Nov. 2 general, special election results tallied

Results from the Nov. 2 general and special elections have been tallied, with a few surprises.

In the race for governor, Republican incumbent Rick Perry easily defeated Democrat and former Houston Mayor Bill White. Perry got 55.1 percent of the vote to White's 42.3 percent. In all, Perry received 2,733,657 statewide votes to White's 2,102,500.

U.S. Rep. Pete Olson will maintain his District 22 seat, handily defeating Democratic challenger Keshia Rogers.

Olson received 67.5 percent of the vote to Rogers' 29.8 percent, with Olson receiving 140,391 total votes to Rogers' 62,011.

In the Texas House District 144 race, Republican incumbent Ken Legler easily defeated Democratic opponent Rick Molina.

Legler received 59.4 percent of the vote to Molina's 38.3 percent. Legler received a total of 15,395 votes to Molina's 9,920.

In one of the surprising outcomes of the election, Democratic incumbent Sylvia Garcia lost her position as Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner to political newcomer Jack Morman.

Morman narrowly defeated Garcia, receiving

50.9 percent of the vote to her 49.1 percent. In all, Morman received 66,057 total votes to Garcia's 63,747.

A lifelong resident of Precinct 2, which covers the portion of the South Belt area east of the Gulf Freeway, Morman is a resident of Deer Park, where he and his wife Andrea Moreno also both graduated high school.

Following high school, Morman attended Baylor University and the Baylor University School of Law. He is currently a practicing attorney.

Democratic incumbent George Risner will keep his position of Harris County Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 2, Place 2, having handily defeated Republican challenger Phillip Webb.

Risner received 58.3 percent of the vote to Webb's 41.7 percent. Risner received 23,856 total votes to Webb's 17,087.

While helping campaign for his father at the BellaVita polling station on Election Day, Risner's son, Keith Risner, had the fortune of meeting good Samaritan and South Belt resident Anne Platzer. After noticing the judge's son was cold and wet, Platzer returned to the location and brought him a pair of fresh socks and a leather

jacket to keep him warm and dry.

In the special City of Houston election, the controversial Proposition 1 to create a dedicated pay-as-you-go fund for drainage and streets narrowly passed, receiving 51 percent of the vote. A total of 173,687 people cast their vote in favor of it, while 166,615 people voted against it.

Also controversial, Proposition 3 asked if the city should continue to use red light cameras to enforce state or local

laws relating to traffic safety.

Houston voters decided to discontinue the program, with 53.2 percent voting against it and only 46.8 percent voting in favor of it. In all, 186,322 people voted against the program and 164,235 voted to maintain it.

Houston voters also voted against Proposition 2 that asked if the city charter should be amended to provide that the required period of residency to file for the office of district council member be reduced from 12 months to 6 months preceding the Election Day for the general election in November 2011. The proposition was of importance because the Houston City Council district boundaries will be redrawn less than a year before that election.

A total of 203,250 people (63.1 percent) voted against the proposition, while 118,983 people (36.9 percent) voted for it.

New SVFD station set to open

The Southeast Volunteer Fire Department will celebrate the grand opening of its new station at 10510 Scarsdale Blvd. Saturday, Nov. 13, with an open house from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

To be located adjacent to the South Belt-Ellington Chamber of Commerce, the facility will be the third in the area for the department, along with two located on Hughes Road, and will serve as its main station and first large-scale disaster headquarters.

Funded by a Clear Brook City Municipal Utility District bond that voters approved in March 2007, the station cost roughly \$2 million to construct and will occupy 9,500 square feet.

A blessing by the Rev. James Burkhardt of St. Luke's church will take place at noon.

This will be followed by a celebration of remembrance for deceased members, accompanied by the St. Thomas Episcopal Pipers.

SVFD officials, along with board members from the Clear Brook City Municipal Utility District and South Belt-Ellington Chamber of Commerce, will conduct an official ribbon-cutting at the new facility, to be followed by a traditional "wet down" by other area fire departments.

