Losers challenge PISD election results

Three of five losing candidates in the May 9 Pasadena Independent School District board of trustees election have reportedly joined together to challenge the results, alleging that multiple irregularities may have affected the final vote count.

At press time, defeated challengers Chuck Maricle, Erica Davis Rouse and Alvino Gonzalez had filed two complaints with the Texas Secretary of State's office, with additional complaints expected to be filed in the coming days.

In the May 9 contest, Maricle and Rouse were

handily defeated by longtime Position 7 incumbent Vickie Morgan, while Gonzalez lost the Position 5 race to fellow challenger Kenny Fernandez, who narrowly defeated freshman incumbent Larry Savala.

The three complainants allege that requests for raw election data from the district was met with three separate responses and that the numbers on the third response, the unofficial cumulative report, did not align with the previous two vote totals.

"Complainants would like to know why PISD issued three separate reports, why the totals do

not accurately match and also contest these election results in their entirety," the official complaint stated.

PISD certified its official election results at a board meeting Tuesday, May 19.

The complainants also allege that district officials circulated campaign literature on Election Day without a proper disclaimer as prescribed by law. They further allege the campaign literature was printed and copied using school district equipment.

While the school district has yet to receive any

official complaints, PISD Superintendent Kirk Lewis is confident all procedures were followed accordingly.

"Pasadena ISD has received no official notice of a complaint being filed regarding our recent school board election," said Lewis. "While anyone is entitled to file a complaint, I am completely confident in the staff who coordinate our elections and tabulate the votes. They have 20 years of experience running elections and know the process well. I would be stunned if the process and procedures were not followed properly."

Man killed in drive-by shooting

A South Belt resident was killed in a drive-by shooting at his house in the 12000 block of Ryewater near Astoria on Friday, May 15, around 9 p.m.

Clay Wilson, 35, was standing in his driveway when two vehicles pulled up in front of the house, and people inside the cars opened fire. Wilson was struck several times in the head and chest.

Wilson was transported to Memorial Hermann Southeast Hospital, where he later died.

The home's surveillance system reportedly recorded the incident, but investigators had not

released the footage at press time. The footage allegedly shows Wilson talking to the killers before he was shot.

Police would not comment on a possible motive, saying only that it was not a robbery.

Police said they do not have a description of the shooters or how many there were. Their vehicles are described as a black SUV and a gray Dodge Challenger.

Heavy trash continues to confuse

More than two years after being introduced, the City of Houston's new heavy trash pickup zones continue to confuse area residents, prompting frequent phone calls and emails to the *Leader* for assistance. While the change in policy, implemented in November 2012, was intended to simplify things, it has had the converse effect locally, as the community is no longer divided by Beltway 8 as it was before.

Most South Belt residents (south of Fuqua) live in Zone 9 and now have their pickup dates on the second Thursday of the month.

Residents living north of Fuqua and west of the Gulf Freeway are in Zone 10 and now have their dates on the second Friday of the month, and residents living north of Beltway 8 and east of the Gulf Freeway are in Zone 7 and now have their dates on the second Tuesday of the month.

Tree waste and junk waste collection still take place in alternating months. Tree waste months are January, March, May, July, September, and November. Junk waste months are February, April, June, August, October and December.

Although junk waste is not accepted during tree waste months, tree waste is accepted during junk waste months. However, to ensure that tree waste is recycled, residents should hold tree waste materials until the next tree waste designated month or bring it to a neighborhood depository.

The heavy trash rules, according to the City of Houston website are as follows:

- Tree/junk waste should be placed adjacent to the front curb in a location easily accessible to the collection vehicle between the hours of 6 p.m. the Friday before, and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.

- Tree/junk waste material should not be stacked under low overhead electrical wires or other cabling, signs, or mailboxes; next to fences or posts; or on top of water meters, gas meters, fire hydrants, or other exposed utility components.

- Materials should not be placed in the street,

on the sidewalk or other right-of-way or in any manner which would interfere with pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

- Tree/junk waste collection is limited to residential units and vacant residential lots only if the waste generated is in connection with the maintenance of the property.

- No more than 8 cubic yards of junk waste or tree waste may be placed for collection.

