeing B-29 Superfortress "FIFI," the Red Bull Motorsport Team and Air Force Parachute Team, the Horsemen pilots and 2010 Lonestar Aerobatic Unlimited Champion Jason Newburg.

Military demonstrations include the Air Force Heritage Flight, U.S. Coast Guard MH65C Dolphin Helicopter, U.S. Navy F/A-18C Hornet from the West Coast Demo Team, the C-130H Tactical Special Forces Jump and AH-64 Apache Attack Helicopter Demo.

The event will also feature the Legends & Heroes Autograph Tent, the 6th Cavalry Historical Association, the Military Museum of Texas, interactive displays from NASA, a children's carnival area, a mechanical bull and Aircraft M-4 simulator rides.

The recent air crash in Reno, Nev., that killed Wings Over Houston volunteer Craig Salerno is weighing heavily on organizers' minds. Salerno, a Friendswood resident, was active in the *Tora! Tora!* group.

The Wings Over Houston event, however, is a noncompetitive display, unlike the air races in Reno.

Working in close cooperation with the Federal Aviation Administration, the air show industry abides by a strict set of rules and guidelines specifically designed to ensure the safety of air show spectators. Performing aircraft are not permitted to direct the energy of their aircraft toward the crowds while performing aerobatics and must maintain minimum separation distances (500 feet, 1,000 feet or 1,500 feet, depending on the aircraft) from spectators.

Every aerobatic performer at a North American air show is evaluated at least once per year to ensure he or she is competent to fly air show aerobatics. Air shows are conducted entirely within an aerobatic box, an imaginary cube that must be removed of all people on the ground and in the air while the pilot performs.

Smoking and barbecues are also still banned in both city and Harris County parks. Violators are subject to fines ranging from \$200 to \$2,000.

The smoking and barbecue bans will remain in place until further notice.

Eagle Squadron Hospitality tickets are \$125 and include reserved seating, catered food and beverages throughout the day, reserved parking and a souvenir cap, program and poster. Tickets can be purchased by calling 888-4-FLYSHOW or by visiting [www.wingsoverhouston.com](http://www.wingsoverhouston.com).

Parking at Ellington Airport is extremely limited so riding bus transportation is recommended. Bus shuttles will run from Bay Area Park and Ride (801 Bay Area Blvd), Fuqua Park and Ride (11755 Sabo Road) and South Point Park and Ride (12410 Kurland). Shuttles run from 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m., with the last shuttle inbound to Ellington Airport departing at 2:30 p.m. The shuttle service is free this year with proof of ticket purchase.

Importantly, there are questions as to whether the proposed revisions are constitutionally sound as the regulated community may often not know if they are violating the law or not. Lawyers would have a field day fighting these cases. However, an objective and concise criteria in the law would help residents, musicians, and police officers alike. Organizers and musicians would have a clear understanding of compliance with the law and residents could demand accountability.

## Angry over revision of noise ordinance

URGENT: City Council Considering Revision to Noise Ordinance, Further Muddying Ambiguous Standards

City of Houston residents, police officers, musicians and promoters have all been plagued by ambiguous language in the city Noise Ordinance. For many years the language in the city statute has lacked clear, objective criteria for what constitutes a noise violation. Consequently, businesses who host live music and their neighbors have been locked in a seemingly endless tug of war with Houston Police Officers stuck in the middle.

City Council is now considering revisions to the existing statute which will further confound all parties involved by asking officers to make arbitrary judgments with their own ears as opposed to equipment rooted in science. The proposed revisions would allow officers to write tickets for alleged violations without a Decibel or LEF (low frequency effect) meter reading. This would be comparable to forcing officers to write speeding tick-

Houston's musical heritage and future are at stake with this. Let's all urge City Council to create objective, VERIFIABLE, and enforceable laws which benefit residents, musicians, and police officers. Let's open a comprehensive dialogue with ALL parties involved and find effective, scientific solutions.

## Shaver solution soon to see light

Residents traveling down South Shaver Street may already be aware of a problem with the pavement that has been causing trouble for several years. A plan to remedy the rough roadway is currently being reviewed by the Texas Department of Transportation and could be implemented by spring 2012.

