Active COVID cases increase

The number of active COVID-19 cases in the South Belt community has slightly increased from the previous week, according to statistics from Harris County Public Health.

As of Tuesday, May 17, there had been 12,707 confirmed cases in 77089. Of those, 95 remain active, up 40 from the previous week. To date, 132 from the ZIP code have died from the disease, up one from the previous week.

In ZIP code 77075, there had been 9,404 confirmed cases. Of those, 202 remain active, up two from the previous week. To date, there have been 76 in the ZIP code, up one from the previous week.

In 77034 (total population: 40,532), there had been 8,718 confirmed cases. Of those, 58 remained active, up one from the previous week. To date, 89 residents from ZIP code 77034 have died from the disease. (Harris County reported 90 deaths the previous week.)

According to Harris County officials, the vast majority of the fatalities suffered from pre-existing health issues.

Gulf Freeway closures set

Two outside northbound frontage road lanes on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from West Medical Boulevard to Bay Area Boulevard daily from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. through Sunday, May 22.

One middle northbound frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to Bay Area Boulevard daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. through Sunday, May 22.

At least one southbound frontage road lane and at least one northbound frontage road lane will be closed on the Gulf Freeway from FM 518 to FM 517 in League City daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Friday, Sept. 30.

At least one southbound main lane and frontage road lane and at least one northbound main lane and frontage road lane will be closed on the Gulf Freeway from NASA Bypass/NASA Road 1 to SH 96 in League City daily from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Saturday, Dec. 31.

Both the northbound entrance and southbound entrance ramps from FM 518 in League City will be completely closed until further notice. Motorists should use the entrance ramps from SH 96.

The northbound exit ramp to FM 517 in Dickinson will be completely closed until further notice. Motorists should use the northbound exit ramp to Holland/Hughes.

Two outside southbound lanes on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from Texas City Railroad to SH 6/SH 146 in La Marque nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. through Saturday, Jan. 8.

The northbound entrance ramps from both FM 519/Main Street and FM 1765/Texas Avenue in La Marque will be completely closed until further notice. Motorists should use the next available northbound entrance ramp.

The closures are associated with an ongoing construction project to widen the freeway from three to five lanes in each direction and the frontage roads from two to three lanes in each direction.

Runoff elections scheduled for May 24

Nominees for county judge, county commissioner, state rep to be selected

The runoffs for the March 1 primary elections are set to take place Tuesday, May 24. Voters will decide several key races, in which no candidate received 50 percent of the vote or more in the original contest.

On the Democratic side of the aisle, voters will decide who will be the nominee for House District 147, lieutenant governor and attorney general, among other positions.

Democratic candidates seeking to represent the state's House District 147, which encompasses much of the South Belt community north of Fuqua, include Danielle Keys Bess and Yolanda Jones. Current House District 147 Rep. Garnet Coleman is retiring after serving 30 years in the state's lower chamber.

In the March 1 primary, Jones narrowly missed a runoff, receiving 42 percent of the vote to Bess's 20 percent. Reagan Flowers received 17 percent of the vote; Aurelia Wagner received 9 percent; and Namrata Subramanian received 7 percent.

The winner of the runoff will face Republican Damian Jones who narrowly defeated opponent Rashard Baylor in the March 1 primary, receiving 54 percent of the vote to Baylor's 46 percent.

Democratic candidates seeking the position of lieutenant governor include Michelle Beckley and Mike Collier.

In the March 1 primary, Collier received 42 percent of the vote to Beckley's 30 percent. Third Democratic candidate Carla Brailer received 28 percent.

The winner of the runoff will face Republican Dan Patrick in November's general election. Patrick handily won the March 1 primary, taking home 77 percent of the vote.

Democratic candidates seeking the position of attorney general include Joe Jaworski and Rochelle Mercedes Garza. In the March 1 primary, Garza received 43 percent of the vote to Jaworski's 20 percent. Lee Merritt received 19 percent of the vote; Mike Fields received 12

percent; and S. Raynor received 6 percent.

The Republican contest for attorney general is also headed to a runoff between Ken Paxton and George P. Bush. In the March 1 primary, Paxton received 43 percent of the vote to Bush's 23 percent. Eva Guzman received 18 percent of the vote and Louie Gohmert received 17 percent.

Other races to be decided on the Republican side of the aisle include Harris County Precinct 2 commissioner and Harris County judge.

Competing to be the Republican nominee for Harris County Precinct 2 commissioner are Jerry Mouton and former Precinct 2 commissioner Jack Morman.