- A maximum of 4 cubic yards of building material – not to include roofing shingles, brick, plaster or concrete – generated by the resident in connection with the maintenance of the residential property may be collected by Solid Waste Management Department crews.

- Appliances containing refrigerant must have a tag attached to them certifying that a qualified technician has removed the refrigerant.

- The Solid Waste Management Department is not allowed to collect any material that was generated by contractors who were retained by a resident to perform work on his or her residential property. It is the responsibility of the contractor to remove all debris that may arise from the contractor's activities. These contractor-related activities include, but are not limited to: trimming and removal of trees, remodeling, new construction and roofing.

- If authorized items placed for collection are mixed with unauthorized items, department personnel shall not be obligated to sort the materials and may refuse the entire load.

- Solid Waste Management Department collection services are not available to multi-residential structures of more than eight units.

Residents who put their heavy trash in the front of their yard before the allowed time are subject to citation. Fines can range from \$50 to \$2,000 for first-time violators and from \$250 to \$2,000 for repeat offenders. Each day a violation continues may be punishable as a separate offense.

Work begins on Clear Creek HS rebuild

The Clear Creek Independent School District board of trustees recently approved a contract addendum that sets the guaranteed maximum price for the Clear Creek High School 2013 Bond Construction Project at \$31,488,493. Work is scheduled to begin on the campus this month with the project expected to be completed in December 2016.

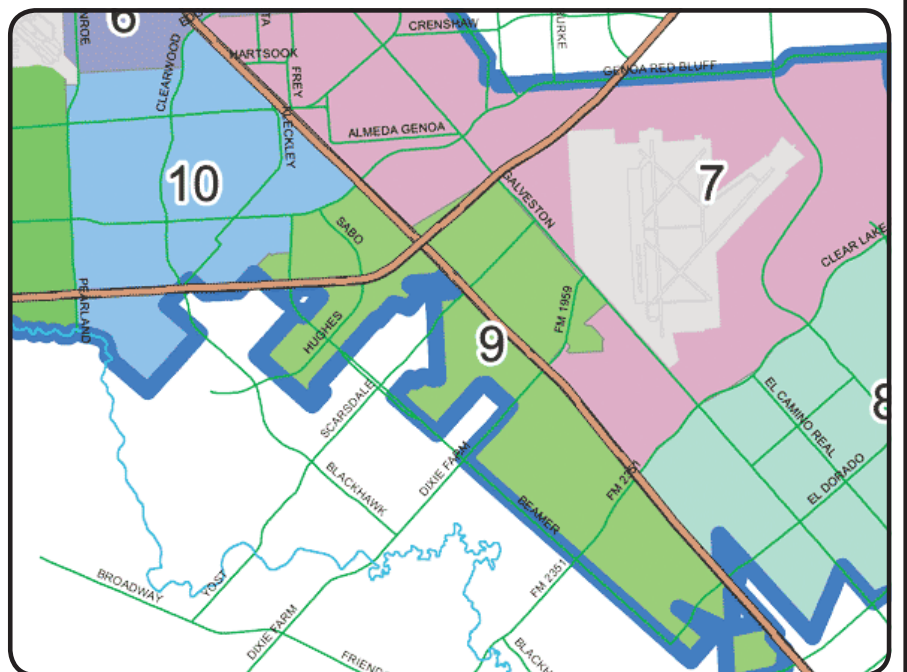
The project includes the demolition and rebuild of the Career Technology Education (CTE) wing and portions of the fine arts and athletics areas. The design includes a dental lab for a new program in the CTE wing, an expansion of the stage and a major remodel of the choir area. Crews will construct a new third practice gym, renovate the Carlisle Gym, locker area and of-

fices, as well as the natatorium.

This summer, crews will concentrate on reworking driveways and parking lots to accommodate construction and campus activities. The roof at the Carlisle Field House will be replaced, and crews will demolish the old football field house and renovate the lobby restrooms in the Carlisle Field House as well as renovate the area under the mezzanine.

Last Sunday, May 17, 2015, Project Joy & Hope for Texas held its 15th annual Hope Scholar Awards Reception. At this year's ceremony Dr. Jan Wheeler recalled that first reception at which just two \$500 scholarships were presented, then declared with pride how the program has grown over the years.

