Sex offender arrested Oct. 12

Personnel from the Harris County Pct. 2 Constable office on Monday, Oct. 12, assisted U.S. marshals in the arrest of an alleged sex offender in the 11600 block of Chickwood. Led by the federal Gulf Coast Violent Offenders Task Force, the law enforcement team was serving a warrant out of Travis County for aggravated sexual assault of a child. The suspect, David Nguyen, was arrested without incident. Nguyen, 73, was transported to the Pasadena Police Department jail, where he was turned over to the Marshals Task Force.

COVID numbers decrease

At press time Wednesday, Oct. 14, a total of 63 South Belt residents had been confirmed dead from COVID-19, according to Harris County officials. That number is up seven from the previous week. Reporting of deaths related to COVID-19, however, may be delayed by local officials. Of the 2,003 confirmed cases in 77089, 334 remain active, while 1,644 have recovered from the virus. To date, 25 from the ZIP code have died from the disease - up three from last week. In 77075, 455 of the 1,547 confirmed cases remain active, while 1,071 have recovered. A total of 21 from the ZIP code have died - up two from last week. Of the 1,749 confirmed cases in 77034, 542 remain active, while 1,190 have recovered. To date, 17 residents from ZIP code 77034 have died from the disease, up two from the previous week. According to Harris County Public Health officials, the vast majority of the fatalities suffered from pre-existing health issues. Countywide, there are 151,880 total confirmed cases. Of those, 127,860 have recovered from the disease, while 21,927 cases remain active. A total of 2,087 deaths have been reported in Harris County.

At least one lane of the northbound and southbound entrance ramp from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to SH 96 and exit ramp from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to SH 96 will be closed nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Thursday, Dec. 31.

Voting drop-off locations on, then off

State regulations regarding absentee voting continue to cause confusion, as a federal appeals court recently reinstated a measure that limits ballot drop-off locations to only one per county. The three-judge panel overturned a decision made by a federal court the previous week that ruled counties could reopen multiple such sites per jurisdiction.

CCISD board election underway

In addition to the highly publicized presidential and congressional races scheduled for Nov. 3, Clear Creek ISD will also hold an election, allowing some South Belt residents to decide who will fill two board positions.

Up for a vote are the District 2 position currently held by incumbent Win Weber and the District 3 position currently held by incumbent Arturo Sanchez. Both incumbents have filed to maintain their positions.

Challenging Weber are Michelle M. Davis and Will Stromeier. Davis is a former mortgage banker, while Stromeier is an insurance claims agent. Both candidates have longstanding ties to the District 2 community.

DA charges local for having handgun

The Harris County District Attorney's Office has ruled on an alleged sexual assault case reported on in the Oct. 8 edition of the Leader, with fewer charges being filed than expected, none involving assault.

Timothy Aiden Wright, 23, was charged with illegally carrying a handgun in a motor vehicle. Acting on information provided by Precinct 2 officials, the Leader had originally reported that Wright was expected to face additional charges for sexual misconduct and marijuana possession.

According to sources familiar with the case, deputies were initially dispatched to investigate an alleged sexual assault of a child that took

County records show that Wright was already out on bond at the time of the incident for possession of an improvised firearm - or zip gun - a felony in Texas.

Couple dies in Space Center accident

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash that killed a man and woman in the 19500 block of Space Center Boulevard that occurred about 1:45 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 10. The identities of the male victim, 28, and the female victim, 29, are pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

According to police, the male victim was driving a black Chevrolet Malibu northwest on Space Center Boulevard when he failed to maintain a

ipating in extracurricular activities, Pasadena ISD officials said. At the beginning of this semester, approximately 35 percent of students had selected to return to in-campus instruction.

The lone active case in the South Belt community involves a student at Atkinson Elementary. Other local cases had previously been discovered at Dobie High School (two students and two staff); Thompson Intermediate (one student and one staff); Morris Middle School (one staff); Burnett Elementary (one staff); Frazier Elementary (one staff); and Stuchberry Elementary (one staff).

