Ellington air show set for Oct. 17-18

The 31st annual Wings Over Houston Airshow is set to take flight Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 17 and 18, at Ellington Airport. Gates open each day at 8 a.m., with feature flying acts beginning at 10 a.m.

The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds will once again headline the event, performing as a team of six F-16 Fighting Falcon aircraft. This marks the first time the Thunderbirds have performed at the airshow since 2010.

Other headliners at the event include the Breitling Jet Team and the VFA-122 Super Hornet Demonstration Team.

Hailing from Europe, the Breitling Jet Team is the world's largest professional civilian flight team performing on jets, sometimes flying with-

in 3 meters of each other at speeds of more than 700 km/h.

Flying single-seat F/A-18Es and two-seat F/A-18Fs, the VFA-122 Super Hornet Demonstration Team is also known for its precision maneuvers. According to the group's website, the pilots fly as "close to the edge of the envelope as safety and prudence allow."

Other performances include the Tora! Tora! Tora! Pearl Harbor re-enactment, David Martin, Kevin Coleman, the WW II Airpower Demo, U.S. Coast Guard Helicopter Dolphin MH65D, Debbie Rihn-Harvey, Rob Reider and Ralph Royce.

The event will also include static displays of vintage and modern military aircraft, as well as

numerous exhibits and activities, including Heroes and Legends Tent, NASA Driven to Explore Exhibit, Commemorative Air Force Hangar 57, Experimental Aircraft Association, National USA Forces Museum, The 6th Cavalry Historical Association, Kid's Carnival, motion simulator rides and more.

Beamer extension moves forward

The construction project to extend Beamer Road to Bay Area Boulevard is continuing to move forward, according to Harris County Project Coordinator Larry Allen.

A joint project between Harris County and the Texas Department of Transportation, the \$10.3 million endeavor will extend Beamer roughly one mile from Tall Ships Lane, the street's current dead end in the Heritage Park subdivision, to West Bay Area Boulevard.

Allen said the project experienced a minor setback recently over a dispute with CenterPoint Energy regarding a proposed sound barrier near the El Dorado intersection. The problem has since been resolved, however, with the barrier now being shifted 2.5 feet toward the road to allow above-ground utilities to be installed.

Crews are currently working on a detention pond located south of El Dorado to provide adequate drainage for the project, Allen said.

The project is scheduled to be complete by the

last quarter of 2016.

This project will be done in addition to a second endeavor that will make improvements on Beamer north of Tall Ships.

That work involves reconstructing roughly 2.6 miles of Beamer from Dixie Farm Road to Tall Ships.

Commissioner's Court has already approved funding for the project, which just entered the design phase. Allen said this stretch of the road poses far more problems than the southern portion, as there are more than 80 pipelines that designers must maneuver around.

According to Allen, it is currently unclear whether the designers plan to incorporate new curbs and gutters into the design for drainage purposes or just continue to use ditches.

The design phase will take at least one year to complete. Allen is hopeful construction on that project will begin once the other phase is complete.

Pct. 2 deputies seek burglary suspects

The Harris County Precinct 2 Constable's office is seeking the public's help in identifying at least two suspects wanted for burglarizing multiple homes in newer South Belt subdivisions.

Affected subdivisions include Ashley Pointe, Riverstone Ranch, Lake at Golfcrest and Clear Brook Meadows. At least eight houses have been burglarized in the past three weeks.

According to Precinct 2 Sgt. Robert Sanchez, the crooks break in a bathroom window, then focus their attention solely on the master bedroom before exiting through the same window.

"They're in and out," Sanchez said.

In one surveillance video, a lone man is dropped off in a small black car, then picked back up in a small white car. The two men captured on video are described merely as black males in their midteens to early 20s. Deputies, however, believe there are probably at least three suspects involved. The burglaries have subsided this past week after heavy patrolling of the four subdivisions. Anyone with any information about these incidents is urged to contact the constable's office at 713-477-2766.

Pastor Sherman Wilson dies at 93

The Rev. Sherman Wilson, the founding pastor of Sagemont Presbyterian Church (now known as A Community of the Servant-Savior), died Thursday, Oct. 8, at the age of 93.

