Memorial Hermann set to soon merge

Memorial Hermann and Baylor Scott & White Health have approved a letter of intent to merge into a combined system to further strengthen communities, advance the health of Texans and transform the delivery of health care.

Chuck Stokes, president and CEO of Memorial Hermann Health System, will join Jim in the proposed Office of the CEO along with Pete McCanna, president of Baylor Scott & White Health. - Operations: The combined system will have executive and support staff based in Austin, Dallas, Houston and Temple.

- Name: The proposed combined system will have a new name to be determined before closing; however, Baylor Scott & White Health and Memorial Hermann will continue to operate under their strong, highly regarded brands in their respective service areas.

This effort is about two mission-driven organizations building something transformative together. It will be the next chapter in the legacies of service and innovation for both systems.

Now that the letter of intent has been signed, the two teams will begin the due diligence, standard

regulatory review processes and the development of a definitive agreement.

Teacher accused of misconduct

A police investigation is underway following reports of a substitute teacher at Jessup Elementary inappropriately touching multiple female students on Friday, Oct. 5. The PISD Police Department has completed initial interviews with 14 students.

As the next step in the investigative process, several students have been referred to Harris County for forensic interviews. At this time, the PISD Police is not releasing the identity of the accused in an effort to preserve the integrity of its investigation.

According to a FOX 26 news report that interviewed several parents, the male substitute teacher lined up students against a wall and told them to not look back. He reportedly then called multiple girls out one by one, then allegedly touched them, in a manner that made some feel uncomfortable.

Upon hearing of the allegations, Pasadena Independent School District officials immediately fired the substitute teacher. He had been with the district for approximately 17 years, PISD officials said. Additional counselors were made available to students on campus following the alleged incident.

The Harris County Child Protective Services office has also been notified.

Notifications were sent to all parents of students in the substitute teacher's class. Jessup Principal Ryan Pavone personally called the parents of the female students directly affected by the actions.

Pasadena ISD released the following official statement:

"In investigations involving multiple, minor victims, similar to this case, according to PISD officials, it is important that all leads are followed, and all evidence is obtained and preserved so the case can be presented to the District Attorney's office to determine if charges will be filed. If the District Attorney's office files charges in a case, the suspect would then be arrested and his identity made public.

The District is confident in the PISD Police Department's ability to perform a thorough investigation and the District is fully cooperating with the PISD Police Department. Pasadena ISD knows that the police will work to ensure that any wrongdoing is prosecuted to the fullest extent allowed by law. We ask that you continue to remain patient.

The District appreciates the community's support of all students as they work through this process. If anyone believes they have information regarding this investigation, they should call the Pasadena ISD Police Department at 713-740-0200."

This statement was sent out earlier this week: "On Friday afternoon, Oct. 5, 2018, Pasadena ISD received a report of inappropriate conduct at Jessup Elementary by a substitute teacher. Pasadena ISD takes all allegations of misconduct very seriously, and the Pasadena ISD Police Department is actively investigating the former substitute's actions. The substitute is no longer employed by Pasadena ISD.

SJC's Hellyer speaks on college

Groundbreaking event held for engineering/tech building

San Jacinto College Chancellor Dr. Brenda Hellyer spoke at length on the current status of the area school at the annual State of the College event, held Friday, Oct. 5. The event coincided with a groundbreaking ceremony for the south campus's new engineering and technology building.

"There is a transformation taking place at San Jacinto College. Across the country, higher education is changing, and San Jacinto College is no different. We must transform to meet student needs in our classrooms today," Hellyer said, after being introduced by a robot named Mechnoid, which was created by San Jacinto's Artificial Intelligence Lab. "Today, I want to tell you about how we are transforming San Jacinto College and breaking ground in helping students achieve their goals, while providing a skilled workforce for the businesses and industries here

in East Harris County and the Greater Houston region. Through our transformation, San Jacinto College has emerged as a national higher education leader for innovation and student success."

Hellyer thanked the San Jacinto College Foundation for raising and donating money to affected students and staff following Hurricane Harvey.

"Last fall, Hurricane Harvey challenged our entire community, and I want to thank the Foundation board for their leadership in raising funds for students and employees," Hellyer said. "Through the Foundation's efforts, \$286,000 was raised, which provided assistance to 77 employees and 1,404 students. This assistance helped us get employees back to work and students back into the classroom, and I heard continuously that your support made a huge difference."