This year Project Joy & Hope presented 23 scholarships totaling over \$35,000 to recipients from 18 area high schools, including two young women from Dobie and a young man from Clear Brook. A candidate for a Project Joy & Hope scholarship had to have suffered the loss of a parent or sibling and each candidate submits three essays, one on how their loss impacted their life, a second on how their involvement in their community affected their life, and, a third on their goals for their future. Project Joy and Hope strives to prevent and relieve suffering for children with life-limiting conditions, and their families through community awareness, education, and special supportive care services and programs.

Another of Project Joy & Hope's services is providing housing for families of ill children who are in the Houston area for treatment of their condition and this service has been recently expanded with the addition of the Tulip Project, which is now three duplex houses Project Joy and Hope had constructed on Tulip Street in Pasadena. Project Joy and Hope can now serve up to six families at the Tulip Project.

with the Water Customer Service regarding the water meter box lid issue. I know you have recently reported a number of missing or damaged lids to 311 as per Susan Bandy's request, and we greatly appreciate that. However, since you have reported this as a recurring issue, I wanted to see if there's anything we can do to intervene at a more fundamental level.

It was explained that PWE has considered a number of alternative designs over the years due to complaints. However, there are tradeoffs associated with each. The department has tried boxes with lids which lock, but customers pushed back because they want easy access to the meters. The department has also tried boxes with lids attached by wire, but PWE workers found that these wires got in the way of their work. The department additionally tried boxes with lids which snap on like Tupperware but found that customers would use screwdrivers to pop these lids off to get to their meters, which then caused some lids to float away. The bottom line is that alternative designs have been experimented with and each have beneficial and detrimental elements. The city's desire for durable boxes has to be weighed against customers' desire for boxes which afford them access to the meters.

I also asked about the budgetary impact of the broken boxes and missing water meter lids, and was told that while this does cost the city the impact is not particularly significant. Even if the city were to find an ideal design which achieves all of these often conflicting goals, the cost to replace the roughly 500,000 boxes across the city would be substantial.

As a result, there is no easy fix here. The city is currently and will continue to look at different design possibilities for the water meter boxes, and the city will respond to 311 requests about missing and broken boxes as quickly as possible.

Muecke gives update on city, county work

Residents have been asking about the survey crew that is working parts of the Free-way Manor and Gulfway Terrace area. The City of Houston CIP (Capital Improvement Projects) program for 2015/2020 will replace/upgrade certain streets, sidewalks, water and street drain lines and sewer lines.

This survey is the preliminary study so that design and engineering can be done. Arlington Heights is also included as a separate CIP. Work on these projects are scheduled for 2017/2018.

This work plus the work that County Commissioner Pct. 2 Jack Morman and HCFCDD is currently doing for the Berry Bayou flood plain, which was reported after the February 28, 2015 flood meeting, will greatly benefit this area that has been having flooding problems for 40+ years. Once this work is completed in 2018 this area will be re evaluated by FEMA and there is a possibility that the cost of flood insurance will drop. This is all very good news. Stay tuned.

June 1 protest deadline for Harris County residential properties

Harris County property owners who believe there is an error in the market value set by the appraisal district have until Monday, June 1, to protest the value of their property.

A green protest form was included in the property value notice the Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD) sent to each property owner in April; however, a Notice of Protest form may be downloaded from the district's website at www.head.org.

There are two ways to find the form on HCAD's home page. It can be found from the top tool bar under Forms > General Information, or from the light blue column on the left in the "Most Requested Forms" box. The Notice of Protest form number is 41-44.

Instructions for filing are located in the upper left corner of the Notice of Protest form. Protests may be filed online, brought to HCAD's office at 13013 Northwest Freeway, or mailed to P.O.

Box 922004, Houston, TX 77292-2004, but must be postmarked by June 1.

Chief Appraiser Sands Stiefer encouraged property owners to use HCAD's online iFile system to submit their protest. The chief appraiser noted that unique iFile numbers are printed on the face of the 2015 value notices near the property account number. Without this number, the iFile system cannot be used for filing a protest for security reasons.