Now located on Hughes Road across the street from Stuchbery Elementary, the church originally opened in the mid-1960s on Kingspoint in a small chapel on property that is now part of Alameda Mall's parking lot.

Wilson retired in the mid-1980s after serving 19 years. Church membership peaked under Wilson's leadership at around 350.

Following Wilson's retirement, the church was led by the Rev. Susan Bryan, who served 18 years. Under Bryan's leadership, the church became affiliated with the More Light Presbyteri-

ans and adopted a gay-friendly attitude, encouraging the participation of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people of faith.

The church went without a pastor for approximately 18 months after Bryan's departure before hiring the Rev. Alan Brehm, who split his time between A Community of the Servant-Savior and the First Presbyterian Church in Dickinson.

The Rev. Kathleen Davies now serves as pastor.

The church was forced to rebuild in April 2010 after being destroyed by fire. Investigators immediately determined the cause of the blaze was arson, but no arrests were ever made in the case.

Hobby Airport goes international

To prepare for the opening of its new five-gate, \$156 million international concourse on Thursday, Oct. 15, William P. Hobby Airport officials invited more than 200 volunteers to portray international travelers during a simulation to help test processes and procedures at the new concourse.

"The simulation event provided us with valuable feedback on how passengers will navigate through the international arrivals and departures process at Hobby Airport," said Hobby Airport Acting General Manager Jesus Saenz, who leads the project's activation for the Houston Airport System. "The simulation provided us an opportunity to identify and resolve any possible issues on opening day."

The "passengers" were given mock passports and unique scripts that specified their type of travel to the airport, mode of check-in and flight number. Scenarios included ticketing and check-in exercises, security screenings, baggage checks and the customs and immigration process. The

volunteers were also asked to locate various concessions and other amenities.

Customer Service Manager Gabrielle Dirden coordinated the logistics for the simulation and advised staff to look for possible actions that might signal a passenger was in distress, from motorists circling the roadway to a passenger running to a gate.

"The simulation event was a tremendous effort by all parties involved," Dirden said.

All volunteer passengers were given a satisfaction survey to complete that aided in identifying those areas needed for improvement.

"We are happy to say that we received a 85 percent approval rating from volunteers who participated in the simulation event. With this feedback we are able to address issues that were noted in the survey."

All airport stakeholders were involved in the simulated event including airlines, concessionaires, U.S. Customs and Border Protection and the Transportation Security Administration.

Lost Tejano takes place among historical Makers of Texas

A face unseen for 166 years, Don Jose Miguel de Arciniega, unsung Hispanic leader and recently acknowledged by the Texas Historical Commission as one of the early Makers of Texas, now has an official portrait hanging in the San Jacinto College South Campus Library's Texana Collection room, thanks

to descendant and historical researcher, Donna De Leon, and San Jacinto College auto collision repair instructor, David Baisden.

Arciniega served Texas for 36 years, and until now has been one of its forgotten Tejano fathers. Among his many roles, he served as a land commissioner for

Stephen F. Austin, political chief, militia captain, military explorer, State Inspector of Arms, interpreter at the Siege of Bexar, and platted out and named the city of Bastrop. Though he was deeply regarded among Texas' iconic historical founders, many significant historical accounts of the founding and

formation of Texas made no mention of his contributions.

Growing up, De Leon always heard stories of her ancestor, Arciniega, and she and other relatives formed the Jose Miguel Arciniega Descendants Society (JMADS), which brought Arciniega out of the shadows and on to the pages of Texas history.

"This research is intended to educate the descendants of Don Jose Miguel de Arciniega about their roots, to give awareness to the public, and to broaden the richness of Texas History," said De Leon. "Don Miguel de Arciniega contributed 36 years of service to Texas, and he deserves a place in Texas History."

Baisden, a longtime instructor in the college's auto collision repair program, has a talent for creating oil paintings, drawings, and other visual art media that not many people are aware of. He and De Leon have been neighbors for years. Upon deciding to research her ancestor, De Leon asked him to create an official composite of Arciniega as part of the required materials for a state historical marker. Since there were no existing images of Arciniega, Baisden used family photos of Arciniega's

descendants to come up with a composite of what he may have looked like along with another series of portraits depicting an age progression of Arciniega throughout key years of his life.

