At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to SH 96/League City Parkway will be closed daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Monday, Dec. 31. Alternate entrance and exit ramps will be closed.

## Woman targeted near Scarsdale bank

A woman's purse was stolen from the seat of her vehicle the morning of Thursday, Oct. 11, after she left the Chase Bank in the 10900 block of Scarsdale at Beamer.

In the Aug. 18 incident, an off-duty deputy was able to apprehend one of the suspects involved.

This marked at least the third time that such a crime, referred to as "jugging" by law enforcement, has happened in approximately two months, with similar incidents taking place on both Saturday, Aug. 18, and Saturday, Aug. 25.

The frequency of the events, in fact, prompted management of the commercial strip center to recently host a meeting to warn residents of the possible dangers associated with such crimes.

## City work begins on Hall Road

Construction of a new storm sewer system on Hall Road between Sagepark and Sagewillow will take place in the next few weeks.

The proposed new tree locations will be staked, and then the new tree locations will be approved by the Sagemont Civic Club and the City of Houston Senior Superintendent of Forestry.

New lines will be installed in the grassy area between Hall Road's existing pavement and the south right-of-way line. Three existing trees will need to be removed to make way for the new storm sewer. The City of Houston is paying for 20 new 3-inch diameter trees to be planted along Hall Road and in the Sagemont area within public right-of-way.

Dobie9 donates to Michael victims

In addition to the contests for governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general, voters will decide on multiple congressional and legislative seats.

Administrators from the recently opened Dobie9 campus are leading a charge to collect items to donate to victims of Hurricane Michael in Panama City Beach, Fla. In the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, residents of Panama City Beach generously donated a tractor trailer full of supplies to the South Belt community, and school officials are now looking to reciprocate the gesture.

In the hotly contested race for U.S. senator, Republican incumbent Ted Cruz will face Democratic challenger Beto O'Rourke. Currently serving as a U.S. representative for Texas' 16th congressional district in the El Paso area, O'Rourke has been showing well in recent polls, often scoring within the margin of error. Libertarian Neil Dikeman is running as a third-party candidate.

"This community sent South Belt an 18-wheeler full of supplies," said Dobie9 Assistant Principal Adriana Robinson. "Let's repay the kindness."

In the U.S. House District 22 race, Republican incumbent Pete Olson is running against

## New construction on Beverly Hills home concerns neighbors



New construction on a house on Olentangy in the Beverly Hills subdivision (shown above) is concerning neighbors, who suspect the residence may be used to sublet, which would violate the community's deed restrictions and lower surrounding home values. Other residents postulated the property might even be used for human trafficking or prostitution. Initial plans called for dividing the roughly 800-square-foot house into eight separate living quarters, each with a shower and a small bed. None of the individual rooms were designed to connect to one another. Each of the eight rooms was accessible only by one of either



four front doors or four back doors. After concerns were raised with city officials, plans have been changed to now have just one door and three windows on the front side of the house and to have just two back doors instead of the original four. New plans also call for all rooms to connect to each other and include a communal kitchen. The city has issued permits for the construction to be a single-family dwelling. A concrete slab has also been poured (pictured above right) on an adjacent lot, which contractors say is for a 2,300-square-foot game room. City officials are aware of the suspicious construction and are closely scrutinizing the matter.

and Kellen Sweny is running as an independent.

In the race to fill the U.S. House District 29 seat recently vacated by Rep. Gene Green, Democrat Sylvia R. Garcia will face Republican Phillip Aronoff. Cullen Burns is running as a Libertarian. If elected in the highly Hispanic district, Garcia will be the first Latina from the Houston area to be elected to Congress.

At the state level, Republican incumbent Dennis Paul will face Democratic challenger Alexander Jonathan Karjeker in the House District 129 race. Joseph Majsterski is running as a Libertarian.

In the state House District 144 race, Democratic incumbent Mary Ann Perez will face Republican challenger Ruben Villareal.

Democratic incumbent Carol Alvarado will face Libertarian Clayton Hunt in the state House District 145 race. No Republicans filed to run for the position.

In the House District 147 race, Democratic incumbent

Garnet F. Coleman will face Republican challenger Thomas Wang.

Houston residents will have a chance to vote on two city charter referendums: Propositions A and B.

Proposition A is a "do-over" vote to approve the city's existing ReBuild Houston street and drainage program (Rebuild Houston.org). Voters are asked to establish a lockbox around revenue from the drainage fee and restrict use for street flooding, drainage and street improvements. From 2012 to 2017, ReBuild Houston has provided more than \$800 million in drainage improvements and paid \$1.1 billion toward debt.

