Dobie decathlon wins state, advances

Heavily favored Dobie High School won the Texas Academic Decathlon championship last weekend for the first time since 2003, earning the right to bid later this spring for the school's third national title.

Dobie senior Eddie Nunez led the Longhorn charge by winning the varsity category and posting the highest score in state varsity competition history. Nunez captured nine of the 33 individual medals won by the Longhorns.

Dobie also finished first in the Super Quiz portion of the meet, which was held at Coronado High School in El Paso.

The Dobie team is coached by Steven Higginbotham and Todd Geries. Higginbotham competed as a Dobie student in 1995 under the guidance of master decathlon coach Richard Golenko. Golenko led the Longhorns to national cham-

pionships in 1992 and 1996.

The Longhorns piled up 50,469.7 points to easily hold off runner-up Seven Lakes High

Dobie seniors dominated the major score categories. Mark Admani took second place in varsity with Tad Walters finishing fourth.

Katey Miille took fourth in the scholastic category while Jessica Huynh posted the high team score.

"This would not have been possible," Higginbotham said, "without the amazing support from so many teachers and administrators along the way."

Hughes Road expansion causes concern

The Hughes Road/Barry Rose expansion into Pearland is causing more controversy among South Belt residents. While the construction is aimed at improving

area traffic, it might hinder it for residents who would benefit from it the most.

Current Harris County plans call for the con-

one north of Hughes Road and one south of the street.

The blockades would allow vehicles to enter the Sagemeadow subdivision through Sageorchard, but would prohibit cars from exiting the neighborhood via Hughes.

Residents wishing to travel west toward Pearland Parkway and Highway 288 would still have to exit the neighborhood through Blackhawk rather than through Hughes. County officials say the move to construct the blockades is necessitated by state visibility regulations.

The westward expansion of Hughes will require an elevated bridge to be built that officials say will impair the vision of drivers traveling in both directions.

A possible solution would involve the installation of stop signs on Sageorchard north and south of Hughes. At a Feb. 23 meeting with Sagemeadow Municipal Utility District board members, county officials said they would look into such a measure, as well as installing a cautionary traffic light in front of the Southeast Volunteer Fire Department station.





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
Lariaettes excel at Crowdpleasers West Houston Regional competition