"It was a little difficult to start since there was absolutely no photos or likenesses of him," said Baisden. "Using a lot of family photos and looking at their dominant features helped me get the initial sketches done, then the family helped refine certain details until I got the final composite created. It's been an honor to play a part in bringing Jose Miguel Arciniega's story to life."

Earlier this year, after evaluating their application and supporting documentation, the Texas Historical Commission approved JMADS for a historical marker recognizing Arciniega as a "Maker of Texas."

The marker was dedicated on May 15, 2015, and is located at the Marriott Plaza San Antonio, in the physical location said to be Arciniega's childhood home. The space is now named Arciniega House and functions as one of the hotel's executive meeting spaces, also displaying one of Baisden's portraits of Arciniega.

Dobie, along with the three other PSD high school bands, left the UIL District Marching Band

Contest with a I rating, placing them in the Superior category. This was the first time since 1982 that all of the district's bands, including Sam Rayburn, South Houston and Pasadena, had earned the rating. The director of the 192-member band was Gary Wilkes, and assistant director was David Scott.

25 years ago (1990)

Recently discovered draft documents produced for the Brio supplemental remedial investigation stated chemicals were found in the Southbend subdivision although the Environmental Protection Agency said no evidence of contamination existed.

Wanting to make a positive statement about their lifestyles, 586 of 960 Thompson Intermediate students submitted to voluntary drug testing. As part of the KYSSSED program (Knowledgeable Youth Standing Strong Eliminating Drugs), the students took the urinalysis test as part of the school's positive peer pressure approach to the teenage drug problem. The 16th Annual Wings Over Houston Airshow was held at Ellington Field. Four Dobie students, Madhura Kulhari, Laura Kunkel, Michah Ledesma and Kevin Manuel, were commended in the National Merit Program.

10 years ago (2005)

Murder and negligent homicide charges were filed on Michael Cook, 41, the driver of the bus that killed Ruth Young, 9. PSD employees involved in the altering of Cook's official employment records were no-billed by a Harris County grand jury.

The South Belt-Ellington Chamber of Commerce hired local business owner and volunteer Kathy Valtasaras as its executive director.

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2,000 area readers flock to district's Tweens Read Book Festival

Jacqueline Pena and her best friend Joselyn Mairena purchased the book *Proxy*, a required reading item for the Name That Book competi-

tion, and became fans of the author. A year later, they were crying tears of joy as they came face to face with the author, C. Alexander London. "This was a once in a life-

time opportunity," the Southmore Intermediate students said. "I can't believe we really just met him."

Nearly 2,000 reading enthusiasts echoed their excitement while attending the fifth

annual Tweens Read Book Festival welcoming 26 renowned authors who traveled across the country on Oct. 3 to Pasadena ISD's South Houston High School to meet fans and share their love of reading.

The event attracted students of all ages, in addition to teachers, librarians and administrators throughout the Greater Houston area, and even as far as Pflugerville and Dallas.

Tweens Read kicked off bright and early Saturday morning with lines of students and chaperones wrapped around the building for registration. When the doors opened, the crowd flooded into the school and packed the entire auditorium for the first keynote address by Gene Luen Yang, award-winning comic writer of *Avatar: The Last Airbender* and DC Comics' *Superman*.

The crowd separated into five rooms for a series of panel discussions — each room representing various adolescent genres including: Five Funny Guys; Edge of Your Seat; a Different World; Nothing but Trouble; and Fantastic Fantasy.

Comprising multiple national award-winning authors including a Coretta Scott King-John Steptoe honoree, the panelists promoted their new books and talked about their inspiration for writing.

After the authors gave introductions, a moderator in each room opened up the floor for questions and comments. Nearly every hand flew up as students fired off questions ranging from the author's favorite color to their motivation for writing. While some responses resulted in an eruption of laughter, others involved riveting discussions between the crowd and the authors.

"This is the only place in the country that you are going

to find a book festival that is focused specifically on tween readers. This is it. This is the stage in a kid's life, where we either get readers for life or we lose kids to books. So if we can grab them at this age, it is going to change the rest of their lives, which is why this is such a valuable conference," Jennifer Nielsen, author of the *Ascendance* trilogy, said.