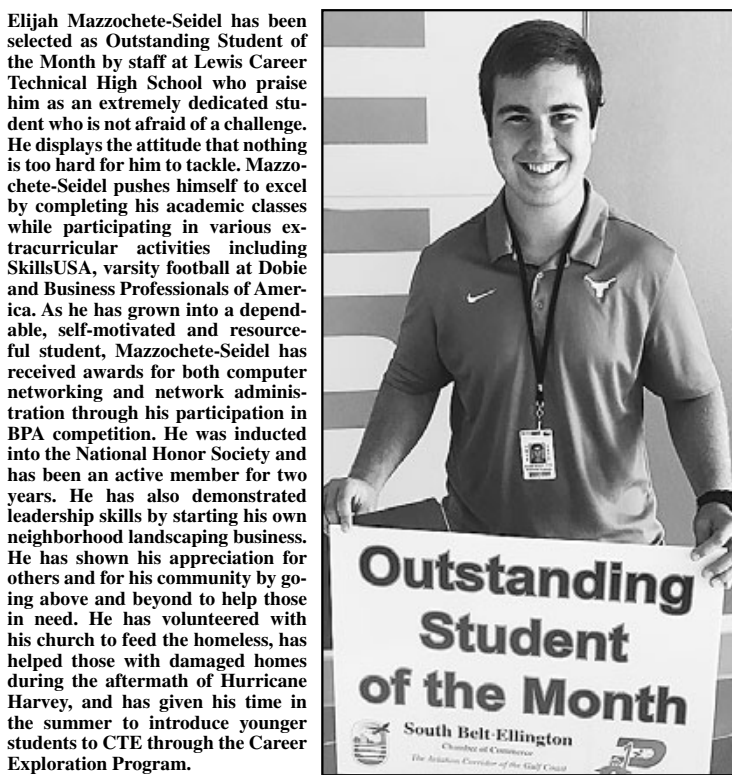

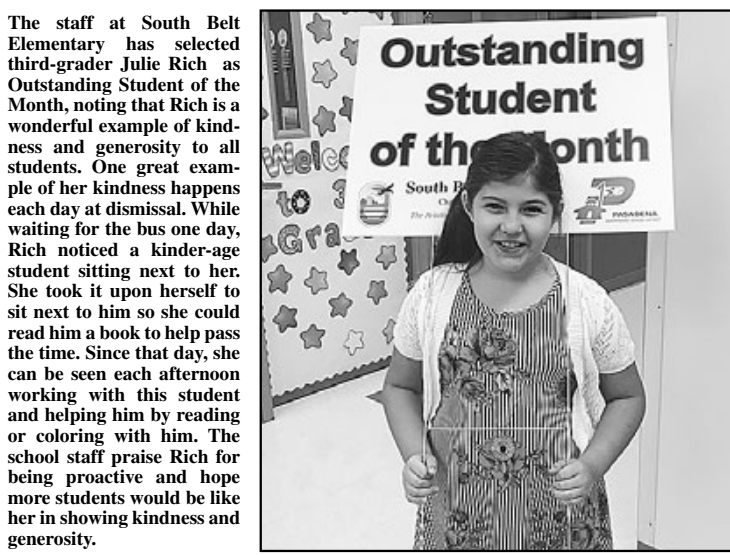

CIS-BA receives \$210,150 grant

Communities In Schools-Bay Area has received a two-year grant from the Rebuild Texas Fund in the amount of \$210,150 to support a pilot project for Clear Creek Independent School District and program expansion in Dickinson Independent School District.

Stephanie Hornung is the Community Partnership Coordinator for the new program which began in August 2018. Hornung previously worked as a CIS-Bay Area coordinator at McWhirter Elementary School.