Homeowners who file their protest through the Internet using iFile may also have an opportunity to settle their value online with HCAD's iSettle system. If a settlement through the online system isn't possible, the homeowner will be scheduled for a hearing with the Appraisal Review Board.

A video explaining how to file an online protest and use the residential iSettle system is available on the district's website at www.head.org. Questions concerning iSettle

may be directed to isettle@head.org.

"Texas law requires that property be appraised at its Jan. 1 market value," Stiefer said. "The purpose of the appraisal is to allocate the tax burden fairly among all owners of taxable property. The actual amount of tax due is determined by the tax rate set in the fall by the governing body of each jurisdiction such as county, city, school district or MUD. The appraisal district has no involvement in the rate setting process."

Business personal property and some real property accounts will have later protest deadlines. If a later deadline applies to a particular account, the property owner will be mailed an official HCAD value notice on which the later protest deadline will be listed.

Elected officials speak out

Cornyn: Fall of Ramadi A 'Wake-Up Call' To The Obama Administration

'Administration has taken an approach of paralysis by analysis'

In remarks on the Senate floor today, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, responded to the fall of the Iraqi city of Ramadi by calling on the Obama administration to provide a clear strategy to defeat ISIL.

Excerpts of Cornyn's remarks are below, and video of his speech can be found online.

"I'm frustrated by the president's lack of leadership and by the Obama administration's failure to put together a strong and cohesive strategy to combat ISIL, but it's more serious than that."

"Since ISIL began taking large swaths of territory last summer, this administration has taken an approach of paralysis by analysis. In other words, doing nothing. When they do take action, it seems ad hoc and piecemeal and not driven by overarching objectives or any strategy that is apparent to me."

"Just a few months ago, President Obama claimed ISIL was on the defensive. Well, that's not exactly the case today, nor was it really then. And it's not exactly the picture of the kind of leadership that we need from our commander in chief. By giving our

troops a difficult mission to degrade and ultimately destroy ISIL but not providing them with a strategy and the resources they need to do so, the president is essentially making them operate with one more hand tied behind their back."

"So I hope the president will reconsider after this latest dramatic setback in Ramadi. I hope President Obama will provide us with a strategy to degrade and destroy ISIL."

State Rep. Paul on 84th Legislature

"Last week on the house floor, we passed HB-3310 which seeks to assist public retirement systems with meeting their pension obligations by increasing transparency and providing a way for the system and its sponsoring entity to work together to ensure continued actuarial soundness."

"HB-3310 aims at putting best practices, including disclosure and transparency requirements into law. The bill would require a public retirement system to notify its sponsoring entity upon receiving an actuarial valuation indicating the system's actual contributions are not sufficient to amor-

tize the unfunded actuarial accrued liability within 40 years."

"HB-1965 which is a property tax rollback plan was passed out of the House Ways and Means committee. This legislation will help slow the growth of property tax in the state. We are currently working to get HB-1965 heard on the house floor."

"Currently, there are multiple pieces of legislation I filed being heard in the Senate and hopefully on their way to approval by the governor. To see a full list of legislation filed by me visit the Texas Legislature Online."

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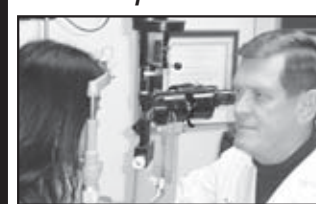

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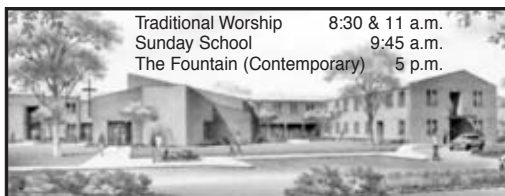

