Risk recently released its 2010 rankings of local

The organization ranked 1,018 public high schools in Texas to see who was doing the best at educating students and preparing them for postsecondary education.

A total 14 variables were examined by the group to determine how successful each high school was. Among these were the percentage of 11th-graders scoring at the "commended" level on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills in English/language arts, math, social studies and science; the percentage of graduates

recommended diploma program; the percentage of students who completed and received credit for at least one advanced course, including Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and dual enrollment; the percentage of students in grades 11 and 12 taking at least one AP or IB exam; the percentage of students who passed at least one AP or IB exam; overall student attendance rate for the school year; graduation rate; the percentage of graduates who took the ACT or SAT college admissions exams; average score for students taking the ACT; average score for students taking the SAT; and the percentage of students who qualify for free- or reduced-price lunch and are economically disadvantaged.

The data used were obtained from the Texas



case, as it is part of an ongoing investigation, but said one of the center's operators had applied to the state for a license, but a second person had not.

Deputies nab burglary suspect

Constable's office arrested a suspect Monday, May 17 for allegedly being involved in a home burglary the previous Monday.

Gregory Strickland, 24, was spotted, along with another male, at roughly 11 a.m. by Precinct 2 Deputy Parnell Jones unloading a large. flat-screen TV from a car to an apartment in the 12300 block of Beamer.

Suspecting the men may have been involved in a burglary. Jones called for backup from Precinct 2 Sgt. Zerick Guinn.

Upon seeing Strickland's vehicle and its license plates, Guinn recognized its description from a witness who had reported seeing it fleeing the scene of a home burglary in the area Monday,

Strickland was determined to have an open parole violation warrant and was detained.

Deputies subsequently searched Strickland's apartment and found a guitar and stand that also matched the description of an item that was taken

Deputies from the Harris County Precinct 2 in the May 10 burglary.

The victim from the May 10 burglary was able to positively identify the unique left-handed guitar as the one taken from his home, deputies

Further, the witness from the May 10 burglary was also able to positively identify Strickland from a six-person photo spread as being the individual fleeing from the initial burglary.

Strickland was then arrested and charged with felony burglary of a habitation.

When asked by deputies where the TV had originally come from, Strickland told them he bought it from a male known simply as "Jay" at a local gas station for \$200. Not convinced by the suspect's response, deputies then confiscated the electronic device.

ty officer Zarian "Z" Wood died Sunday, May 16, from wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated



Woods, 29, was assigned as a hospital corpsman to Third Battalion, First Marine Regiment, First Ma-

rine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force.

Originally from Memphis, Tenn., Wood moved to the Edgebrook area when he was in elementary school. He went on to attend Miller Intermediate and South Houston High School, where he gradu-While at South Houston, Woo peted on the high school's wrestling team.

Following graduation, Wood worked as a youth

pastor and tutor for troubled youth and a merchandiser for Coca-Cola before enlisting in 2006.

Wood was deployed to Iraq from 2007 to 2008, prior to volunteering for his second combat tour. The sailor was just 3.5 weeks into a seven-month stint in Afghanistan at the time of the accident.

When not deployed, Wood would stay with his sister, Krista Hamilton, in Sagemont.

Family members said Wood planned to return to school someday in hopes of becoming a dentist.

Wood was the third Texan and at least the third member of his Marine battalion to be killed in Afghanistan in just one week. Also killed were Cnl. Jeffrey Johnson, 21, of Tomball and Sgt. Kenneth B. May Jr., 26, of Kilgore.

He was preceded in death by his mother, Nellie Sue Wood. He is survived by his father, Daniel Wood, and siblings Zachary Wood, Hamilton, Teresa Robertson, Victor Robertson and Micah Dixon.

My wife and I were planning to visit Greece this summer to see my dad. We had planned to stay in his home for one week and then visit Mykonos for 5 days and return. I have not seen my dad in 6 rears and he is too old to travel to the U.S. I got on the Internet to see what the hotel prices were for our stay in Mykonos and found a rate of 170 euros per day. Not being well versed in the exchange rates of the euro to the U.S. dollar, I accessed an Internet site that showed the exchange rates for every currency in Yes more information than I needed, but the Internet seems to be that way most of the time. I had to scroll down quite a way before I found USD only to find that I could not afford \$216.00 a day

Then I noticed that just below USD was Zimbabwean dollars. The number was too big to fit in the box so I copied it and pasted it into Word to find that it was 2.741.025.562.000.00: that's 2.741 trillion Zimbabwean dollars a day. Thank God it includes breakfast. I said to my wife that there was a slim chance that we would see any Zimbabweans on the beaches of Mykonos. As it turns out we won't be on the beaches of Mykonos

After planning our trip we started hearing about how things in Greece were deteriorating and began to have second thoughts. After hearing the news about the deaths of people in Athens, I called my dad to seek his advice. He said that what we were hearing was nowhere near the worst of it. The rioters in the streets of Athens are the union workers, government employees, airline pilots, police, sanitation workers, and mass transportation workers. They have been promised more than the taxpavers of Greece can afford and that includes the rich Greeks. They want their money and they want it It seems that Greece has a debt to GDP ratio of 13.4%, which is very high.

About 5 years ago the government of Greece became more socialist and started promising "the world" to everybody

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especially government employees. I know that may sound familiar to what we are doing here, but there are some differences. We only have an 11% debt to GDP ratio and lucky for us we can print money when we run out. Greece, as well as other European Union nations cannot

A study was recently made in the USA that said that if we taxed the "rich" which we know is anyone making over \$250,000.00 a year, 100% of their income it would take 45 years to repay what we owe right now. That's if we stop spending money right now! Raising taxes is not the answer we must stop spending money right now. Click It or Ticket highlights new laws

of Transportation's ninth annual Click It or Ticket spring campaign is under way with a warning to drivers and passengers to fasten their safety belts or expect to get a ticket. Transportation officials say laws enacted in 2009 could result in more citations this year if drivers and passengers fail to heed new safety belt requirements.

For the first time, all pas-sengers in the back seat now must be buckled up, and children younger than 8 years old have to ride in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Fines range from \$25

to \$250 plus court costs.
"Whether you're the driver or a passenger in the front or back seat, every adult and every child in the vehicle must be properly restrained," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division director. "Buckling up can not only save you from getting an expensive ticket, it can also save your life."

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for those between 4 and 44 years of age. Last year in Texas, more than 3,400 people died

2008, half of all pickup truck drivers killed in traffic crashes were not buckled up. Wearing a safety belt increases the odds of surviving a crash by more than 50 percent, and in pickups, that number increases to 80 percent. To ensure that Texans are


complying with state law surrounding safety belt and booster seat use, thousands of state troopers will join police officers and sheriffs' deputies statewide to step up enforcement of the state's safety belt laws between May 24 and June 6, including the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Since the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, the state's safety belt use rate has increased from 76 percent to almost 93 percent. Safety experts estimate the rise in the numbers of motorists who now buckle up has resulted in 2,400 fewer traffic fatalities and prevented more than 56,300 injuries.

According to the Texas Transportation Institute, motorists least likely to buckle up continue to include men, enage boys and pickup

drivers and passengers.