The Rebuild Texas Fund is a collaborative project of the Michael & Susan Dell Foundation and the OneStar Foundation, established to support the rebuilding efforts in communities affected by Hurricane Harvey. The fund works alongside organizations within the impacted communities to aid

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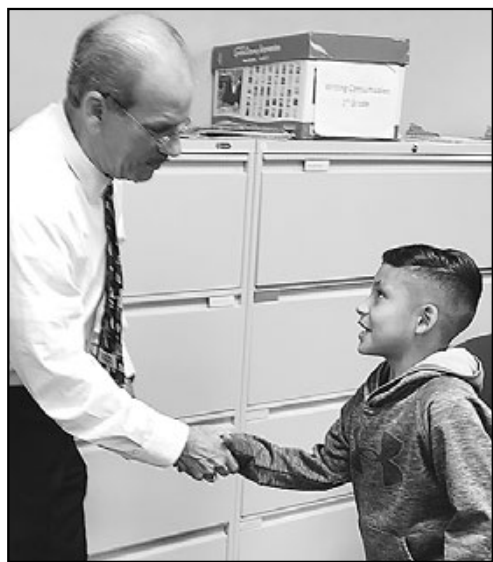

Applicants sought for ARB service

District Judge Robert K. Schaffer, administrative judge for the state district courts in Harris County, is accepting applications from Harris County citizens interested in service on the Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB was created by the Texas Legislature to provide an independent judicial review of taxpayer protests of valuations established by the Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD). Service on the ARB would begin in January 2019. Applications must be submitted by the applicant directly to Judge Schaffer through the HCAD human resources division no later than Oct. 15, in order to be considered. Applications from third parties will not be accepted. A former ARB member who has served three consecutive terms may be reappointed after sitting out a year. The ARB is a citizen board that sits in panels of three to hear testimony and review evidence in order to determine property owner protests which cannot be resolved informally with HCAD. Service on the review board does not constitute a full-time job, but members are compensated per diem when conducting hearings and attending ARB meetings. ARB members are required to attend ARB meetings in addition to serving on panels for actual ARB hearings. Review board service is generally a full-time commitment during the summer and fall months and requires members to be available to serve all day, every weekday and several Saturdays from May through September. Weekday hearings are also held throughout the year. ARB members are not always scheduled every day, but must be available to serve if needed. Candidates for the ARB must be current residents of Harris County, having resided in the county for at least two years; must be up to date on property tax payments for property in Texas or show the tax is being paid under an installment agreement; and, must not have served on the ARB for at least a year if they have served for all or part of three consecutive terms. Persons who fall into any of the following categories are not eligible to serve:

1. An individual currently employed by the State Comptroller of Public Accounts, or who is a member of the governing body, an officer, or a full- or part-time employee of a county, city, school district, community college district, MUD, or any other entity supported by local property taxes. Former governing body members, or officers of a taxing unit served by HCAD, are ineligible for four full years from the date they ceased to serve in that capacity.
2. Anyone who personally, or whose spouse personally, has a contract with local government or an appraisal district. The same restriction applies if the person, or his or her spouse, owns a 10 percent or greater interest in a business which contracts with a local government or appraisal district.
3. Persons who have appeared before the ARB for compensation as a tax consultant, accountant, appraiser, or representative of a property owner less than two years before the date the person is appointed.
4. Any individual who has ever been employed by HCAD or has ever served as a member of the district's board of directors.
5. Applicants who are presently under indictment or have previously been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude.

Applicants selected as finalists will be scheduled for interviews. Current application forms are available at www.head.org. Only current application forms from this site will be considered. San Jac breaks ground on engineering center

San Jacinto College broke ground on a new 74,000-square-foot Center for Engineering and Technology on Friday, Oct. 5.

According to the Texas Workforce Commission, the need for engineers in all disciplines along the Texas Gulf Coast is expected to increase through 2024.

In a January 2018 report from WalletHub.com, Houston was ranked 21st on the list of best cities in the U.S. for STEM jobs.

The new Center for Engineering and Technology at San Jacinto College will house programs in engineer-

ing, engineering technology, biomedical equipment repair technology, engineering design graphics, electronics and computer information technology.

A groundbreaking event for the \$27.7 million facility was held Friday, Oct. 5.