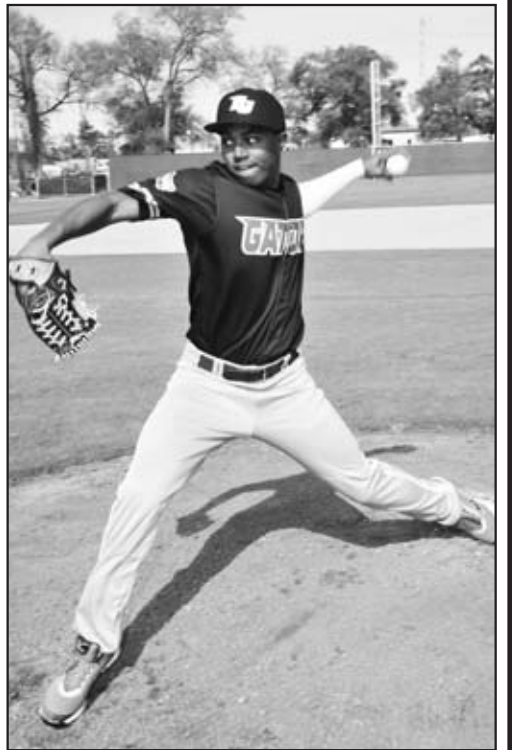

spirit and balanced his academic schedule with his tennis schedule and volunteering work.

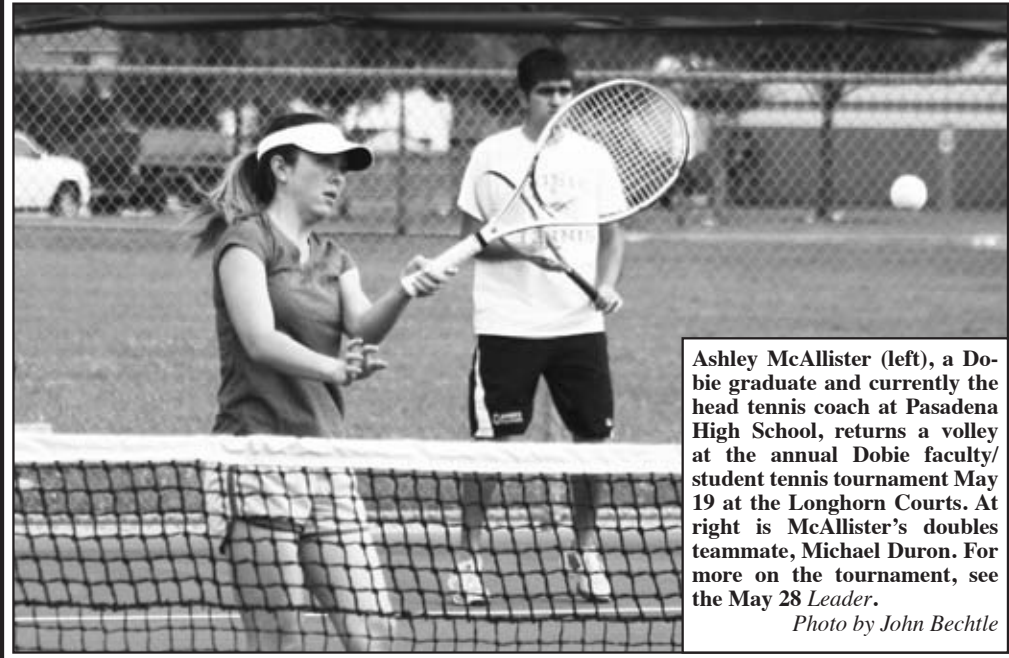

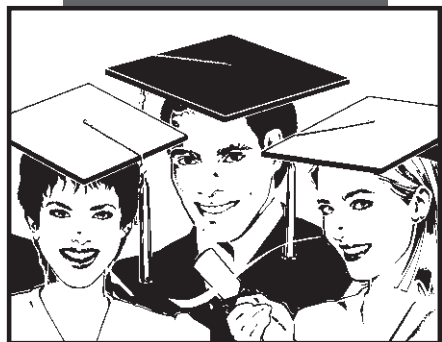

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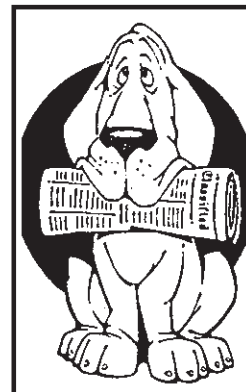
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Pasadena ISD Cup high school athletics championship goes to Dobie

letic office. The district's stated purpose for both the intermediate school (won by Bondy this school year) and high school cup contest is to build rivalries and competition among the district's schools while stressing the importance of both boys' and girls' athletics from a team and individual standpoint.