"I have been hearing about the project since around 1999," Muecke said. "I have been really following the project though for four years now, and we are starting to get some progress."

# SJC offers veterans free training grant

Veterans interested in training in fields with increasing job opportunities may qualify for the San Jacinto College Veterans Workforce Development Project grant to cover up to \$2,100 for college tuition. Provided through the U.S. Department of Labor, the grant includes scholarships for up to 50 veterans per semester and can be applied toward credit or certificate programs or noncredit programs in areas with increasing employment rates, such as basic welding, non-destructive testing, payroll specialist, emergency medical technician basic certification, environmental safety specialist, truck driving, computer specialist, or other programs chosen on the basis of regional labor market demands. "The objective is for graduates to gain meaningful employment immediately at the conclusion of their training or education," said Dr. Sarah Janes, vice president of Continuing and Professional Development (CPD), adding that any unused funds from the grant will be made available to low-income and displaced workers. The application deadline for the first round of awards will be Veterans Day, Nov. 11, with selectees being notified promptly thereafter. It is anticipated that awardees will commence training in early to mid-January. "This is just one more step in our efforts here at San Jacinto College to reach out and connect with the large veteran community we serve," said Alison Hennessey, CPD dean of community education. "Ultimately, we want to be the college of choice for all veterans regardless of whether they served 10 years ago or 10 days ago." An advisory committee is currently being formed by the college to seek the leverage and talents of groups like the Texas Veterans Commission and Workforce Solution officials. **35 years ago (1976)**  
Home burglaries in Sagemeadow had the Sagemeadow Maintenance Committee seriously considering hiring a security patrol for that area. **20 years ago (1991)**  
A 32-year-old woman left her home in the 10400 block of Sagestar for an early morning workout and was shot by her husband, who thought she was a car thief. She was in stable condition after being life-flighted to Hermann Hospital for a gunshot wound to the head. J. Frank Dobie High School students Laura Kertz, Massoud Javadi, Scott Seago, Pamela Thacker, Vin Vuong, Adam Watts and Melanie Boatman were all named National Merit Semifinalists. More than 1,600 students who were members of the C.H.I.C.K.E.N. Club were issued T-shirts and were encouraged to wear them every Wednesday to send an anti-drug message. The Cool, Honest, Intelligent, Clear-headed, Keen, Energetic and Not Interested In Drugs Club was open to fourth- and fifth-graders at eight PISD schools. **15 years ago (1996)**  
Daniel Ray Middleton, 18, his sister Ladonna Middleton, 14, and his 6-month-old son Justin Ray were all killed when the teen's car plowed into the back of a street sweeper on the beltway. San Jacinto College Board of Regents voted to maintain the district's property tax rate at 11 cents per \$100 valuation. **10 years ago (2001)**  
Former South Belt resident Huey Meaux, 72, was denied parole for the fourth time by the Texas Board of

Pardons and Paroles. The J. Frank Dobie homecoming court was announced. Candidates were Lauren DuChemin, Tiffany Collins and Sara Cestero for queen, and Brian McKinstry, Matthew Bergeron and Lynwood Simpson for king. Construction began on a new five-lane bridge over the Gulf Freeway at Dixie Farm Road. The project was expected to be completed near the end of the year 2002. **5 years ago (2006)**  
The early stages of work on additions to Dobie High School were under way, PISD officials said. The expansion would give an additional 500-student capacity to the 4-year-old facility. A 15-year-old Dobie freshman was arrested in connection with an incident of indecent exposure which occurred at Frazier Elementary. PISD received a Superior Achievement rating under Texas' Schools FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) for the fourth consecutive year. The move came roughly one week after Congress passed the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act of 2010 (S. 3729) and was welcomed by employees of the Johnson Space Center, as it would provide funding for an additional shuttle flight and the accelerated development of a new heavy-lift rocket for deep-space exploration. Obama's initial budget proposal had called for the phasing out of manned space flight, threatening as many as 7,000 local jobs. The Dobie High School homecoming king and queen were named at the game against Pasadena High. Noe Rodriguez was crowned king, while Demmi Garcia was crowned queen. The Longhorns defeated the Eagles. The FBI Bank Robbery Task Force was asking for the public's assistance in identifying a suspect who robbed the Wells Fargo Bank located at 10225 Almeda Genoa. According to FBI officials, the man entered the bank and presented a note to a teller which announced he was robbing the bank, he had a gun and would hurt her. He was last seen walking away from the bank. No one was physically hurt during the robbery.