Dr. DeeAnn Powell, Pasadena ISD Superintendent said all local cases were believed to have been contracted outside campus, according to district contact tracers.

Counting those who have recovered from the disease, Pasadena ISD officials report a total of 91 COVID-19 cases this semester, including 57 staff

members and 34 students. See accompanying chart on this page.

Clear Creek ISD

As with Pasadena ISD, the Clear Creek Independent School District is also reporting fewer COVID-19 cases than many parents and teachers had originally feared, with none being reported in the immediate South Belt area.

In all, the school district is reporting 14 active cases, including 10 students and four staff members. The district's statistics include only the 26,572 students enrolled in its brick-and-mortar instruction program.

One Clear Brook High School student had contracted the disease but has since recovered.

Flood Control meets on new retention

The Harris County Flood Control District will hold a virtual Community Engagement Meeting for the Hughes Stormwater Detention Basin Wednesday, Oct. 21, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The purpose of this meeting is to inform residents about the status of the Hughes Stormwater Detention Basin and share project information with residents.

The Hughes Stormwater Detention Basin project focuses on mitigating flood risks in the Clear Creek watershed by storing excess floodwater during times of heavy rain, and releasing it into the channel once the threat of flooding has passed.

The basin will be located on an undeveloped 100-acre site along Clear Creek, south of El Franco Lee Park.

This project complements but is separate from the Clear Creek Federal Flood Risk Management Project.

This \$5.2 million endeavor will be funded

with bonds approved by Harris County voters on Aug. 25, 2018. Community engagement is an important component of the bond program, and resident participation is encouraged.

The meeting will begin with a brief presentation to share project updates, followed by a moderated Q&A session with Flood Control District team members.

Residents will be able to submit questions and comments throughout the presentation. Any comments not addressed during the Q&A session will receive a response after the event.

A recorded version of the meeting will be available on the Flood Control District's website and YouTube channel after the event.

San Jac, CCISD lower tax rates

The Clear Creek Independent School District Board of Trustees at its September meeting unanimously voted to lower the district's tax rate by three cents.

Over the past two years, Clear Creek has lowered its tax rate by 13 cents. The 2020 adopted total tax rate of \$1.2659 consists of a maintenance and operations tax rate of \$0.9359 per \$100 of taxable value and an interest and sinking tax rate of \$0.33 per \$100 of taxable value.

In the meantime, Clear Creek Independent School District officials announced that the district received a rating of "A" for "Superior Achievement" under the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas for the state's schools. The "Superior Achievement" rating is the state's highest, demonstrating the quality of Clear Creek ISD's financial management and reporting system.

"We are very pleased with Clear Creek ISD's School FIRST rating," said Clear Creek ISD Superintendent Dr. Greg Smith. "This rating shows that our district is making the most of our taxpayers' dollars."

This rating shows that Clear Creek ISD's schools are accountable not only for student learning, but also for achieving these results cost-effectively and efficiently."

Nov. 3 early voting runs to Oct. 30

Early voting for the Nov. 3 general election began Oct. 13 and will continue through Oct. 30.

While some traditional early voting locations will remain in place, the county has added several new ones, including several drive-thru sites.

Nearby traditional early voting locations include the Harris County annex at 10851 Scarsdale and Beamer and the east Harris County Activity Center at 7340 Spencer Highway in Pasadena. The Pasadena site will be one of six to be open 24 hours on Oct. 29 - a first for the county.

New early polling locations include the El Franco Lee Community Center, 9500 Hall Road; the Multi-Cultural Center - Banquet Hall, 951 Tristar Drive in Webster; and the BakerRipley Cleveland Neighborhood Center - Gym, 720 Fairmont Parkway in Pasadena.

Due to the current COVID-19 pandemic, the county will have 11 drive-thru early voting sites this election, including one at NRG Stadium. The closest to the South Belt area is the John Phelps

Courthouse, 101 S. Richey St. in Pasadena.

Residents may cast their ballots at any early polling location. Harris County residents may also now vote at any polling location on Election Day.

