tionship with the area college, Hellyer refrained from endorsing Mims - or any other candidate as it's the college's policy to not do so due to possible conflicts of interest. Hellyer released the following statement:

'An article printed in the October 9, 2025, issue of the South Belt Ellington Leader erroneously reported that I have endorsed Dan Mims for U.S. Congress. I want to be clear; this is false. As Chancellor of San Jacinto College, where Mr. Mims serves in an elected position as Chair of the Board of Trustees, I cannot, should not, and

do not use my position to endorse any candi-

quote for the article, nor was there a campaign event held at San Jacinto College. "My focus is and always has been to the stu-

dents, employees, and communities we serve at San Jacinto College. I remain committed to working with all elected officials to ensure that our students can complete their certificates or degrees, and that our communities are better places to live, work and play because of the work we do at San Jacinto College. Mims also stressed the importance of keeping

the college out of politics.

"I have been intentionally keeping my campaign separate from the college," Mims said in a statement. "Dr. Hellyer has not endorsed my candidacy, nor have I requested her endorsement. I respect Dr. Hellyer's role as college chancellor and the need for both Dr. Hellyer and San Jacinto College to not get involved in political races."

Daniel: Restoring accountability and modernization to Harris County DCO

Harris County stands at a turning point. With a looming \$275 million budget shortfall, new state mandates for court modernization, and a public growing increasingly frustrated with inefficiency, the need for steady, experienced leadership in the District Clerk's office has never been greater. Residents deserve an office that works as promised and one that is both reliable in its daily operations and visionary in preparing for the future.

The District Clerk's office is the engine room of the court system. Records must be accurate, filings must be handled quickly, and services must be accessible to judges, attorneys, and citizens alike. When the office falters, the ripple effects delay justice, strain courtrooms, and erode public trust.

Proven leadership matters. During my previous two terms as Harris County District Clerk, the office operated under three consecutive hiring freezes yet avoided a single layoff. When Hurricane Harvey devastated the county, systems already in place preserved vital records and enabled services to resume faster than expected. These measures demonstrated what foresight and disciplined management can accomplish, even un-

The challenges today are even more demanding. State directives now require comprehensive modernization of record-keeping and e-filing. Budget constraints threaten the capacity to implement new systems effectively. And the public, rightfully skeptical of business as usual, expects results, not excuses. Meeting these challenges requires three interlocking commitments of fiscal discipline, targeted technology upgrades, and unshakable accountability. First, fiscal discipline must be re-

stored. Every taxpayer dollar should be

treated as a trust, not a blank check That means cutting waste, prioritizing mission-critical systems, and balancing the budget without relying on gimmicks or deficit spending. Harris County cannot afford to let inefficiencies drain resources while essential services are neglected.

Second, modernization must be both real and practical. Upgrading technology is not about chasing trends but about ensuring resilience, speed, and access. A robust e-filing system, disaster-proof records infrastructure, and user-friendly platforms for the public are necessities, not a luxury. When state mandates arrive, Harris County should be ahead of the curve, not scrambling to comply.

Finally, accountability must be restored as the foundation of public service. The District Clerk's office must deliver on its promises and operate with complete transparency. Citizens, legal professionals, and staff must know that ning.

As we get closer to November, I hacklogs will not be tolerated, that timelines will be honored, and that the courthouse is working for the people it serves.

We are talking about fairness and trust. The residents of Harris County deserve a court system that is modern, reliable, and transparent. They deserve a District Clerk's office that operates efficiently in times of crisis and day-to-day, that prioritizes service over politics, and that never forgets its responsibility to the

My record shows what is possible when competence meets commitment. That same proven leadership offers a roadmap for moving Harris County from a culture of delay and disruption to a model of efficiency and reliability.

The future of Harris County's courts depends on leadership that understands the stakes and is prepared to act decisively. With disciplined budgeting, modernized systems, and unwavering accountability, the District Clerk's office can once again earn the trust of the people it

Residents are demanding a government that delivers results. Harris County cannot afford anything less.