With the start of the fall 2011 semester under way, San Jacinto College welcomes five new deans to the Central and South campuses.

At the South campus, Dr. Kerry Mix takes on the role of dean of enrollment services, and Dr. Barbara Ake will serve as dean of allied health and sciences. At Central, Veronica Jammer steps into the position of dean of health sciences, Dr. Deborah Myles serves as dean of student development, and Jeffrey Parks is dean of industrial and applied technology.

**South campus**  
As dean of enrollment services for the South campus, Mix will supervise and lead the campus enrollment services office, testing center, financial aid, Center of Excellence for Veteran Student Success, and information desk. He came to the college in 2010 as an administrative intern. Prior to that time, his most recent experiences included serving as a research assistant for the Center for Community College Student Engagement and as a membership liaison for the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development.

Mix said goals for his newest position include maintaining alignment of the division's operations to the college's four strategic goals — student success, P-16 pipeline, workforce and economic development, and people. Also, as the campus undergoes construction for its new welcome center, Mix said he'll continue to increase awareness of the new centralized environment for student services.

A graduate of a community college, Mix earned his Associate of Applied Science from Coastal Bend College. He received his Bachelor of Applied Arts and Science and Master of Education from the University of Houston-Victoria. He attained his Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Texas at Austin's Community College Leadership Program.

"Overall, the division strives to provide a quality student experience," said Mix. "It would be a great success if we were able to articulate the division's story in the context of the college's goals."

Ake begins her first semester with San Jacinto College, after spending three years as chief academic officer with Aultman College of Nursing and Health Sciences. Her prior experience includes 16 years of teaching in higher education and 30 years working in the health care field. She has traveled the world as a health care professional. Some of her accomplishments include practicing as a nurse in Paris; researching women's health and nursing care delivery in Sydney; and researching women's health in the Canary Islands of Spain.

"I've always been in health care; that's my first education," said Ake. "My mother was a nurse and worked at the hospital across the street from where we lived. I remember always being around doctors, nurses and laboratory technologists. Science makes me tick, and that's what health care is all about."

Ake became a registered nurse in 1982 from Wascana Institute of Applied Arts and Technology and earned her Bachelor of Science in nursing from the University of Saskatchewan. She earned her Master of Science in administration from Central Michigan University and her doctorate in health care education from Nova Southeastern University.

Ake said her goals as dean of allied health and sciences at the South campus will include faculty leadership development, team member collaboration within the divisions, new grant possibility investigation, faculty professional development, assistance with new hires in biology, chemistry and vocational nursing, and annual priority development for staff and faculty within the division.

"When I looked at the population of this college, there are students from all over the world with various backgrounds," said Ake. "With this diversity, brings tremendous benefits for the students because the best way to care for people is for those people to identify with you."

**Central campus**  
Jammer steps into her new position as dean of health sciences at the Central campus after approximately 20 years holding various positions at San Jacinto College. She assumes the duties of the dean position once held by the late Barbara Taplin, who died earlier this year.

Jammer's experience as a registered nurse includes serving as a school nurse for an elementary school, a family nurse practitioner for Baylor College of Medicine's Teen Clinic, and a home health nurse.

"I'm excited to have been entrusted with this responsibility," said Jammer. "The previous leadership makes this a very tough act to follow. Barbara (Taplin) was always a forward thinking person. Myles earned her Bachelor of Science in education and Master of Arts in counseling from Prairie View A&M University. She received her doctorate in counselor education from Texas Southern University. She said her plans include continuing to ensure a welcoming and inviting atmosphere for San Jacinto College students and encouraging them to utilize all of the resources available, especially in student development.