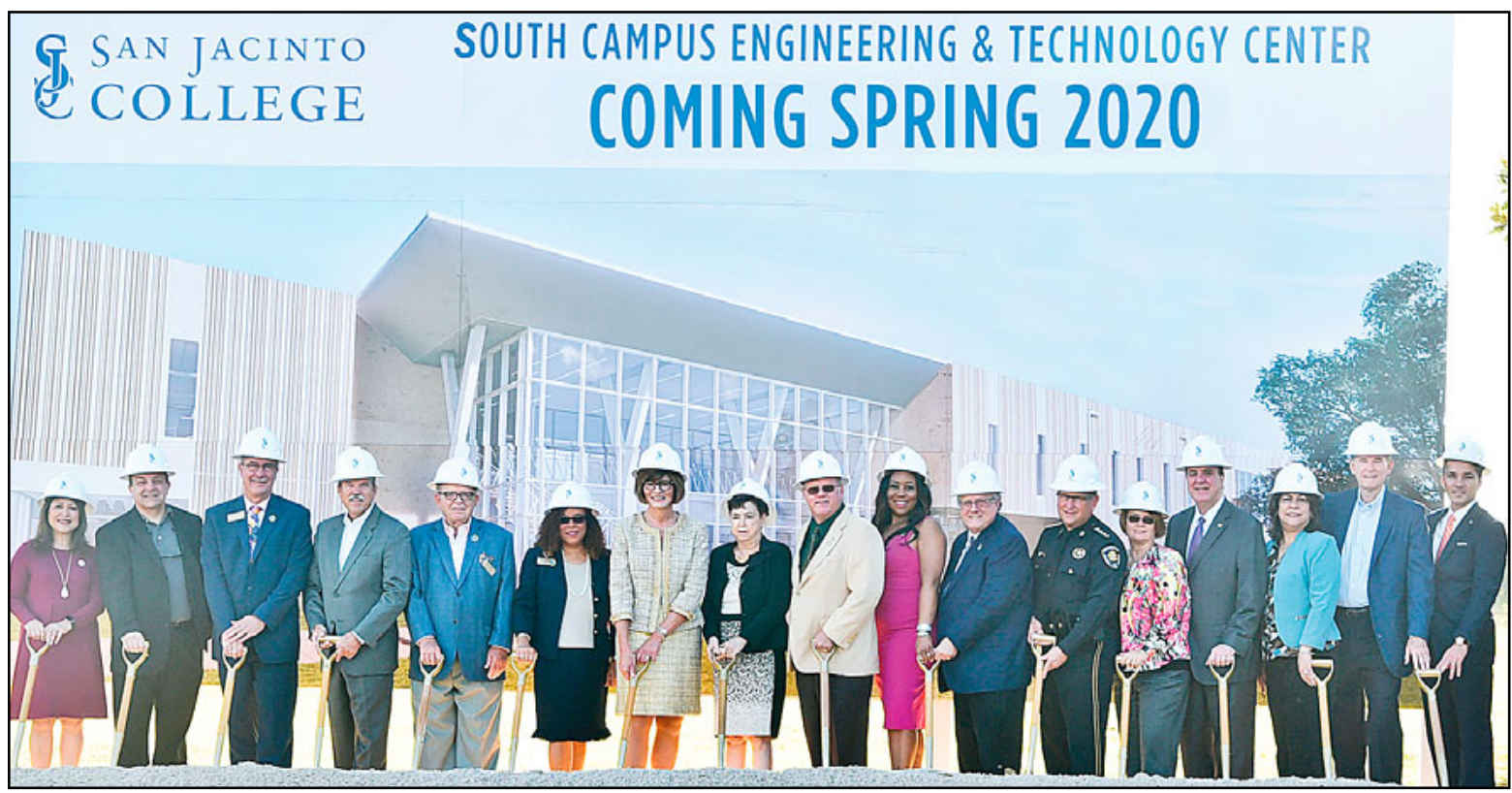
The architect is Kirksey, and the contractor is Tellepsen Builders. The center is expected to open in spring 2020.

The demand for qualified engineers in the Houston region remains high. The Greater Houston Partnership says that among metro areas with at least 15,000 engi-

neers, Houston has the fifth highest concentration of engineers in the United States.

Overall, Houston metro has the third largest number of engineers in the country. The San Jacinto College engineering program has seen a 108 percent enrollment increase since the 2015 semester.

The college's associate degree allows students to seamlessly transfer to a university engineering program, and holds articulation agreements with the University of Houston Cullen College of Engineering, Texas Tech University and University of Texas at Tyler.