Fire departments taking place in the wet down include the Houston Fire Department and the Forest Bend, Friendswood, Pearland and Ponderosa volunteer fire departments.

All members of the South Belt community are invited to tour the new station after the grand-opening festivities.

Dobie win streak continues

Dobie High School's varsity football team continued its return to prominence, earning at least a share of the District 22-5A after a 35-14 victory over the South Houston Trojans Oct. 29 at Newcomb Field.

DeMarcus Boyd rushed for 181 yards on 18 carries, giving him 1,177 yards and 12 touchdowns for the season, both District 22-5A highs. Quarterback Blake Jackson rushed for 131 yards and two touchdowns, and fired a scoring pass to Davion Hurst as the Longhorns mounted 492 yards of total offense in the win.

The victory, Dobie's sixth straight, leaves the

team at 7-2 overall. At 4-0 in District 22-5A action, the Longhorns have earned a piece of the district title.

But this team wants more. With a win over Deer Park Friday, Nov. 5, at Abshire Stadium in Deer Park, the Longhorns will capture an outright district title for the first time since 1999.

Headed to the Class 5A Division I playoffs, the Longhorns will take on either North Shore or Beaumont West Brook of District 21-5A in the bidistrict round of the playoffs.

Hill fundraiser set for Nov. 6

A fundraiser for Daisy Hill will be held Saturday, Nov. 6, at The Gardens, 12001 Beamer, from 6 to 11 p.m.

Hill, a 30-year South Belt resident and long-time volunteer youth coach, suffers from a stage-four orphan cancer called paraganglioma, which is in the carcinoid/neuroendocrine family of rare cancers.

There is currently no cure for the disease.

Hill also recently lost her only child, Ronnie Hill, who suffered from a rare disorder known as Holt-Oram Syndrome that is characterized by abnormalities of the upper limbs.

All proceeds from the benefit will go to help defray medical expenses and to pay for future treatments.

Hill discovered her paraganglioma in 1990. However, when she attempted to have it resected at an area hospital, doctors mistakenly removed her parotid gland, causing her to contract Frey's Syndrome, a rare neurological disorder that damages the facial nerve.

On subsequent trips to the hospital, doctors assured Hill that all traces of the tumor were gone.

Over the next 15 years, however, Hill noticed that she was developing a growth on the side of her neck, which was getting larger and causing extreme pain.

Upon visiting a doctor for a checkup, she was notified that her 1990 surgery was unsuccessful in removing her tumor.

In a twist of fate that Hill describes as, "miraculous," she made the acquaintance of a team of sympathetic doctors who offered their services

pro bono.

In all, Hill underwent three surgeries to remove the tumor, which now measured 22 centimeters by 19 centimeters. Her doctors said it was the largest they had ever seen.

The surgical process was filmed to be used as a tool for future medical students. The ordeal was also the subject of a documentary that aired on the Discovery Health channel titled, *The Woman with the Giant Lump*.

Following her surgery, Hill endured five weeks of head and neck radiation therapy.

Hill's procedure, however, was not without its complications. She lost the use of her right jugular vein and vagus nerve. Additionally, the right side of her vocal chord is paralyzed, as is the inside and outside of her throat. She now also suffers from dysphagia, a disorder making it difficult to swallow.

Unfortunately, Hill's paraganglioma has now metastasized into her lungs, pelvis, chest and throat, and her condition requires multiple costly procedures.

The fundraiser will feature food, a raffle, a live auction and door prizes. Barbecue plates will be \$10 each.

SoHo now rated 'Acceptable'

Following an appeal from the Pasadena Independent School District, the Texas Education Agency has now rated South Houston High School as "Academically Acceptable," for the 2009-10 school year, rather than, "Academically Unacceptable," as it was earlier deemed.

The reason for the initial rating was a low indicator on completion rate among the school's African-American students. In other words, according to the agency, too many of South Houston's African-American students dropped out of school.

After analyzing the data, district officials discovered that the only reason for their high dropout numbers for African-American students was the number of students who transferred to South Houston after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita and then withdrew a few months later.

