Nov. 7 general election results tallied

Whitmire in runoff; Flickinger elected to City Council; Shabazz still waiting

The results from the Nov. 7 general election have been tallied, with multiple key races headed to a December runoff. (These were the latest results as of 6 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 8, and represent Harris County only.)

The hotly contested race to replace term-limited Mayor Sylvester Turner will now head to a Dec. 9 runoff between state Sen. John Whitmire and U.S. Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee. In the crowded field of 18

candidates, Whitmire took home 42 percent of the vote to Lee's 36 percent.

The race for Houston city controller will also head to a runoff, as none of the four candidates broke the 50-percent threshold necessary to win. The December runoff will be between Chris Hollins, who received 45 percent of the vote, and Orlando Sanchez, who received 27 percent of the vote. Dave Martin, the term-limited council mem-

ber who currently represents District E, received 15 percent of the vote, and Shannon Nobles received 12 percent.

In the District E race to replace Martin as city council member, Fred Flickinger was victorious over opponent Martina Lemond Dixon. A former resident and Dobie graduate, Flickinger received 57 percent of the vote to Dixon's 43 percent. Flickinger is the son of Leader publisher Marie Flickinger and Clear Brook City MUD board member David Flickinger.

Although District D incumbent Carolyn Evans-Shabazz received by far the most votes in her city council race, at 49 percent, she was just shy of receiving the 50 percent of the vote necessary to avoid a runoff in the five-candidate contest at press time. One precinct was still missing which could keep her back her seat. If necessary, in December's runoff election, she would face Travis McGee, who received approximately 17 percent of the vote.

South Belt resident Ericka McCutcheon was unsuccessful in her bid for the At-large Position 3 seat on city council, with the crowded race of nine candidates now headed to a December runoff be-

tween Richard Cantu, who received 22 percent of the vote, and Twila Carter, who received 21 percent. McCutcheon received 13 percent of the vote.

All three Clear Creek ISD measures on the ballot passed. Proposition A, which addressed the district's tax rate, passed with 59 percent of voters in favor.

Proposition B, which provided \$265 million in buildings bonds, passed with 55 percent of voters in approval. Proposition C, which provided \$37 million in technology bonds, passed with 54 percent of CCISD voters in favor.

Both propositions to amend the Houston city charter easily passed. Proposition A regarding council agenda items passed with 83 percent voter approval, and Proposition B detailing local organization participation passed with 65 percent voter approval.

Harris County's \$2.5 billion bond request to make improvements to its healthcare system overwhelmingly passed, receiving 73 percent voter approval.

All 14 proposed amendments to the state constitution passed.

Quanell X demands Lozano resignation

Controversy stems from judge's racist tweets

Community activists Quanell X and Candice Matthews are calling for the resignation of Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Dolores Lozano for past social media posts that contained racial and homophobic language.

The posts in question were made to the site X, then Twitter, in 2010-2011 when Lozano was attending Baylor University as a 20-year-old student. Lozano - who is married to a black man - reportedly didn't remove the posts until Wednesday, Nov. 1. X and Matthews held a press conference Friday, Nov. 3, in front of Lozano's court, reading a series of the judge's old tweets.

The following is a list of some of the tweets deemed as being racist:

- "Keep the cockiness in your pants ni***a." Dec. 2, 2011

- "Ladies if he doesn't want you, get over it. there's no reason to fight over a ni***a that DON'T want you, #smh." Dec. 27, 2010

- "virabadassx3 ni***a! We need to bring you to the club next time." Sept. 25, 2011

- "@Gmann_21 I have to care of Sophia! My grandma can't take care of her alone.. So come over

ni***a." June 7, 2011

- "@tiaraar shut up! I was talking about smoking ni***a." April 23, 2011

- "#BUawardcategories most likely to cry over a ni***a that's going to jail.. smh." April 6, 2011

- "@theREAL_ERIC yess really ni***a - that's why you're with me right now." Dec. 26, 2010

- "@tiaraar ni***a got a baby - damn that's a NO NO, another lowblow. #smh he fine thoo." Dec. 13, 2010

Some of Lozano's old posts were also disparaging to non-English-speaking Mexicans and overweight women, the activists further charged.