Proposition B is a vote to tie firefighters' pay to police officers without additional requirements on education or work hours. The vote would require the city to give firefighters a minimum 25 percent raise the first year and additional raises equal to police.

The 25 percent raise would cost the city at least \$98 million per year, which the city

ers deserved a pay increase but said the current proposal was financially infeasible. Turner estimated the cost at around \$100 million a year — just for the pay raises.

Firefighters have rejected both a 4 percent raise offered by former Mayor Annise Parker and a 9.5 percent raise over three years that was offered by Turner. The mayor said the 9.5 percent offer will remain on the table, should the proposal not pass.

If approved by voters, Proposition B would equate firefighter pay with police pay.

Turner noted, however, that fire and police employees have different job duties, work hours, shifts and training requirements. In cities where fire and police pay are equal, first responders generally have a single bargaining organization, and firefighters work longer hours than they do in Houston.

Turner further noted that approximately 80 percent of the calls to the Houston Fire Department are for medical services only.

Privatizing EMS services and dispatching could save the department around \$20 million a year, the mayor added.

The proposition is appearing on the ballot after the Houston Professional Fire Fighters Association collected the necessary 20,000 signatures. The same union is simultaneously filing a lawsuit against the city.

"It's like taking two bites out of the same apple," Turner said.

While they are legally prohibited from officially endorsing a referendum, unlike their elected counterparts, both Houston Fire Chief Samuel Peña and Houston Police Chief Art Acevedo spoke in no uncertain terms of the financial backlash that would occur, should the measure pass.

The police department would be hit particularly hard, as it currently has the largest budget to cut.

"We can't afford to lose a single officer," said Acevedo.

The police chief further stressed the seriousness of the issue, suggesting that some believe that opposition to the measure is purely political.

"Some people think we're bluffing," Acevedo said. "No one's bluffing. You think potholes are bad now?"

If Proposition B is passed, Turner said the city will be forced to lay off firefighters, police officers and other employees, as well as cut services to public safety, parks and libraries.

The mayor has allotted \$500,000 from his own re-election campaign to pay for ads opposing the measure. His opposition to the proposal might be to his own political peril, he said, noting the gener-

al popularity of the fire department.

"Everyone loves firefighters," Turner said. "But my job is to do what's best for the city, and I call them like I see them. My job is to call a ball a ball and a strike a strike."

## HCFCD completes post-Harvey removal of stormwater blockages

The Harris County Flood Control District has completed a countywide effort to remove downed trees and other storm debris left blocking Harris County's bayou drainage system since Hurricane Harvey more than a year ago.

With a last push on Buffalo Bayou and Cypress Creek, and expenses estimated at \$8.9 million so far, more than 140,000 cubic yards (roughly 40,000 tons) have been removed since this work began shortly after the storm. In recent months, crews removed more than 25,000 cubic yards (7,042 tons or 642 truckloads) of debris from Buffalo Bayou, and 14,000 cubic yards (3,978 tons or 327 truckloads) from Cypress Creek.

Concentrated effort on those two forested bayous followed an initial countywide sweep that resulted in the removal of 101,383 cubic yards of material from Harris County's 22 watersheds.

Removing debris from the channels was a high priority in the days and weeks after Harvey. Downed trees and other storm debris can impede stormwater flow and increase erosion, especially along natural forested channels.

The Flood Control District used special storm debris contractors, as well as in-house debris removal crews, to complete its sweep of the county's 22 watersheds.

Crews used floating barges, chainsaws, and excavators to remove debris in some areas, hand tools in others. In areas with unique challenges in terms of equipment access, such as Buffalo Bayou, the Flood Control District was able to secure additional temporary rights-of-entry to public and private property, and to purchase access property that will be useful in future ongoing maintenance.

Debris has included everything from refrigerators and other large objects washed into the channel, to as many as six automobiles. Woody debris is ground into wood chips — a total of nearly 42,294 cubic yards (399 truckloads), so far — which are then hauled to local green waste recycling centers for final processing into composted mulch.

Crews focused on removing debris that was impeding stormwater conveyance, or that had washed against a bridge, pipeline structure or utility. Accumulated silt was not part of this effort, and vegetative debris that was silted into the channel was typically left in place.