"We had no way of tracking where they went when they returned to Louisiana," said PISD Su-

perintendent Kirk Lewis. "By strict definition, if we can't track them we have to include them as dropouts."

The state, however, originally said these students would be exempted from the accountability process.

After discovering the error, PISD appealed to the TEA and won.

Lewis said the school actually made great strides this past academic year.

"The campus is doing amazing things and in fact, had the highest academic gains among any of our schools for 2009-10," Lewis said. "They reached 'Academically Recognized' levels on 16 of the 20 indicators on which they are measured."

All campuses in the district are now rated at or above "Academically Acceptable," with 84 percent of its ratable campuses being rated "Exemplary" or "Recognized."

PISD Superintendent on So Ho rating

You may remember earlier this year that the Texas Education Agency had rated South Houston High School as "Academically Unacceptable." The reason for the rating was a low indicator on completion rate among African American students. In other words, according to the agency too many of South Houston's African American students dropped out of school. After analyzing the data, we discovered that the only reason for their high dropout numbers for African American students was the number of Katrina/Rita students who transferred to South Houston after the storm and then withdrew a few months later. We had no way of tracking where they went when they returned to Louisiana. By strict definition, if we can't track them we have to include them as dropouts.

When the state asked us to take in the Katrina/Rita students, they told us at the time that they would be exempted from

the accountability process. We and the state had identified these "missing" kids as Katrina/Rita students. Under the arcane accountability rules, we had to list them as dropouts, the state had to list South Houston as "unacceptable" and we had to appeal to get the rating overturned.

We appealed. We received word this week that we won the appeal, just like we knew we would. Therefore, South Houston High School's rating for 2009-10 is "Academically Acceptable," just as we knew it should have been. The campus is doing amazing things and, in fact, had the highest academic gains among any of our schools for 2009-10. They reached Academically Recognized levels on 16 of the 20 indicators on which they are measured.

As a district, all of our campuses are at or above the academically acceptable - 84% of our ratable campuses are now exemplary or recognized. Be proud of our students and staff and the hard work they do.

Dobie grad plays part in Hollywood film

South Belt has seen its fair share of success stories: government high-ups, professional wrestlers, Olympic gold medalists and entrepreneurs.

Now, as if that were not enough, the South Belt community has another connection to greatness, through Randy Wade Kelley, actor.

Kelley, son of Darlene Davis, principal at Mead-or Elementary School, recently played a part in the box-office hit *Red*, starring Morgan Freeman, Bruce Willis, John Malkovich and Helen Mirren.

Before moving on to act in films and stage performances, however, Kelley was a resident of Sagelegen, where his mother still resides.

He attended the old Weber Elementary School, Freeman Elementary, Thompson Intermediate School and Dobie High School, from which he graduated in 2000.

During his years in school he ran cross country for Thompson and was a member of the choir, drama club, debate team, Spanish club and math club, and played the Dobie mascot during his senior year.

After high school, Kelley moved to Austin to attend the University of Texas for a degree in government, but during a semester nearing the end of his college career, he had a change of heart.

"During my last semester, I took an elective class in radio, television and film," Kelley said. "I did a presentation by making a movie, and I loved everything about it. I decided that I wanted to change my degree from government to radio, television and film. I figured that if I liked it so much and I wanted to do this for a career, I need to learn as much as I can about it."

After extending his ten-

ure at UT for a bit longer, he graduated in 2006 with a degree in radio, television and film. After graduating, Kelley got a job working as a barista at Starbucks in Austin to help support himself while finding work in his desired industry. While doing theater performing, he was discovered by a talent group who now has helped him launch his career.

As far as how he got the part in *Red*, his explanation is as brief as his audition.

"I put an audition on tape and sent it to the casting director," Kelley said. "I got a call one day telling me that I had to be in New Orleans to audition again in person. I switched shifts, worked from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., drove nine hours to New Orleans, slept a couple of hours on a friend's couch, went to where they

needed me, said my line and was told that was it."

