Gulf Freeway closures set

At least one lane on the northbound frontage road of the Gulf Freeway from FM 517 to FM 518 in League City will be closed daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. through Monday, Sept. 30.

At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to SH 96/League City Parkway will be closed daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Tuesday, Dec. 31. Alternate enrance and exit ramps will be closed.

The northbound exit ramp on the Gulf Freeway between SH 96/League City Parkway and FM 518 will be closed continuously through 9 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 31.

Drivers traveling north on the main lanes will continue to NASA Road 1, exit, then U-turn and come back to FM 518.

The closures are associated with ongoing construction to widen the freeway from three to five lanes in each direction and the frontage roads from two to three lanes in each direction.

Beltway closures planned

There will be a total closure of the westbound Beltway 8 main lanes between SH 35/ Telephone Road and Scott/Cullen between 10 p.m. Friday, Aug. 2, and 5 a.m. Monday, Aug. 5. The construction will also cause the closures of the westbound Pearland Parkway/Monroe entrance ramp and the westbound Mykawa entrance ramp. While construction signs showed a similar closure between Beamer and Blackhawk, that project has been postponed, county officials said.

The eastbound and westbound U-turn lanes at Beltway 8 and Beamer will be closed continuously through 9 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 22.

Both northbound and southbound U-turn lanes at Beltway 8 and Crenshaw will be closed daily from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Friday, Aug. 16.

Both northbound and southbound U-turn lanes at Beltway 8 and Preston will be closed daily, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., through Friday, Aug. 2.

Both northbound and southbound U-turn lanes at Beltway 8 and Vista will be closed daily from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Friday,

At least one alternate lane on the northbound Beltway 8 frontage road from Vista to SH 225 will be closed daily from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and nightly from 8 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Friday, Aug. 30.

There will be a total closure of the northbound Beltway 8 frontage road at SH 225 nightly from 8 p.m. to 5 a.m. through the morning of Monday, Aug. 5. This will affect both the south U-turn lane at SH 225 and the right turn lane at SH 225.

CCISD announces pay increases

The Clear Creek Independent School District has announced a significant compensation package for its nearly 5,000 employees.

The compensation package includes a 4 percent to 9.49 percent pay raise for classroom teachers, counselors, librarians and nurses; competitive hourly rate for school bus drivers; an increase in the district's contribution to employee health care premiums; and an across-the-board 3.5 percent increase for all other employees.

The success of our school district is contingent on recruiting and retaining a high quality

staff," said Dr. Greg Smith, superintendent of schools. "This board-approved compensation package reflects our commitment to our employees and ensures Clear Creek ISD is a destination for those who have a heart for children."

On Monday, July 22, the Clear Creek ISD school board unanimously approved \$11.3 million in direct salary increases for existing employees as well as \$370,000 to offset the rising cost of healthcare premiums for those employees on TRSActive Care. As part of the overall com-Continued on Page 3A



As Harris County continues to make significant progress on protecting our communities from flooding, I wanted to share with you that we have reached another milestone that will bring some overdue relief to families in the Clear Creek watershed. A few weeks ago, Harris County

Commissioners Court approved an agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that begins the construction process to significantly expand the capacity of Clear Creek. This agreement comes after Con-

gress allocated approximately \$187 million toward improvements on Clear Creek in 2018, ensuring it will be fully funded. Clear Creek is one of our most

flood-vulnerable watersheds and after years of repeated flooding I am glad to see this project finally receive the prioritization that it deserves.

The project will widen approximately 15 miles of Clear Creek between State Highway 288 and Dixie Farm Road, widen 5 miles of major tributaries and add 500 acre-feet of in-line detention. Once completed it will remove an estimated 2,100 homes and buildings from the 100-year flood plain. Construction begins this year and will take approximately five years to complete. Additionally, this project will be led

by the Harris County Flood Control District, a first-of-its-kind pilot program with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers which allows for greater management of the construction process by local agencies.
This approach will expedite construc-

tion and allow for more ground-level decision-making. Innovative approaches like this one are vital to moving Harris County closer to its goal of transforming flood vulnerable watersheds like Clear Creek into stronger, more resilient communities. Although we still have much to do,

Harris County is on the right track toward addressing the major threat that flooding poses to our communities and

We will continue to update you as this project moves forward.

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