The Flood Control District is working to secure funding for its disaster-related storm debris removal efforts from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. An estimated \$8.9 million in work has been completed, with approximately \$2.5 million received so far in disaster aid for channel debris removal.

While disaster-related debris removal is complete, the Flood Control District will continue to address channel debris and stormwater impedance as part of its regular routine maintenance program. Residents are encouraged to report bayou and creek debris to the Flood Control District's Citizen Service Center at <https://www.hcfcd.org/contact-us/citizenservice-center/>, or by calling 713-684-4197.

If possible, "drop a pin" to obtain and share coordinates of the blockage, or include the nearest street address and add a photo. Provide email and/or phone contact information, in case Flood Control District personnel need help in locating the blockage site.

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## Daniel announces launch of jury reminder system

Harris County District Clerk Chris Daniel announced the launch of electronic jury service reminders by the Harris County District Clerk's Office.

The service allows those summoned for jury service to register to receive a reminder of their jury service on the day prior to their date of service, by email, text or both. The system will also alert jurors of weather or other related events that would affect jury services.

Potential jurors register for the reminder service by visiting the web address included on the jury summons and then opting in for the reminder by entering their email address, cell phone number or both.

Once the reminder service registration has been submitted, the potential juror will receive a confirmation email of their successful registration.

The email reminder component of the service went live on Friday, Oct. 5 with the first registration received at 7:31 p.m. that evening. From the time that first registration was received through 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 9, a total of 280 potential jurors had already opted in to the system. The text reminder service was scheduled to be operational by Friday, Oct. 12. "We know that our fellow Harris County citizens are willing to fulfill their duty on behalf of our justice system, but sometimes they forget," said Harris County District Clerk Chris Daniel regarding the jury reminder service.

"This tool provides the means to remind our jurors of

their service, so that it doesn't fall through the cracks of daily life. I expect that we will see a noticeable increase in jury service participation as a result of the new reminder system. The other benefit of the system is that we can now proactively notify those called for service of any events that affect jury service, so that potential jurors don't have to track down information on their own. This need was highlighted during Hurricane Harvey and again during the severe winter storm in January of this year.

"I am committed to the continued implementation of technology, such as this new reminder system, to ensure that our services are delivered as efficiently and effectively as possible, but also in a way that is convenient for everyone who interacts with our office."

## New institute at UHCL researches nutrition, exercise

"There is a gap in the health care continuum in our community," said William Amonette, associate professor of exercise science at University of Houston-Clear Lake. "For those struggling with chronic ailments - such as diabetes, stroke, heart diseases or obesity - insurance benefits offer limited coverage, if any at all. That is where the newly opened Exercise and Nutritional Health Institute fits in the health care continuum. It is designed to ensure people whose rehabilitative needs outlast insurance benefits can continue receiving care," said Amonette, the institute's executive director.

"If you are living with a chronic disease or disability that requires long-term intervention, many insurance companies will cover a certain number of physical therapy sessions, and then you're on your own," said Amonette. "The science of nutrition and exercise for people with chronic disease or who are aging has evolved significantly, and at ENHI, faculty, medical doctors and other allied health care professionals are training future exercise scientists and practitioners to help this growing population in our community to regain their strength and improve their health and quality of life."

ENHI will originally offer two programs to members of the community: Muscle Matters and Metabolic Health. "Muscle Matters targets our over-40 population because that's when skeletal muscle mass starts to steadily decline, which can result in serious impairments and loss of independence later in life," Amonette said. "Appropriate exercise and nutritional countermeasures can mitigate these losses and help restore independence and quality of life."

Muscle Matters is a monitored resistance, metabolic conditioning exercise and nutritional program designed to decrease or reverse the muscle strength losses that result from aging. "We monitor progress and study novel interventions to help people stay on track toward regaining or maintaining their strength and health," said Amonette.

Dr. John Cottingham is one of two locally based physicians who has taken a leadership role in the ENHI. Cottingham specializes in

family medicine with a practice in Webster and is a research professor and scientist at ENHI. "All humans are by nature athletes, and it is important that we approach our nutrition and train our bodies accordingly," he said. "By engaging in exercise that is intense enough to cause a physiological response, we are increasing the odds of having a more functional life and avoiding many chronic diseases that start early and become apparent after the age of 40. Because humans are living longer, to say you're 70 years old and you can't participate in activities that you enjoy is not reasonable."