In the film, Kelley plays a paramedic who checks out Mary Louise Parker's character on screen. His scene is brief, but his friends and family were very proud of him.

"I went to see the film with my friends, and at first I thought that my scene was cut," Kelley said. "I didn't know whether my scene was actually in the film until I saw it on the screen; the movie

people wouldn't tell me if my scene was in or not. When I finally appeared on screen all of my friends started screaming and cheering, and I was just sitting there. It was very surreal. Shortly after the movie finished, I got a call from my mom at 2:30 in the morning saying that she saw me. My first question was "Mom, why are you up so late?" I have seen the movie four times and it is still pretty surreal, seeing my face on the big screen."

SoHo cafeteria gets upgrade

For more than half a century, the cafeteria at South Houston High School was a place where students ate lunch, danced in their socks on Friday nights, bought homecoming mums and celebrated Senior Day.

More than any other spot on campus, it was the place where Trojans collectively grew up, sharing days of joy - and one memorable day of pain. Emory Gadd was a junior at South Houston in the fall of 1963. He was eating in the cafeteria early one Friday afternoon.

"I heard a voice come over the PA system announcing that President John F. Kennedy had been assassinated," Gadd said.

Like millions of other Americans, Gadd has never forgotten where he was that dark day. For that and a million other reasons, few South Houston graduates will ever forget the semi-organized chaos of the school cafeteria. Those scenes now reside only in memories.

Over the summer, South Houston's 53-year-old cafeteria underwent a radical transformation. Workers began by gutting the entire facility, leaving only the walls.

That done, they constructed a new cafeteria similar to the food-court designs at other

Pasadena ISD high schools.

The \$3.2 million renovation has relieved much of the lunch-time overcrowding in the cafeteria. More than 600 students can now be accommodated during each of the school's four lunch periods.

The new cafeteria boasts all new kitchen equipment and spirited decor that coordinates with the school's "Big Red Express" theme.

Students may choose from several dining stations offering a variety of foods such as pizza, salads, snacks and hot meals.

"The new cafeteria has given students a renewed sense of school pride and bolstered the Trojan image," said Dr. Steve Fullen, the school's principal. "It's really strengthened morale."

"The cafeteria does more than just serve meals to students," said Gadd, now the youth minister at Sagemont Church. "That's why I'm ecstatic that the district and community decided to improve it."

The renovation process began slowly last winter as construction crews attempted to work around the need to maintain meal-service operations during the school day.

A temporary wall was built to seal off the construction area. Some meals had to be prepared off campus.

Gone are the rows of tables and chairs that used to stretch wall-to-window. Students now sit in round stainless-steel pods. Gone, too, are the enormous space heaters that hung from the ceiling and warmed the facility on cold days.

Although the new cafeteria was needed, the old cafeteria embodied three generations of history that won't soon be forgotten by the alumni.

"Lunch cost about 35 or 45 cents," said Herman Williams, a class of 1964 graduate and a founding member of the Pasadena ISD Education Foundation. "There were no Coke machines. You drank milk. And if you wanted to treat yourself, you'd get chocolate milk."

"The first two years I was there, we didn't have AC," said Wayne Adams, a former Trojans football star from the class of 1967 who went on to serve as principal at Pasadena High.

Still, Adams said, "Everybody looked forward to going to lunch because you got to socialize and see your friends."

The new cafeteria was funded by a bond issue approved by district voters in 2004. Construction was done by ArcTec Associates, Inc. with Prime Construction the general contractor.

Healing Field at San Jac South

In conjunction with National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week, the Bay Area Council on Drugs and Alcohol has set up a Healing Field® at San Jacinto College South in which lives lost due to alcohol-related accidents will be remembered.

What originally started as a temporary, visual memorial for the victims of Sept. 11, 2001, the Healing Field® memorial sites have now grown to encompass many other causes. The mini Healing Field® site at the San Jacinto South campus has 238 American flags posted outside the student center, which represent each person under 21 years old whose life was taken due to the consequences of drinking and driving.