In the March 1 primary, Morman received 40 percent of the vote to Mouton's 22 percent. Former Pasadena Mayor John Manlove received 17 percent of the vote; Richard Vega received 15 percent; and Daniel Jason received 5 percent.

In the Democratic contest, incumbent Adrian Gar-

cia easily won his party's nomination, receiving 76 percent of the vote. George Risner received 13 percent of the vote and Gary Harrison received 11 percent.

In the race for Harris County judge, candidates Alexandra del Moral Mealer and Vidal Martinez are competing for the Republican nomination.

In the March 1 primary, Mealer (see related story on Page 1) received 30 percent of the vote to Martinez's 26 percent. Martina Lemond Dixon received 15 percent of the vote; Randy Kubosh received 10 percent; and Warren Howell received 8 percent.

The winner of the runoff will face County Judge Lina Hidalgo in the November general election.

Hidalgo handily won the March Democratic primary, receiving 70 percent of the vote. Erica Davis received 15 percent of the vote; Georgia Provost received 6 percent; Maria Garcia received 4 percent; Kevin Howard received 3 percent; and Ahmad "Robbeto" Hassan received

Mealer sets sights on Hidalgo

Republican candidate for county judge rallies support

Political newcomer and May 25 runoff candidate Alexandra del Moral Mealer has rallied the support of numerous community leaders on her mission to unseat Harris County Judge Linda Hidalgo.

"We need a county judge who will be tough on crime and who will defend the American dream for the next generation," said Jim "Mattress Mack" McIngvale, one of many well-known figures to endorse Mealer. "Alexandra del Moral Mealer has dedicated her life to service, and she is the leader that will restore law and order for Harris County. She will support law enforcement and will work to keep criminals off our streets. Alexandra has my full endorsement. Vote Alexandra Mealer for Harris County Judge."

A West Point graduate and U.S. Army combat veteran, Mealer has focused much of her campaign on fighting crime and what she feels Hidalgo's shortcomings are in this area.

"One of the primary motivations behind my decision to run for Harris County Judge was the state of utter lawlessness that continues to grip our entire county," said Mealer. "Whether stroll-

ing along the bayou, picking up groceries or even attending an Astros game, residents are now rolling the dice on whether they will encounter a violent, repeat offender. While it is clear that our residents are not safe, we have now reached such a state of crisis that our law enforcement are being routinely murdered by violent, repeat offenders. In fact, in the three years since Judge Lina Hidalgo took office, more officers have been murdered than the prior decade. This is outrageous and cannot continue."

Her views on crime enforcement have garnered her the support of several local police and first-responder groups, including the Houston Police Officers' Union, Texas Municipal Police Association, Texas Fraternal Order Of Police, Pasadena Police Officer's Union and Houston Professional Fire Fighters Association.

Multiple Harris County constables have also endorsed Mealer, including Precinct 4 Constable Mark Herman, Precinct 5 Constable Ted Heap and Precinct 8 Constable Phil Sandlin - who represents much of the South Belt community.

"I am proud to offer my full support and endorsement to Alexandra del Moral Mealer in her campaign to be the next Harris County Judge," said Sandlin. "We need a leader on Commissioners Court who supports law enforcement and who will stand up for law abiding citizens across this county. The criminal justice system in Harris County has been severely undermined in the last 3 years. We need strong leaders like Alexandra to reverse some of the failed policies that are destroying this great county and help us hold crim-

City addresses catalytic converter thefts

Mayor Sylvester Turner and Houston City Council unanimously passed an ordinance to address the increase in thefts and the resale of stolen catalytic converters citywide.

The measure was in response to a growing problem of catalytic converter thefts throughout the Houston area.

In the first three months of 2022, the Houston Police Department reported 3,188 catalytic converter thefts, a 123 percent increase from the previous year.

"People need to know that if you steal them, you will pay the price for it," said Turner. "If you are going to do it, we are going to make it as inconvenient as possible for you."

The ordinance will stop business-to-business reselling of stolen exhaust emission control de-

vices and make it necessary for anyone in possession of a cut catalytic converter to show proof of ownership. Failure to show ownership could result in a misdemeanor charge for each one.

"There is no question the theft of catalytic converter leads to other violent crimes," said Turner. "We are addressing this problem as part of the overall One Safe Houston initiative. We have passed an ordinance requiring some businesses to install cameras and exterior lighting, and working with Harris County, we passed the 10 percent bail bond measure. The catalytic converter ordinance is another tool to drive down crime and create a safer city."