The chancellor noted that San Jac has again been nominated for the Aspen Institute for Community College Excellence award. This marked the second consecutive time the college has been nominated for the prestigious award.

"We did it again," said Hellyer. "We are very excited to announce that the Aspen Institute has begun its 2019 Aspen award competition, and we made the top-10 list again."

To put this in perspective, the Aspen prize is the Academy Awards of community college higher education. The difference is that once we become the top college in the nation, we will not be eligible for the award again."

The local community college has continued to grow in size. Over the last 10 years, the number of San Jac students has jumped from 2,482 to 5,823, according to Hellyer. The number of credentials awarded has also increased by 160 percent, over the same time period, Hellyer said.

The 74,000-square-foot Center for Engineering and Technology will provide training in areas that are in high demand and expected to grow even more in the coming years.

"Engineering and technology careers are some of the hottest in the Houston market," Hellyer said. "The demand for qualified engineers in the Houston region remains high. The Greater Houston Partnership says that among metro areas with at least 15,000 engineers, Houston has the fifth highest concentration of engineers in the United States. Overall, Houston metro has the third largest number of engineers in the country." The center is expected to open by spring 2020.

Construction of the cosmetology center is already underway. This is a \$15.8 million project for a new 39,000-square-foot facility that will provide the latest in updated classrooms and modern labs to enhance the workforce training for those interested in a cosmetology or massage therapy career. The center is also slated to be completed in the spring of 2020.

School-record 70 points lifts Berneathy's Bunch past Humble

His team is preparing to play the school's biggest football game of the season against a talented Kingwood program, and there is plenty of excitement surrounding a suddenly resurgent Dobie program, yet first-year head coach

Kevin Berneathy is trying to keep things as normal as possible.

Thanks to a program-record 70-point outburst, the Longhorns delivered their faithful fans a big finish to homecoming week, downing Humble 70-20 while posting 637 yards of offense along the

way.

Now 4-1 overall and 2-1 in District 22-6A play, the Longhorns have an opportunity to take a major step toward a possible postseason berth by beating Kingwood.

For Berneathy, it's simply a matter of taking things week by week.

"I think we realize how big this game is, but we look at it as having 10 opportunities to prove

ourselves in the regular season, and this is just another one of those opportunities," Berneathy said.

"But we also realize that not a lot of people are picking us to win this game, so I would think our guys would use that as a motivation to go out and prove who we are and what we've been able to get done.

"At the end of the day, we still feel like we have to prove who we are."

For at least one night against Humble, the Longhorns certainly proved who they are. The locals led just 7-0 after a quarter of play but then erupted for 26 points in the second quarter and 28 more in the third quarter to rout the Wildcats.

Every Dobie ball carrier was limited to a handful of touches due to the score, but all produced at a high level.

Sophomore Darius Hale, now the district's second-leading rusher with 676 yards (10.09 yards per carry) on the ground, had 172 on just 10 carries and had touchdown bursts of 14 and 71 yards.

Senior and four-year starter Kris Morris added 165 yards on seven carries and scored on runs of 83, 26 and eight yards. He also reeled in a 30-yard scoring pass from receiver Johnathan Baldwin as the locals hit Humble with a bit of razzle-dazzle.

For style points, Morris was also crowned as the school's homecoming

king at halftime (see more on Page 1A.).

For Morris, that's 603 yards rushing this season, which has him third in the district just behind Hale. Morris also leads the league with 11 touch-

downs, including 10 on the ground.

Dontavion Crosby ran the ball another nine times against the Wildcats, producing 86 yards, including a 43-yard touchdown run.