Polling hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Oct. 15 - Oct. 17; noon to 7 p.m. Oct. 18; 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Oct. 19 - Oct. 24; noon to 7 p.m. Oct. 25; 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Oct. 26; 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Oct. 27-Oct. 29 (24 hours at certain locations); and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Oct. 30.

Early voting starts off with big crowd



Many South Belt residents were lined up for early voting at the Harris County annex at Scarsdale and Beamer by 6:30 a.m. Tuesday morning. In fact, the voting was so heavy by 9 a.m. that some of those who had been in line since 6:30 a.m. had to leave for other commitments before getting to vote. The line went all the way across the southern parking lot and snaked around in a double line. Many complained of being unable to find a parking space. A record number of voters went to the polls in Harris County the first day of early voting. At the Scarsdale location, 1,237 people voted on Tuesday. At the El Franco Lee location, 1,075 voters cast their ballot. Some South Belters waited three hours in line to vote on Tuesday. Lines at El Franco Lee Park reportedly moved much faster than at Scarsdale.

Burleigh on upcoming Medicare changes

Medicare Annual Enrollment Begins TODAY (October 15) and ENDS on December 7th – Are you ready? It is hard to believe a year has passed since last Annual Enrollment – and what a year it has been!

There are many first-time changes to the Medicare Program for 2021 – here some of the highlights:

Corona Virus Testing and Coverage – Many plans are offering \$0 copayment for COVID-19 testing and treatment during and after the Public Health Emergency (PHE). During the PHE, plans may offer mental health and psychiatric telehealth services with network providers. Some companies will be sending out COVID supply kits that include items useful for preventing the spread of COVID-19 and other viruses.

The Part D Senior Savings Model or the Insulin Savings Program – Medicare Advantage and Part D plans that participate in Senior Savings Model will waive deductible, and gap increases by offering insulin year round at a copayment of no more than \$35 per month. This will save some diabetic Medicare beneficiaries hundreds, if not thousands of dollars per year.

ESRD now accepted by Medicare Advantage – Medicare beneficiaries with ESRD (End Stage Renal Disease) will now have access to more affordable Medicare coverage through a Medicare Advantage Plan. Coverage can no longer be denied.

Telehealth and other Virtual Services – Many companies now offer expanded telehealth and virtual services includ-

ing primary care, specialist care, mental healthcare and more. Chronic Health Plans – Medicare Advantage Special Needs plans that insure those with certain chronic health conditions may offer non-primarily health related benefits such as pest control, home cleaning, meal delivery and non-medical transportation. Other improvements include – Acupuncture –12 visits every 90 days will be covered as a treatment for chronic back pain.

Some Medicare Advantage plans will offer increased access to palliative care and integrated hospice care. Extra health-care benefits such as adult day health services and caregiver support may now be provided by some plans.

Some Good Advice – Advertisements -Do NOT believe everything you hear or read in advertisements. If you are Medicare eligible and watch TV, listen to the radio, or check your mailbox you will be inundated with tons of promises and claims from the many and various Medicare plans. Be sure to “look under the hood” – often times the great things boasted of do not tell the whole story.

No Solicitation –The Center for Medicare and Medicaid services has a very strict and enforceable no solicitation policy, however and unfortunately, many agents and agencies do not adhere to this policy. If someone is calling you without your permission, hang up or get their information and report them to Medicare. I have heard that some agents are as bold as to knock door to door which is strictly prohibited.

Educate yourself -By now you should have received two very important books in the U.S. Mail (or electronically if you opted to receive information electronically). The

Medicare and You 2021 handbook and your ANOC (Annual Notice of Change).

The Medicare and You Handbook is over 120 pages long this year. This is your “Bible” for the Medicare program. Whether or not you read it, keep it on hand in case you need to look something up during the year. The ANOC contains a comparison chart of the plan changes for 2020

to 2021. Be sure to read at least this part these to avoid surprises in the new year.

Work with an Agent. There is never a charge to work with an insurance agent (whether you decide to do business with them or not). A trusted insurance agent can help guide you through the very detailed and complex world of Medicare.

take extra care to strengthen ballot security protocols throughout the state,” Abbott said at the time of the initial order.