BACODA will display its third annual Healing Field®, One Flag – One Life, Nov. 6-11 at Walter Hall Park in League City. There will be 1,551 flags flown in honor of the lives taken in fatal motor accidents in 2009.

Texas continues to have the highest national average of alcohol-related crash fatalities each year. While state and national laws have strengthened over the years, drinking and driving tragedies still occur.

"If just one person takes responsibility, the numbers will have to go down," said Tonya Mathis, special events supervisor for BACODA. "They are literally taking their lives and the lives of others in their hands when they decide to drink then drive, or get into a vehicle with someone that has been drinking. We are also giving them information on how the body processes alcohol and what is happening at various stages of intoxication; when they find out it's more than someone passing out or walking funny, they are listening."

Students around campus are also feeling compelled to share their stories.

Tracy Carpenter, a student at San Jac, was with her husband and three young children when a drunk driver hit them almost three years ago.

"We were stopped at a

stop sign and he hit us head-on going 75 mph," said Carpenter. "My husband and I had been undergoing fertility treatments since we wanted to have another baby, and just before this accident we found out we were pregnant with triplets; afterwards we found

out we lost all three babies." While she, her husband, and children walked away from the accident with no serious injuries, Carpenter says she was still devastated by the loss of her unborn children.

"If you know you're going to drink, get a designated

driver. It could be my life you take away, or the three babies that never got a chance."

The scenario is simple. If the Wolverines win, they will advance to the playoffs.

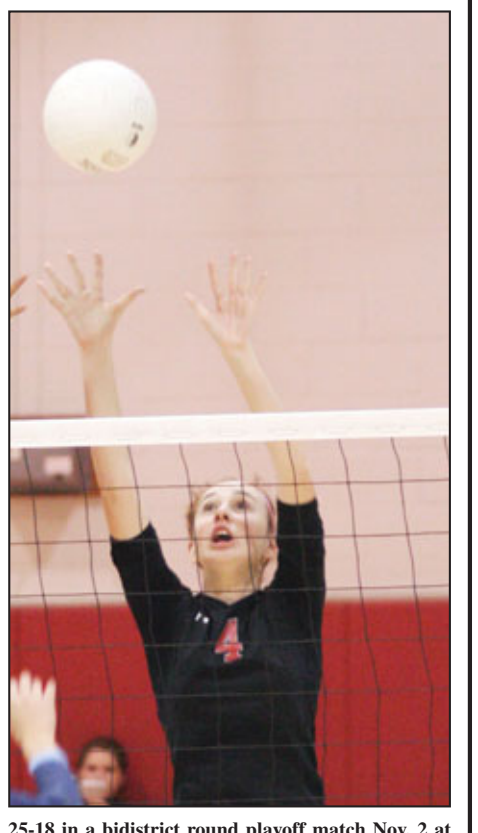
Should Dickinson win, the Gators will advance, and the remaining playoff seed would most likely be decided through a series of complex tiebreakers.

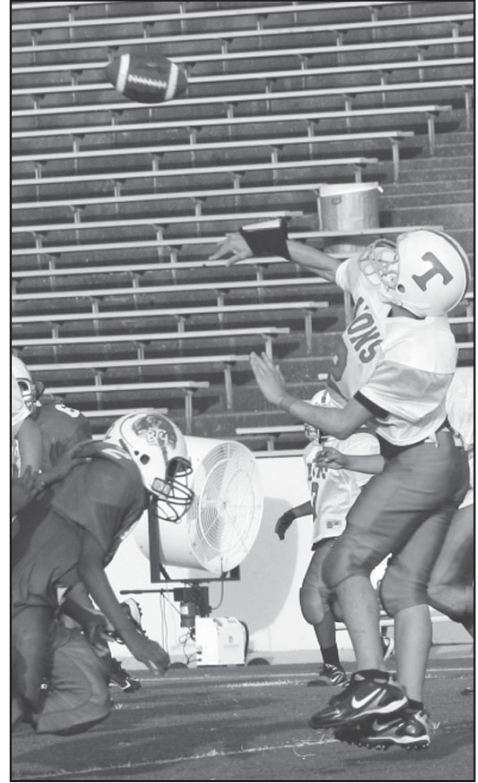
Longhorns' swimming team competes at Deer Park invite