The METRO Park & Ride location on Fuqua has been the target of catalytic converter thieves at

Axiom Space breaks ground at Ellington

The future of low-earth orbit and human spaceflight has a new base of operations, as Axiom Space recently broke ground on a new state-of-the-art headquarters at Ellington Airport, home of the future Houston Spaceport.

There, Axiom Space - which is developing Axiom Station, the world's first commercial space station - will construct a campus containing employee offices, astronaut training and mission control facilities. The station will also con-

tain engineering development, testing labs and a high bay production facility to house Axiom's space station modules under construction.

Axiom Space President and CEO Michael Suffredini said the new facility was necessary to construct from scratch because there was no other one in the Greater Houston area capable of handling the company's needs.

"From this Axiom Space headquarters cam-

Controversial cameras prove effective

License plate-reading cameras aid in catching crooks

A controversial new crime-fighting tool is proving to be effective, local officials said.

License plate-reading cameras from Flock Safety were recently installed throughout parts of the South Belt community not incorporated by the city. In all, there are 32 cameras located in the Clear Brook City, Sagemeadow and Kirkmont UDs.

Clear Brook City MUD has 21 of the devices; Sagemeadow UD has seven; and Kirkmont MUD has four. Each of the cameras costs \$2,500 to operate annually, and each MUD is responsible for paying the devices in its geographic area.

Opponents of the cameras view them as an invasion of privacy rights.

Turner announces city's 2023 budget

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner recently announced priorities for the Fiscal Year 2023 City of Houston operating budget.

The following is a synopsis of the mayor's remarks during a May 10 press conference.

The proposed budget for all funds is \$5.71 billion, an increase of \$487 million, or 9.3 percent compared to the FY2022 Current Budget of \$5.22 billion. (Enterprise Funds accounts for \$364 million of the \$487 million increase primarily due to cost in the combined utility system related to the Consent Decree and other drinking water projects).

The proposed General Fund budget of \$2.74 billion reflects an increase in spending of \$102 million or 3.8 percent from the FY2022 Current Budget of \$2.64 billion. This increase is primarily attributable to pay increases for all employee groups including 6 percent for fire, 4 percent for police, and 3 percent for municipal employees.

The budget includes operational funding for the new Alief Neighborhood Center, the renovated Kendall Library and the Dr. Shannon Walker Library.

ARPA utilization

"Fiscal Year 2022 experienced increases across many revenue streams as our local economy outperformed all expectations," Turner said. "However, make no mistake, COVID-19 is still here and continues to impact our communities. The FY2023 Proposed General Fund budget utilizes \$160 million federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding

to recognize the economic impact of COVID-19 and address the reduction in revenues due to the public health emergency."

Ending Fund Balance

"Significant uncertainty remains in the economy with inflation rates surging, interest rates on the rise, gas prices soaring and global unrest with the Russia-Ukraine war," Turner said. "These issues create an extremely volatile situation and it is imperative that we build and preserve a strong fund balance heading into Fiscal Year 2023. With that being said, this proposed budget includes an ending fund balance of \$311 million, which is 13.5 percent of expenditures less debt service and pay-as-you go (PAYGO), well above the minimum of 7.5 percent established in the city's financial policies (\$138 million above the 7.5 percent of expenditures less debt service and PAYGO)."

Additionally, this budget:

- Does not draw down from fund balance.
- Does not include any one-time land sales or deferrals.

Budget Stabilization Fund

Fully fund the Budget Stabilization Fund placing the City in a better position heading into hurricane season.

Impact of property tax revenue cap

The FY2023 proposed budget is based on the existing property tax revenue cap. Depending on

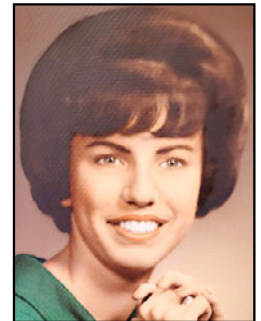

Opened in 2020, the facility focuses on aerospace workforce training for the booming new spaceport.