Despite the age of the tweets, Matthews said they demonstrate Lozano is incapable of being fair and impartial in her position as justice of the peace.

"With these racist ideologies that you have, how is it that you can be fair and impartial?" Matthews rhetorically asked at Friday's conference. "You can absolutely not be fair and impartial."

X used the opportunity to slam Democrats in office who are largely staying silent on the issue.

Sagemeadow MUD tax rates stir controversy

District lowering exemption levels for seniors, disabled

A change in Sagemeadow MUD's tax exemption rate for seniors and disabled in the district has drawn the ire of several affected residents in the community.

Beginning this year, the MUD lowered the exemption amount for the two groups from \$150,000 to \$70,000. This measure will equate to roughly a \$400 increase to the affected residents. The current

tax rate is \$0.50/\$100 value. There are 2,125 homes in the entire Sagemeadow MUD, and currently 651 of those homes qualify for the over 65 or disabled exemption.

In 1988, an exemption rate of \$200,000 for seniors and disabled was established by the MUD's board of directors - most of whom qualified for the 65+ exemption. In 2016, the rate was lowered to

\$175,000. The rate was again lowered in 2018 to \$150,000.

Sagemeadow MUD has never had a homestead exemption rate.

As home appraisals in the area continue to increase each year, the number of residents in the aging community who are eligible for the exemption also increases, causing the district to lose millions of dollars - approximately \$48 million in just 2022 alone.

MUD officials said the funds are needed to make much-needed repairs to infrastructure in the aging district.

"We have no choice," said current Sagemeadow MUD board member Dean Baier, noting that the average lifespan for a water system is around 30 years and that the local district has gotten 50+ years of use from theirs. "We (the current board) inherited a mess. The previous boards just kept kicking the can down the road. It's outrageous that it was ever set at that to begin with. They hurt the community by doing that."

The measure caught a lot of longtime Sagemeadow residents off guard.

"The big thing was the shock," said Sandra Yandell, who has lived in Sagemeadow since its inception.

Yandell said her MUD taxes jumped from around \$400/year to nearly \$1,000/year.

Kristen Scott of Bob Leared Interests, the company that manages Sagemeadow MUD, said the MUD's exemption rate for seniors and disabled is still among the best in the area even at \$70,000.

"For the 2023 tax year, our office collects for 166 levied special districts," said Scott. "Of those districts, only six have an over 65 exemption more than \$70,000, and eight districts have a disability exemption more than \$70,000."

Baier said infrastructure repairs are expected to cost approximately \$20 million over the next 10-20 years. He further said it's only fair to divide the cost evenly among all residents in the district.

"We've been putting the burden on other residents," said Baier. "It's not fair."

Scott said affected residents may break their payment into four equal installments. Additionally, residents over 65 may defer their payments altogether until they no longer own the home.

Man charged for taco truck murder

Charges have been filed against a suspect in the fatal shooting of a taco truck owner that took place around 3:45 a.m. Oct. 13 in the 8500 block of the Gulf Freeway near Winkler.

The suspect, Jimmie Wayne Daniels, 21, was charged with capital murder in the 487th State District Court.

He is accused in the killing of Roberto Almaguer Garza, 29.

According to Houston Police Department officials, patrol officers responded to a shooting at a gas station at the above address and found Garza suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. Houston Fire Department paramedics responded to the scene and pronounced him dead.

A preliminary investigation determined Garza was the owner of a food truck and a male suspect attempted to rob him at gunpoint. During the robbery, a scuffle ensued, during which Garza was shot multiple times. The suspect fled the scene on foot in an unknown direction.

Further investigation identified Daniels, who was already in custody for unrelated felony incidents, as the suspect. On Oct. 26, he was charged for his role in this fatal shooting.

A similar incident took place just a few days earlier at a late-night taco truck on Edgebrook near the Gulf Freeway.

In that robbery, the victim was shot in the leg by a masked man but survived.

At press time, it was unclear if Daniels was involved in that crime.

Police search for shooting suspect

Houston police are searching for a female suspect, accused of shooting another female about 10:55 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 8, in the 9800 block of Hollock Street near the Gulf Freeway and Edgebrook.

The victim, 24, was transported to an area hospital in critical, but stable condition.