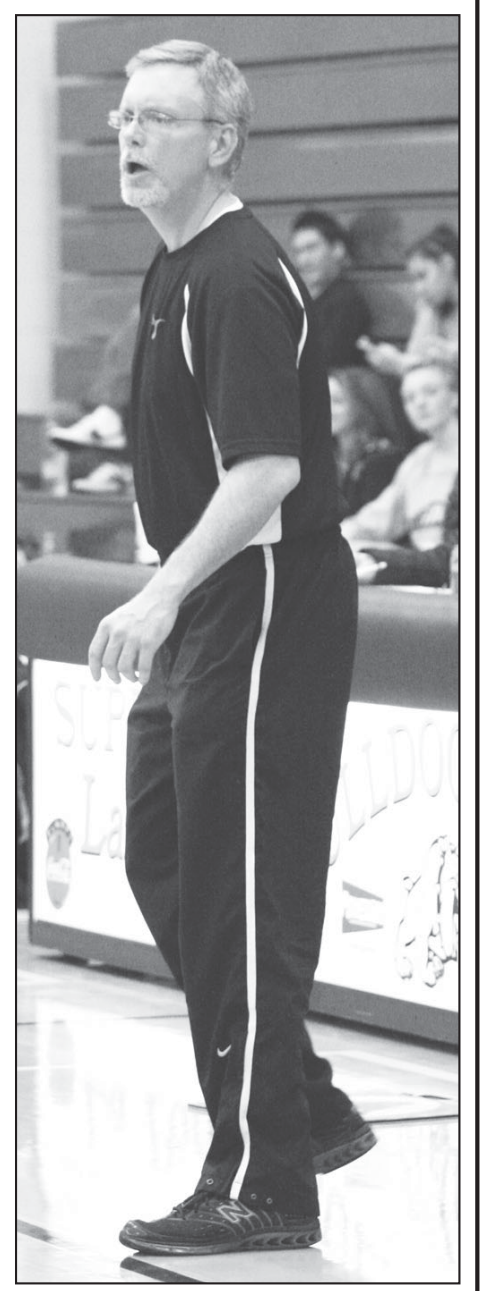

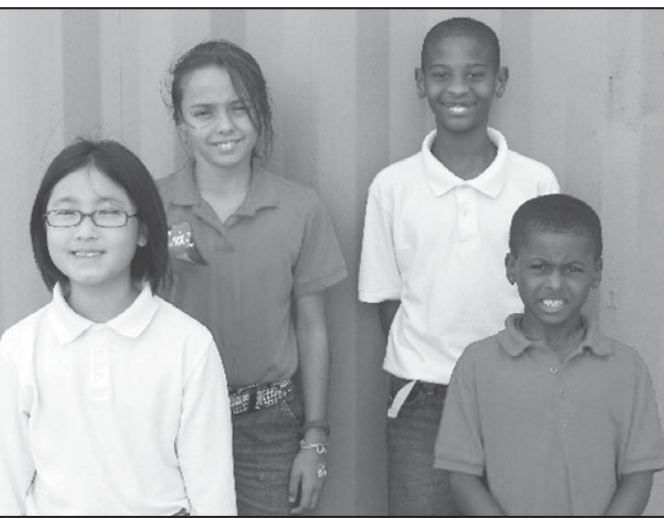

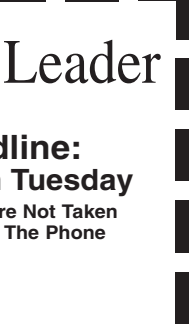

coach Jim Phillips expects the Longhorns to be ready for this huge game. "I'm sure our kids will be motivated and ready to play," Phillips said. "We probably won't have to say very much to them at all. These guys know what's at stake. They have always wanted to play in these big games, and this is one of them."