The crowd rotated after each panel discussion. Around lunch time, attendees purchased books and snacks at the stations set up around the hallways. By the time they made their way back to the auditorium for the closing keynote speech by Newberry award-winning authors Katherine Applegate and Rebecca Stead, students were carrying bags loaded with books.

Following the keynote speech, attendees formed two lines extending from one end of the school to the girls and boys gyms for book signings. To pass the time, several students delved into their new books, to start the next chapter in their reading adventure.

The event has grown significantly since 2010, attracting about 600 more students this year. About half of the attendees were composed of middle school students, while the other half consisted of 343 elementary students, 220 chaperones; 153 teachers; 80 librarians; 41 college students; 30 high schoolers; and 18 administrators. In addition, more than 70 community members, district staff and South Houston JROTC students volunteered for the event.

Tweens Read was founded by a bookseller and librarian who aspired to promote literacy among pre-teenagers. The festival is a collaborative effort by the Pasadena ISD Office of Libraries and Instructional Materials, South Houston High School, Blue Willow Bookshop, the Uni-

versity of Houston and community volunteers. The event is sponsored by the Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation and Phillips 66.

Organizers hope the festival will educate, enrich, inform, entertain and ignite a passion for reading and writing in the tween community. Judging by the smiles on students' faces as they met with authors, they have accomplished their mission.

"There is a kinetic energy in this building that ricochets from the students to the authors," Christine Van Hamersveld, Pasadena ISD director of Libraries and Instructional Materials said. "Pasadena ISD hosts this event every year to bring a community of readers together to share their enthusiasm, their thoughts and their passion for the written word. We are incredibly thankful to the organizers, volunteers, sponsors, and especially these published authors for making this event a memorable experience for students. We hope that Tweens Read will encourage students to continue reading so they can become lifelong learners."

She was also recognized for expanding the aquatic science program at Dobie, which has increased from three classes in 2011 to 18 this school year.

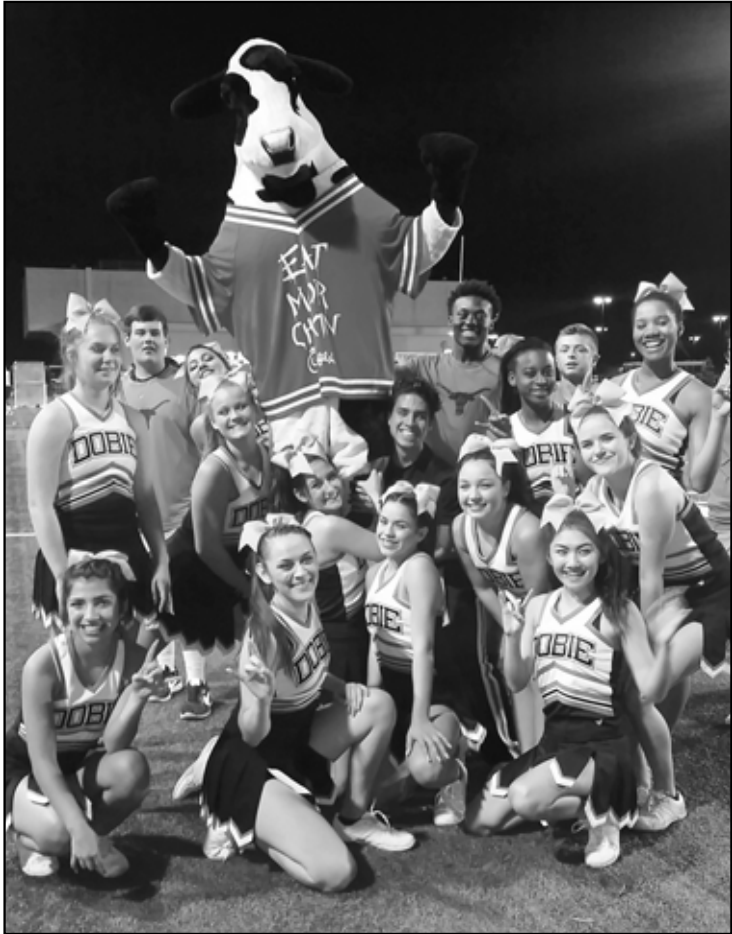