According to Houston Police Department

officials, patrol officers responded to a shooting call at the Cabo San Lucas apartment complex at the above address and learned a physical altercation occurred regarding a child custody situation. A preliminary investigation determined the victim was shot in the arm by a female suspect. The victim was no longer at the scene.

A short time later, officers learned the victim had been transported by private vehicle to an area hospital.

Further investigation and evidence from the scene identified the suspect as Bougere. The Harris County District Attorney's Office was consulted and Bougere was subsequently charged for her role in the incident.

The Wings Over Houston airshow will again return to Ellington Airport in fall 2024 with the U.S. Navy Blue Angels.

Sheriff launches road safety program

The Harris County Sheriff's Office has announced the launch of the Lights On! pilot program, a proactive initiative aimed at improving road safety and fostering positive police-community interactions.

Lights On! is a community-driven program with the mission to heal police-community relationships by replacing equipment violation tickets with repair vouchers redeemable at partnered auto shops. Instead of receiving a citation for minor vehicle violations, qualified individuals with valid driver's licenses and insurance will be eligible to receive vouchers covering up to \$250 for the repair of inoperable headlights, taillights, turn signals, or license plate lights at vetted repair shops. The program has seen success in other law enforcement jurisdictions.

"For some families, a broken taillight or turn signal can sometimes mean choosing between a minor auto repair and buying groceries," said Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez. "A citation for these minor offenses can lead to further financial strain. This program gives deputies a tool to engage with drivers and offer a helpful solution, rather than a ticket or fine." The initiative will expand to other districts in the coming months. Lights On! partnered with 163 law enforcement agencies across 21 states and has surpassed the milestone of 10,000 vouchers redeemed, resulting in 10,000 restorative interactions and 10,000 safer cars on the road.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Foundation plays an integral role in the collaboration helping to ensure the successful implementation of the program.

John M. Harrington, CEO of Lights On!, emphasized the program's effectiveness in building trust and enhancing community-police interactions. "Instead of punishing drivers for broken lights, we can fix the mechanical issue and mitigate what often becomes a downward spiral for community members in need. We are giving deputies a new tool that enhances trust and creates positive interactions."

