Leader vultures correction

Alert reader Ralph Robbins notified the Leader that last week's photo cutline about the presence of large birds in the community contained a factual error.

According to Robbins, the birds in the picture are actually black vultures (Coragyps atratus), rather than turkey vultures (Cathartes

Turkey vultures sport red on their heads. whereas the black vultures have gray heads. In flight, the underside of turkey vulture wings have light gray wing tips and trailing feathers, whereas the black vultures have only the gray color on their wing tips.

The black vultures are smaller and much more aggressive and opportunistic than their larger cousins, and they are much more likely to show up in a setting like these did.

The Leader apologizes for any confusion.

PISD, SJC to start early college high school overcrowded high schools right now that need some relief," Lewis said. "And we have a career

Pasadena Independent School District officials recently announced their plan to open an early college high school center at Pasadena High School.

Working jointly with San Jacinto College, the program would allow students to take collegelevel courses simultaneously with their high school classes. The classes would then be transferable as San Jacinto College credits.

According to PISD Superintendent Kirk Lewis, students who accumulate enough credit hours could conceivably earn an associate degree while also earning their high school diploma. Lewis, however, said such a scenario would likely require a student to take summer classes.

The program is similar to Clear Creek Independent School District's Clear Horizons Early College High School. However, students in the CCISD program actually attend classes at San Jacinto College South, whereas students in the new PISD program would take classes at the Pasadena High School campus.

The superintendent said, however, the new facility would be separate, rather than integrated into the high school.

Lewis said he hopes similar programs could he installed at all of the district high schools. Pasadena High School was chosen as the pilot campus because it currently has the least over-

crowding, Lewis said. Roughly 60 students are expected to participate in the program in its first year.

Lewis is enthusiastic about PISD's relationship with San Jacinto College.

We think (the early college high school program) will grow over time, certainly at that campus," Lewis told the San Jacinto College Board

This sentiment is shared by San Jacinto College Chancellor Brenda Hellyer.

"San Jacinto College is excited about this opportunity with PISD," Hellyer said. "This early college high school model is one innovation that provides another path for our youth to move through college and to earn a degree. As educational partners, San Jacinto College and PISD are committed to working together on strategies for meeting the needs of our students and our com-

Also being proposed by PISD officials is the opening of a technical high school.

"It's a dream of mine," Lewis said. "A vi-

Recommended by the district's future facilities committee, which is composed of both staff and parents, the new school would provide skilled-job and career training.

Ideally, Lewis said students attending the school would graduate with an associate degree or a certification.

Lewis said the school would not focus solely on vocational classes, adding there have been discussions of including advanced courses, such as engineering.

In addition to providing valuable training to students, such a new center would also have the added side benefit of alleviating the existing overcrowding at area high schools

Leader gets help regarding lane change

Recently the Leader contacted the City of Houston and representatives from City Councilmember Mike Sullivan regarding the troubling northbound traffic at the intersection of Beamer Road and Beltway 8.

Drivers wanting to turn left are restricted to a single lane at the traffic light before the beltway. Due to so many vehicles wanting to turn left as opposed to continuing north on Beamer, a line of vehicles repeatedly causes congestion at the

At times even three times as many cars proceeding north were wanting to turn west on the

The response from the city was brief, but

"The intersection was checked two different times," read the report from the City of Houston. "At each observance, no problems were detected. However, if motorists continue to make double left turns, it has been advised that HPD be noti-

fied. No changes will be made at this time." After receiving the response, the Leader con-

tacted Lauren Doak, South Sector manager for Sullivan for aid in investigating the issue further. Doak assisted the Leader in contacting Jeffrey S. Weatherford, deputy director of the Department of Public Works and Engineering, Traffic and Transportation Division, who played a crucial role in resolving the traffic issue.

Weatherford concluded that the traffic count on vehicles turning onto the beltway, as opposed to vehicles proceeding straight through the intersection on Beamer, was significant enough to warrant a change in lane markings, which will greatly reduce congestion at the intersection and make a left turn from the second-to-left lane no longer illegal.

According to Weatherford, the timeline on changing the lane markings and signage will carry through to the first quarter of 2011 but should be completed by March.

10. All CEOS of Corporation's and business owners and persons involved of hiring illegal immigrants will be arrested. If convicted they will serve 1 to 5 years in prison plus pay fines. All the illegal immigrants found will be deported. There will be no racial profiling in the streets or home invasions.

11. After 5 years providing they have clean record, no felonies, the State in which they abide in will sponsor the immigrants for a green card of residency. State employment agencies will work and help any immigrant with a work Visa to find a job if needed.

12. After fulfilling the time required with a Green Card, they can apply for