"I want every student to know the value of a college education," said Myles. "When I see students graduate with their degree or certificate, it shows that they're disciplined, dedicated and determined. As a student strives for an education, along the journey he or she is going to learn so many valuable lifelong learning skills. Stepping into the position of dean of industrial and applied technology, Parks will oversee occupational and technical programs at the Central campus.

With more than 20 years of experience in higher education, Parks' previous experience

serving as an administrator at Tyler Junior College and administrator and faculty member at Tarrant County College, Mesalands Community College, and Northeast Community College. He said goals for his first year with SJC include helping technical education areas receive what they need to continue a successful track.

"I want to serve as a conduit to help the instructional specialists attain what they need in their departments," said Parks, who also plans to continue the college's outreach initiatives. "I've lived in the state of Texas for about 15 years and was very aware of San Jacinto College's reputation as a leader in technical education. The college has a heavy technical footprint, and that's why I looked forward to coming to work here."

With a strong background working alongside industry, Parks' education includes a Bachelor of Science in technology from Wayne State College and a Master of Science in human resource development from the University of Texas at Tyler. Dobie's defense of its 22-5A varsity football championship is very much on course after the Longhorns opened league play with a 42-0 shutout win over the Pasadena Eagles at Veterans Stadium in Pasadena.

The Eagles came into the game riding the emotional high of a 4-1 record through nondistrict play. But it took just one play for the Longhorns to set the tone.

Pasadena quarterback Nick Bernal fumbled on the first offensive play of the game, and Dobie's Dwight Tucker recovered the ball. Things never got any better for the Eagles.

The cast of stars for the Longhorns was lengthy. Senior tailback Andrew Robinson carried just four times but had 154 yards rushing and three touchdowns.

Robinson opened the scoring on Dobie's first offensive play after Bernal's fumble. Beating several Pasadena defenders along the way, Robinson danced around the right end and won a footrace to the end zone for a quick 7-0 Dobie lead.

Robinson went on to add a 54-yard scoring dash and a 60-yard touchdown run on the first play of the second quarter to end his night.

Deandre Bolden, the team's No. 2 running back, wound up leading the Longhorns with 165 yards rushing, including a dazzling 68-yard scoring run while playing quarterback early in the fourth quarter.

On the next to the last play of the game, Bolden busted loose for a second 68-yard gain before the Longhorns took a knee to end things deep in Pasadena territory.

Receiver Vance Leonard had his first touchdown reception of the season, and his brother, Vaughn Leonard, returned an interception 87 yards for a touchdown.

The Horns' defensive stars were numerous. Besides Vaughn Leonard (two interceptions) and Tucker, Quinton Roberts intercepted a pass, and defensive end Jonathan Jones and linebacker Marlon Jackson were disruptive throughout the game.

Records aside, Dobie entered the game at 3-2, this

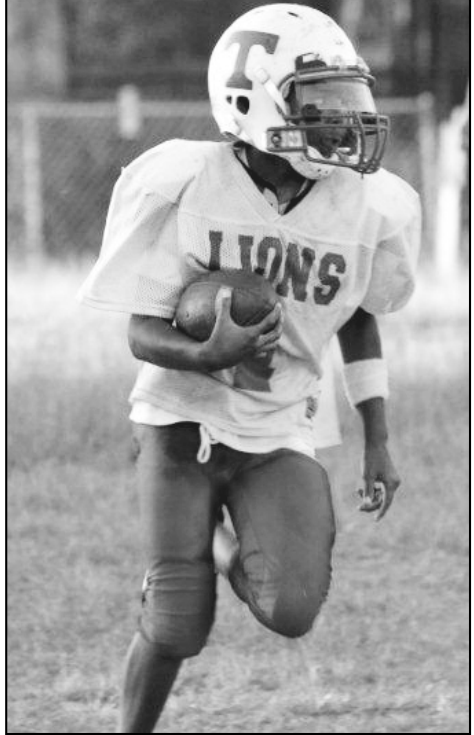