“These enhanced security protocols will ensure greater transparency and will help stop attempts at illegal voting.”

This was strongly rebuked by Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo.

“The strength of our democracy and our county is only as strong as our ability to support free, fair and open elections,” Hidalgo said.

“Geographically, Harris County is larger than the entire state of Rhode Island. Our population rivals that of the entire state of Colorado. To propose only a single, secure drop-off location for a county

of our size during a pandemic is ludicrous.

“Simply put, mail-ballot voters should not be forced to drive 30 miles to drop off their ballot, or be limited to relying primarily on a mail system that’s facing cutbacks.

“Gov. Abbott’s move is transparently about suppression, not security.”

“It is also part of a broader effort by the Trump Administration to confuse voters, discourage voter participation and degrade public confidence in our elections.”

Harris County had previously had 12 such locations, all but one of which (NRG Stadium) were local county clerk annexes.

The lone drop-off site for Harris County, which encompasses nearly 2,000 square miles, will now be NRG Sta-

dium. To be eligible to vote by mail in Texas, a voter has to be 65 years or older; have a disability or illness; be out of the county during the election period; or be confined in jail, with no conviction.

Voters can go to www.harrisvotes.com to print out the application or call 713-755-6965 to request one. The last day to request an absentee ballot by mail for the Nov. 3 election is Oct. 23 (received, not postmarked).

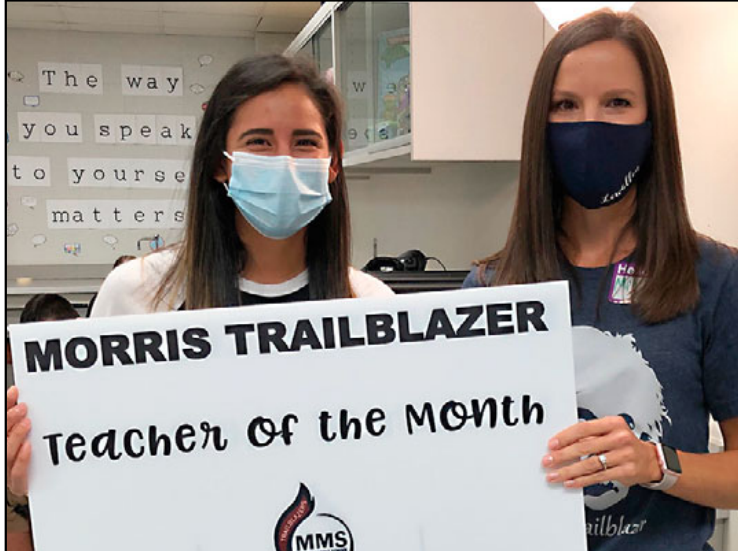

for 38 yards and a touchdown. Jaysen Price added a 45-yard touchdown run early in the second quarter for a 12-0 lead. Jarren Harbin reeled in a 27-yard scoring pass from McCalister as the Wolverines led 18-0 at halftime.

Price wrapped up the scoring with a 16-yard touchdown catch early in the fourth quarter. He had four catches for 55 yards in the game.

The Wolverine defense allowed just 127 total yards to the Falcons, with Deven Arevalo coming up with an interception.

It was far from perfect for the winners, who went 0 for 4 on conversion tries while attempting two kicks, a pass and a run. The Wolverines will be in the mood for a big celebration Oct. 15 against Clear Falls as the school celebrates homecoming.

For Brook on the field, a win would represent a giant step toward a postseason berth.

Clear Brook graduate Caleb Chapman delivered a statement performance as he helped the Texas A&M Aggies defeat No. 4 Florida 41-38 Oct. 10 in College Station.

Chapman, now a sophomore with the Aggies, had nine catches for 151 yards and two scores, including a late 51-yard scoring grab from quarterback Kellen Mond as the Aggies delivered perhaps their biggest victory in the head coach Jimbo Fisher era.

But Chapman's three-year stay in College Station has been plagued by injury, and he sustained what appeared to be knee injury on the touchdown catch that ended his day