Cottingham said that ENHI aims to positively affect the community by helping people understand that their age is not an obstacle to improving their health. "The services people can get at ENHI are varied and help beyond nutrition and exercise. We're helping people improve muscle mass, strength, balance, endurance and agility and our recommendations are founded in sound scientific ev-

idence," he said. The Metabolic Health program helps address the problem of overweight and obesity in our community. "Some metabolic consequences of obesity are a systemic inflammation, likelihood of diabetes, hypertension, heart diseases, some cancers, strokes and dementia," Amonette said. "These diseases reduce the quality of life of millions, and placing a huge strain on our public health system. The Metabolic Health program is a combined resistance, metabolic conditioning and nutritional program designed to decrease fat weight and improve insulin sensitivity."

Dr. Nadir Ali, a cardiologist based primarily at Clear Lake Regional Medical Center in Webster is a physician leader, research professor and scientist in the institute. "Until now, the way doctors have been treating these diseases is by figuring out which pill to give patients," he said. "We have to change this paradigm. The right way to health is through a lifestyle approach that includes fasting, exercise and proper nutrition. Health is not just about weight loss."

Ali said that ENHI's goal is not to conduct research on only young, healthy people. "It's a seminal program," he said. "The objective is to offer a ray of hope to those who are older and struggling with their weight, diabetes or with high blood pressure or other cardiac diseases."

"Anyone can work with healthy, young athletes. This is about taking the knowledge we have and applying it to people suffering from a chronic disease and either curing it or controlling it. The protocols used for athletes can be modified and will work for people in this population."

UHCL's future exercise scientists work with clients alongside professors and other health professionals in one of three state-of-the-art laboratories targeting motor control, exercise physiology and biomechanics. The institute, housed in UHCL's new 83,000-square-foot Recreation and Wellness Center, also has

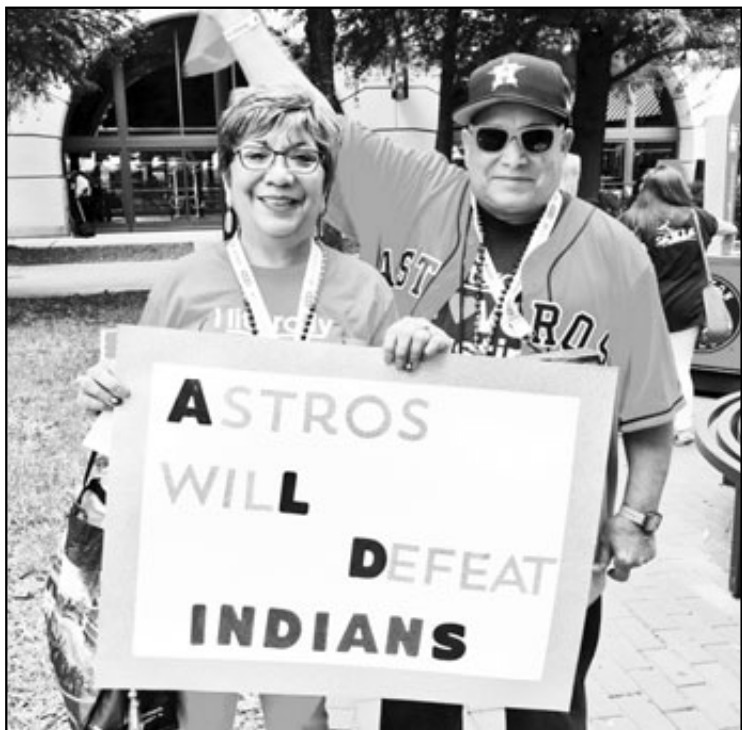

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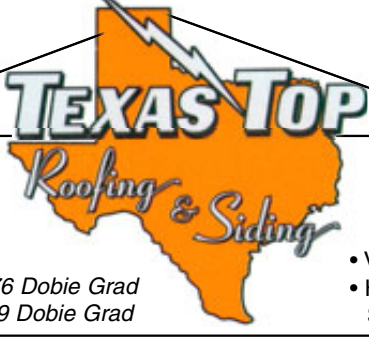
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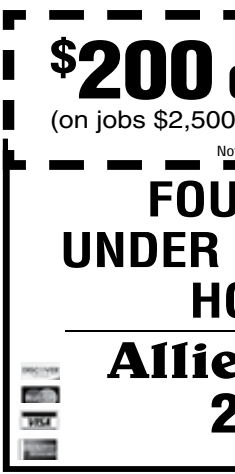
