# FBI files charges against fugitive bank robber

An apparent lone bank robber escaped with an undisclosed amount of money by crawling



press time was still being sought by members of

Matheos Pitikas, 24, a former Dobie student who apparently grew up in the South Belt area, has been named as the alleged armed robber responsible for the Chase Bank robbery in the 11000 block of Beltway 8 Saturday at 1:35 p.m. The crime brought more than 20 vehicles from the Houston Police Department, Constable Gary Freeman and the Harris County Sheriff's Department into the search in addition to the FBI.

According to FBI spokesperson Shauna Dunlap, a warrant has been issued for Pitikas who is being charged with aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon. Although he is still at large, his bail has reportedly been set at \$30,000. The case will be a state, not a county, case.

While the FBI is not releasing all the details

the arrest warrant for Pitikas was a result of a Crime Stopper tip. While the FBI usually investigates bank rob-

beries, the Houston Police Department is also in-

vestigating this case due to the fact that an HPD officer shot his weapon during the chase immediately following the robbery. HPD officer, S. McGee, was first to arrive after the incident. McGee had a good instinct about where the robber might try to hide when he ran

arrived on the scene without a vehicle According to officials on the scene, the robber fled the bank on foot and cut through a backyard of a Sagehollow home which backs up to the bank.

Deputies from the Harris County Precinct 2 Constable's office have stepped up their traffic patrols in the Ashley Pointe subdivision, following complaints of drivers running stop signs in

Concerned resident Glen Muse set up a motion-detecting camera system at the intersection of Katrina Court and Kiley Park to capture traffic offenders. Muse then posted the video footage online and forwarded the link to Precinct 2 Sgt.

Between Thursday, July 16, and Saturday, July 18, Muse recorded 57 vehicles passing through the intersection. Of these, only three or four drivers stopped at the posted stop sign, Muse said. He set his camera system up again Saturday, July

25, between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. This time, only two of 22 recorded drivers bothered to stop at the intersection. "Traffic crime kills more people and cost more

money than any other crime," Muse said. While Muse's residence is in a part of the sub-

division that is still being developed, he said the problem is widespread throughout the neighbor-

Muse fears the worst if residents in the subdivision don't change their driving habits.

"The situation in Ashley Pointe is an auto pedestrian accident involving a child waiting to happen," he said.

# Police seek robbery suspects

Police are seeking the public's assistance in finding three suspects connected to a recent local

Harris County Precinct 2 Constable Deputy Raymon Deleon responded to a call at roughly 6:30 p.m. Monday, July 20, on Sagecastle near Hughes Road, where a woman was robbed at gunpoint

The victim said she was traveling down Blackhawk when she noticed a white Ford Taurus driving closely behind her. Unalarmed, the woman continued driving and turned into the Sagemeadow subdivision, where she was looking at homes for sale. When the woman came to a stop at Sagecastle, the Taurus rear-ended her vehicle.

The woman said two of the Taurus' three occupants got out of the vehicle and acted apologetic. However, when the woman went to check on the condition of her bumper, the back-seat passenger of the Taurus got out and pointed a gun at the woman and demanded her purse.

The suspects are described as being Hispanic and between the ages of 16 and 22 years old. There were two males and one female. The fe-

male was reportedly driving the vehicle Similar incidents have been reported in other parts of the city, but police are not sure if they are related. The constable's office is working closely with the Houston Police Department and the Harris County Sheriff's Office to see if the

robberies are connected to each other. Anyone with information on this case is urged

to call Crime Stoppers at 713-222-TIPS. The previous week, there were at least two other purse robberies in the South Belt area. Precinct 2 Detective Rick Holloman advises all drivers to pay attention and to be aware of their surroundings. When possible, residents should pull into their garages and shut the door before entering their homes. Holloman said anyone who believes they are being followed should immedi-

ately call the police.

### NCSL endorses Public Health Insurance

Recently, the National Conference of State Legisla-

tures' (NCSL) Standing Committee on Health voted to include an amendment calling for a public health insurance option in the committee's official policy recommendations for federal health care reform. As a member of NCSL's Standing Committee on Health, this endorsement was something I, along with the Progressive States Network (PSN) and the White House Working Group of State Legislators for Health Care Reform, advocated for vigorously. The committee's policy recommendation signals emerging state-level consensus behind one of President Barack Obama's top reform priorities.

As state legislators we've made it clear that we're ready to stand together and make sure working families and small businesses are free to choose the best health care available at a price they can afford.

In addition to the public option, the amendment also

strong affordability protections, assistance in expanding Medicaid programs, and freedom for states to set benefit requirements and other regulatory standards that exceed federal minimums. These proposals were included in a letter that PSN, a national group which I co-chair, delivered to the White House and Congress last month pushing for comprehensive health reform within the year