Dobie's game against South Houston was also a big one as, with a win, the Longhorns could achieve no worse than a tie for the 22-5A crown. As has been the case for much of this season, the team took care of business.

Dobie rolls SoHo
The final score was 35-14 in favor of Dobie, but the game was much more competitive than the scoreboard indicated.

As they did in the Memorial game, the Longhorns

surrendered the game's first score but then adjusted accordingly.

South Houston quarterback Rudis Requeno fired a pass down the middle to Dennis Robertson on the game's third offensive play.

After briefly juggling the ball, Robertson gained control and raced 47 yards to score just 62 seconds into the game.

But Dobie answered as quickly. Longhorns' quarterback Blake Jackson found Davion Hurst for a 54-yard completion on Dobie's second offensive play from scrimmage, and Andrew Robinson did the rest with a 4-yard run to the end zone with 9:36 remaining in the quarter.

A South Houston fumble was recovered by Darrian Lavergne on the next series, and the Longhorns went back to work.

Robinson had a 24-yard

run and Boyd carried for 11 more before Jackson found Hurst on a 15-yard touchdown toss. Although Dobie mishandled the snap on the conversion, the team led 13-7. South Houston proceeded to go on drives of 14 plays and eight plays without scoring as Dobie's defense held.

Then early in the second quarter, Jackson ended a 4-play, 74-yard drive with a brilliant 22-yard scoring run after dodging at least half of the Trojans' defense along the way. After a 2-point pass to a diving Hurst, the Longhorns led 21-7.

Dobie survived a failed fake punt but then gave up possession of the ball on a Robinson fumble near midfield. Leroy Scott, South Houston's gifted two-way player, then gained every yard as the Trojans went 49 yards for a touchdown, the last coming on Scott's 10-yard run.

Dobie's halftime adjustments were good enough to hold South Houston scoreless in the second half, and Dobie tailback DeMarcus Boyd, the district's leading rusher, took over the game.

With just five carries for 27 yards in the first half, Boyd was well-rested for the second half.

Boyd finished with 181 yards on 18 carries, including a 22-yard rushing touchdown, his 13th score of the season, with 5:16 left in the third quarter.

"So many guys have stepped up, but Boyd has taken his game to another level," Phillips said. "He keeps coming up with big plays for us."

If the Longhorns defeat

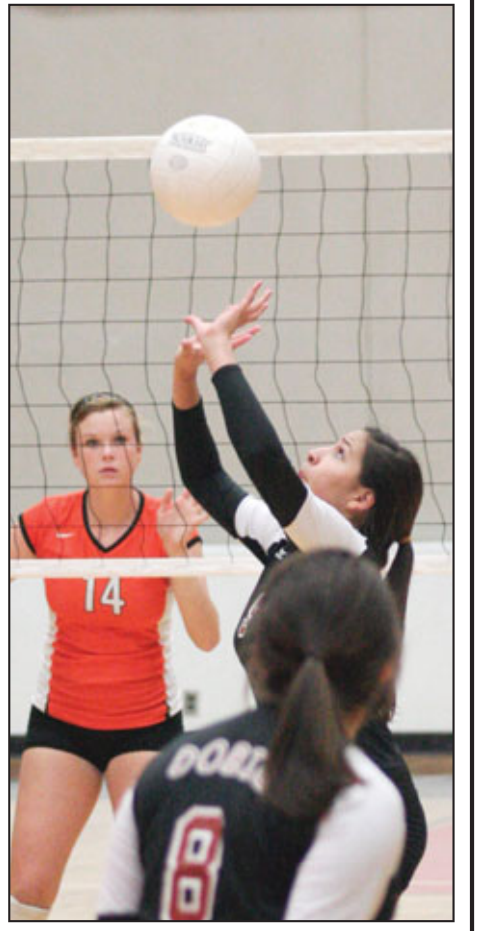