Team sports included at the high school level include football, basketball, cross-country, track and field, baseball, team tennis, swimming and diving, golf and soccer for the boys.

The included girls' team sports are volleyball, basketball, cross-country, track and field, softball, team tennis, swimming and diving, golf and soccer.

The individual sports that are awarded are boys' and girls' spring tennis, boys' and girls' golf and boys' and girls' track and field.

Using the 2014-2015 school year as an example, district athletic officials award only PISD schools for order of finish in District 22-6A competition.

District champion teams earn 10 points,

while runner-up squads obtain eight points. Six points are earned for third place, and four points for fourth place. Fifth-place teams earn two points.

As for postseason competition, schools are awarded five points for making the playoffs (bidistrict round), 10 points for reaching area, 15 points for a regional semifinal qualification, 20

points for a regional final make, 25 points for a state semifinal and 30 points for a state final.

In the individual points category, athletes can earn 10 points for a 22-6A title, eight points for second place and six points for third.

The same point system also applies for athletes who qualify for any regional and state competi-

tion. The Dobie varsity boys' soccer team was the top earner this season, while a variety of tennis players and track and field

athletes earned valuable points in individual competition as well as swimming.

In the team category,

the Pasadena boys' soccer team advanced the furthest among Pasadena ISD teams, making the regional quarterfinals.

Dobie will hold the Pasadena ISD Cup trophy for this school year until the contest renews for the 2015-2016 school year.

the second-most putouts on the team at 149. He batted .243 with 45 hits and a .353 on-base percentage while scoring 33 runs as a freshman in 2014. His 27 walks last season led the team.

And Reyes was a key contributor as Blinn advanced to the National Junior College Athletic Association's World Series for the first time in 22 seasons.

This year, the Bucs were 28-26, getting eliminated by San Jacinto College in the Region XIV tournament. Reyes hit .213 during the season but continued his outstanding glove work.

He also overcame a nasty hamstring pull that came early in the season, forcing him to miss about 20 games and six weeks of playing time. It simply

was unfortunate, given that Reyes had made huge strides offensively as a freshman.

Reyes began his collegiate career in the No. 9 hole for the Bucs, but McIntyre moved the freshman up in the order as the offense came around.

As a sophomore, Reyes seemed poised for a big year. The hamstring injury stalled that.

"I hit about .330 in the fall and was ready for a big year," Reyes said.

"I actually pulled my hamstring pretty badly. Even when I came back, I was rusty but needed to get back in the lineup after missing so much time. I know it'll all come back."

Now he's headed for Houston where the Cougars are coming off winning the America Baseball Conference crown and certainly hope for more in the postseason. Reyes is confident he can make a difference.

The higher the level of baseball, the fewer promises are made for playing time, etc.

But the Cougars' coaching staff certainly seem to know what they have with Reyes.

"(Assistant coach) Tripp Couch joked with me sometimes during the season that they wish they could borrow me for a weekend, especially with my defense," Reyes said. "But I also know what I can do offensively."

Reyes has already been

working with the strength and conditioning staff at the University of Houston.

He hopes a strict and focused diet will allow him to gain upward of 20 to 25 pounds over the summer and into the fall. Right now, Reyes stands 5-feet-9-inches tall and weighs about 168, having dropped a few pounds during the Blinn season.

"I'm extremely excited to get started," Reyes said of his UH career. "It's so competitive, but that makes you better as a player. If you don't improve every day, someone else will, and there goes your spot."

"At this point, I'm just going to keep playing until I'm told I can't play anymore."

"Hopefully, that's not for a long time. We'll just have to see how things turn out, but whatever the case, it won't be because I didn't work." Off the field, Reyes challenges himself just as much.

He will pursue a bachelor of science degree at the University of Houston. His plan is to become an anesthesiologist one day, but hopefully baseball will hold off those plans for as long as possible.

"I just work hard every day, even when no one is looking," Reyes said.

"Baseball has helped pay for a part of my education. Right now, I just want to play this game as long as possible."