Of utmost importance, the Wolverines were able to get back in the mix in

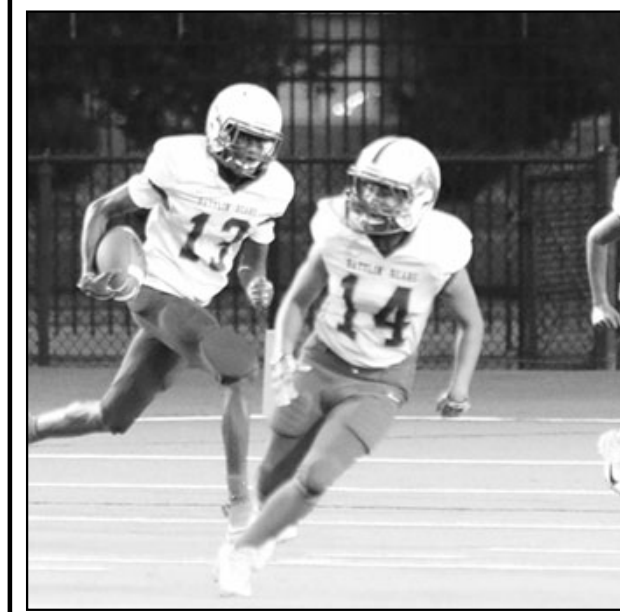
the District 24-6A standings with the victory, getting to 1-1.

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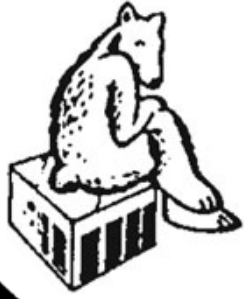
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Dobie hammers Humble, preps for big one against Kingwood

Jesse Mitchell, a defensive starter, got his chance on offense late in the third quarter and went 60 yards for a touchdown.

Then there was Jace Young, who scored on an 11-yard run midway through the fourth quarter.

Quarterback Noah Roman continued to run the offense at a high efficiency for the Longhorns, and found time to get in on the scoring act with a 40-yard touchdown strike to Jeremiah Ballard in the third quarter.

For Ballard, that's three touchdown grabs this season.

What will give?

So something has to give as Dobie tries to inch closer to a postseason berth when it hosts Kingwood Oct. 12, at Pasadena ISD's Veterans Stadium.

Dobie, which set an all-time program record by scoring 70 points in its win over Humble, has now scored 132 points in its previous two games.

While winning four of five games to this point, Dobie has scored 212 points and is well within reach of the program's regular-season best of 355 points, posted by the 1999 team.

That same 1999 team,

which went 12-1 on the season, wound up scoring 413 points over 13 games.

The point production delivered by the current 2018 bunch has been impressive, but now comes Kingwood, which has now logged 13 consecutive scoreless quarters on defense.

The Mustangs lead 22-6A in total defense, allowing just 226 yards per game. Dobie is No. 2 at 243 yards per game.

But Dobie has now rushed for a league-high 2,005 yards this season and has produced 2,287 yards total.

Will Kingwood's defense do what it does best, or will the Longhorns rush past yet another tough foe?

"Kingwood is a very good football program," Berneathy said. "Offensively, they try to catch you out of position and then exploit that."

"It all comes down to execution. Being lined up right and following our cues really boils down to execution and making plays."

Against Humble, Dobie allowed the district's leading rusher, Isaiah Robinson, to get free on touchdown runs of 49 and 56 yards as part of a 177-yard

night. Berneathy blamed missed tackles.

"Whether you are a starter, second-string or third-string, you have to make the tackle when the opportunity comes," Berneathy said.

"There were some missed tackles on (Robinson), and we have to clean that up. Overall, though, the defense has continued to play with great effort."

The Longhorns' Javen Sanchez had a pair of sacks in the game, including one that nearly resulted in a safety.

Julius Wells also caused a fumble that was recovered by Michael Onozie. And all of it was performed in front of possibly the largest Dobie crowd in years.

"It was a terrific turnout for the guys, and we all appreciate it," Berneathy said.

"We certainly hope to see more and more Dobie fans come out to the game. This is a big one against Kingwood, and we would love to see another packed house."

Success is sustainable

Berneathy admits he has been pleased with the way the Longhorns have been able to perform in his version of a veer-style offense that few programs

employ. As the offensive coordinator at Angleton last season, Berneathy oversaw an offense that

featured current University of Texas freshman safety B.J. Foster at tailback.

The Wildcats reeled

off 13 consecutive wins to claim the Region IV championship before a state semifinal loss to

Manvel. Angleton six times scored more than 60 points and defeated Highlands in the playoffs by

scoring 79 points. "This offense is proven in my opinion," Berneathy said.

"It's all about discipline

in your role, a high level of physicality and execution. I knew that this offense could succeed."
