Obama signs NASA bill, saving local jobs

President Obama signed legislation Monday, Oct. 11, that authorizes \$58.4 billion in funding for NASA over the next three fiscal years.

The move came roughly one week after Congress passed the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act of 2010 (S. 3729) and is welcomed by employees of the Johnson Space Center, as it provides funding for an additional shuttle flight and the accelerated development of a new heavy-lift rocket for deep-

Obama's initial budget proposal had called for the phasing out of manned space flight, threatening as many as 7,000 local jobs, according to Bob Mitchell, president of the Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership.

While the authorization bill does cancel funding for the Bush administration's Constellation moon program, it provides for the development

of a new vehicle by 2016 to explore deeper into space beyond low-earth orbit, with the eventual goal of making the trek to Mars.

The space shuttle program was scheduled to be retired later this year, but will now take flight once more in February 2011. Further, the International Space Station pro-

gram has now been extended to 2020. The legislation, however, still calls for the future use of commercial spacecraft to ferry astronauts to and from the facility.

U.S. Sen Kay Bailey Hutchison, who championed the bill, is enthusiastic about its recent

HCAD issues consumer warning

The Harris County Appraisal District is regularly contacted by homeowners who have unnecessarily paid money to solicitors who - for a fee offer to file "designation of homestead" and/or homestead exemption forms in Harris and other

Additionally, many homeowners complain after being misled by letters from individuals or businesses that offer to help them recover unclaimed government funds if the homeowner signs an agreement giving the solicitor half the recovered money. In the typical case of this type, the homeowner simply receives a property tax homestead exemption application form prepared by the firm doing the solicitation.

Unfortunately, once the homeowner has agreed to pay the solicitor half the refund, he or she loses that much of any potential tax refund and many of these firms have been quick to sue in small claims court if the unfortunate individual refuses to pay. Jim Robinson, HCAD's chief appraiser, urges

homeowners who receive these types of solicitations to be extremely careful and check with the appraisal district or an attorney before responding to the offer.

There is absolutely no charge for a homeowner to file his or her own homestead exemption application with the appraisal district, and application forms are available both on HCAD's Web site and from the district's Information and Assistance Center at 13013 Northwest Freeway in Houston," Robinson noted.

The homestead exemption is the single most important tax saver available to homeowners You are eligible if you meet these requirements: 1. You owned and occupied your home on January 1 of the year for which application is made. 2. Neither you nor your spouse has claimed a residence homestead exemption on any other property, regardless of where that property is lo-

A qualified property owner may apply up to one year after the date taxes for the year of application become delinquent (usually Feb. 1).

Homeowners who are over 65 or totally and permanently disabled (as defined by Social Security) are eligible for additional exemptions, and become eligible on the date they turn 65 or become disabled.

In the case of solicitations offering to file a "Designation of Homestead," this sort of form is submitted to the county clerk rather than the appraisal district, and does not qualify as a property tax homestead exemption application.

This sort of designation deals only with protecting one's homestead property in the event of a forced sale for debt.

Most homeowners never need to file such a designation and, generally, should consult an at-

torney before doing so. For additional information about property tax homestead exemptions, contact HCAD's Infor-