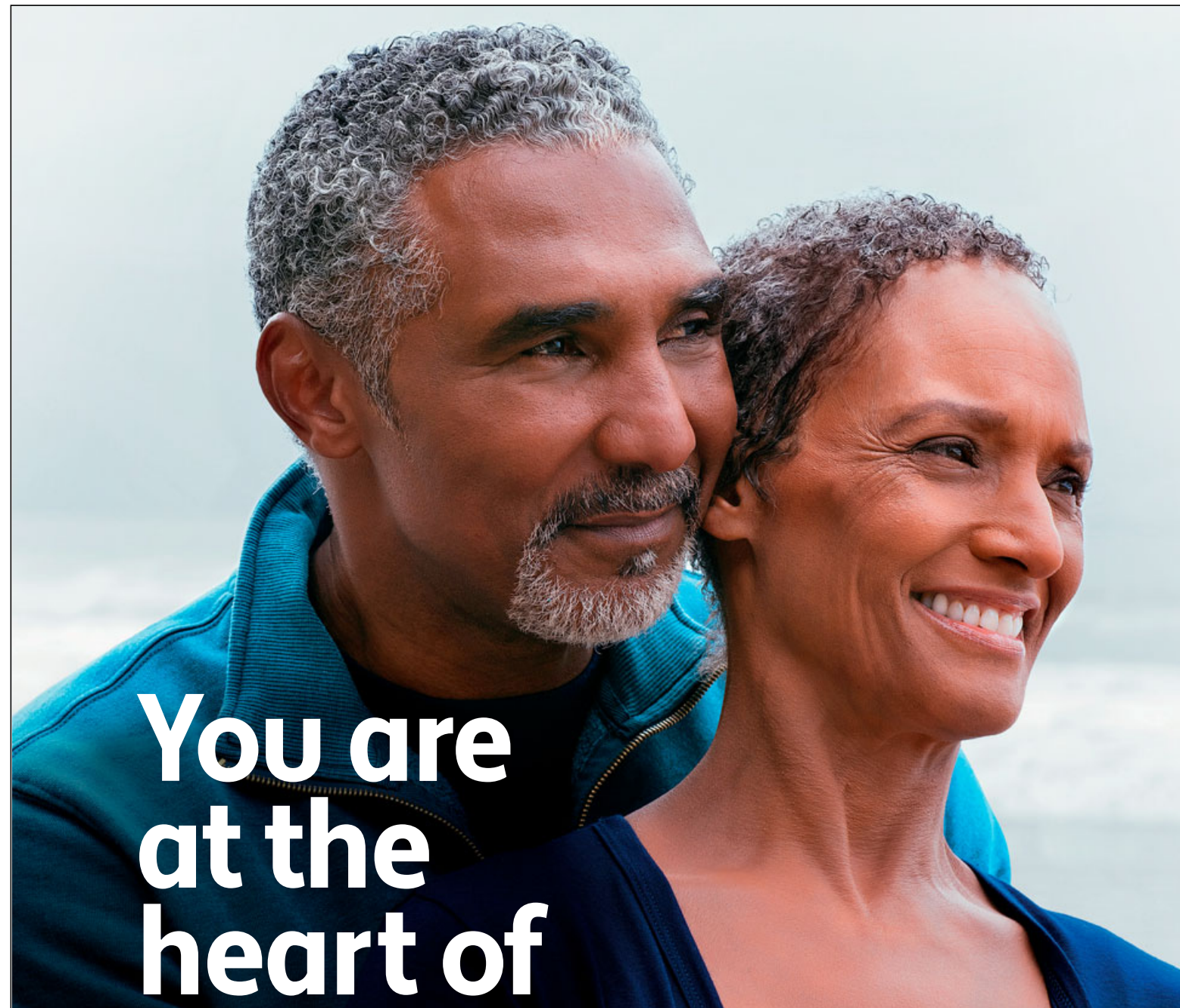

An arrest warrant for capital murder was issued for Rodriguez on Saturday, and the following evening, he turned himself into police without incident.

At the time of the crime, Rodriguez already had three open felony warrants, and records showed that Rodriguez had a lengthy criminal past. Police believed Palacios died from blunt force trauma, but her exact cause of death was not immediately determined. Media reports claiming Palacios was shot were unsubstantiated.

Past racist tweets haunt Pct. 2's Lozano

Continued from Page 1 where the hell are you?" asked X at the press conference. "Because she is a Democrat. But, if she was a Republican white woman talking like this, all of you Democrats would be speaking out against her, demanding her resignation. But, you're not doing that because she's a member of your political party."

X also attacked the media for remaining mum on the matter. While both Channel 2 and Channel 13 attended Friday's press conference, neither news outlet had run a story on it as of press time. That same day, however, Channel 13 ran a story about Lozano winning a federal lawsuit against Baylor in an unrelated matter but failed to mention the calls for the judge's resignation.

"They're suppressing the story," X told the Leader. In the Baylor lawsuit, Lozano contended the school should have done more to protect her during her senior year when she alleges she was assaulted by her boyfriend, a Baylor football player. The boyfriend was never criminally charged in the incident.

X further told the Leader he has damaging financial records against Lozano, claiming the judge spent as much in just her first two weeks on the job as her predecessor George Risner spent the previous three years.

Risner left the post last year after serving more than 35 years to launch an unsuccessful campaign to unseat Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia. Lozano de-

feated Blair McClure in the Democratic primary to replace Risner and ran unopposed in the November general election.

At press time, X said he intended to go public with the latest accusations against Lozano on the TV show FOX Face Off, to be aired Wednesday, Nov. 8, on Fox 26.

Multiple actors who previously did business before Risner's Precinct 2, Place 2 court have confided to the Leader they now opt to travel significantly further to appear before Precinct 2, Place 1 Justice of the Peace Jo Ann Delgado, citing a lack of confidence in Lozano's abilities.

Lozano's 2022 victory seems to have spawned political aspirations for other members of her immediate family as well. Lozano's mother recently filed the treasurer paperwork necessary to launch a campaign for Precinct 2 constable, a position currently held by Jerry Garcia. Multiple sources have told the Leader Lozano's father is also planning to run for office, with his sights reportedly on Delgado's Place 1 seat.

The group Judicial Accountability has launched a petition to remove Lozano from office.