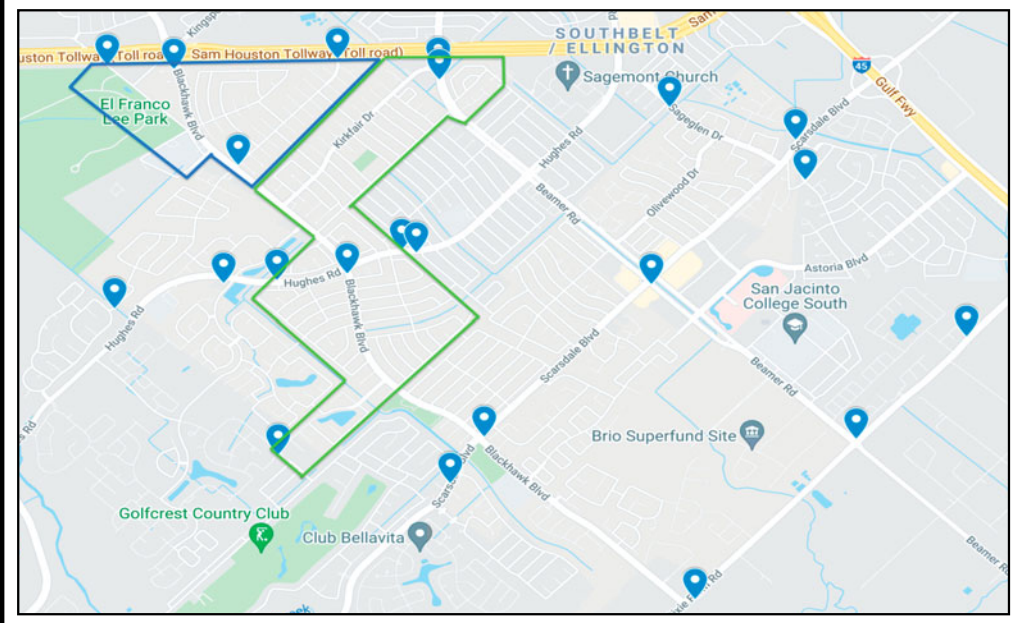
Houston Airport System Director of Aviation Mario Diaz commented on San Jacinto College's impact on the industry's future. "We recognize the importance of education and hands-on training," Diaz said at the groundbreaking. "We're pleased to partner with San Jacinto College in developing the talent of the future. The EDGE Center offers unmatched aerospace training and a pathway to careers in the aerospace industry under the guidance of instructors who are at the top of their fields."

The development of Axiom Space's Spaceport property will be developed in two phases. Phase 1 includes 106,000 square feet of assembly integration and test facilities and aims to be completed by April 2023. The second phase will add facilities for labs, mission operations and training, aircraft operations and office space.

This is Axiom Space's latest accomplishment as it grows the commercial space industry and expands access to low-Earth orbit to a broader international community. Axiom Space recently welcomed home the crew of Axiom Mission 1 after successfully completing the first all-private astronaut mission to the ISS, a precursor mission to Axiom Station. The company has also signed agreements with several nations including Italy, Hungary, and the United Arab Emirates to fly on future space missions.

Axiom Space was founded in Houston in 2016 Suffredini - NASA's ISS program manager from 2005 to 2015 - and space entrepreneur Kam Ghaffarian to build the world's first commercial space station and develop commercial space infrastructure that will drive a thriving low-Earth orbit economy. The company currently employs more than 400 people, the majority of which work at its current Houston facilities and has plans to grow the number to 600 by the end of 2022 and 1,000 by 2025.

40 years ago (1982)

The board of trustees of Pasadena schools approved a pay hike of approximately 14 percent for the district's 1,881 teachers, and they received a preliminary budget which showed district expenditures increasing by roughly 13 percent.

The chairman of the South Belt Crime Watch Association set up a meeting for representatives of area subdivisions to consider a proposal to establish a supplemental security service by constables in the South Belt area.

35 years ago (1987)

U.S. District Judge James DeAnda accepted a supplemental decree, which settled a discrimination lawsuit won by the U.S. Department of Justice over the Pasadena Independent School District. The settlement called for the school district to pay no more than \$530,000 in back pay to black teaching applicants who were proved to be discriminated against.

30 years ago (1992)

The Pasadena Independent School Board voted 4 to 3 to allow 58 seniors who failed the TAAS test to participate in graduation ceremonies, although those seniors were not awarded a diploma.

25 years ago (1997)

The Dobie softball team beat Keller High School 5 to 3 to win the state championship. It was the team's third state title in five years.

Dobie's Nathan Mitchell outpitched Spring's Josh Beckett (later a major league pitcher for the Florida Marlins) to help the Longhorns advance to the regional semifinals. Dobie won 5 to 1.

20 years ago (2002)

Dobie assistant coach Heather Martinez had her number retired at a Lady Longhorn softball banquet. Martinez was

a high school All-American and a member of Dobie's first two state championship teams in 1993 and 1995.

Beverly Hills Intermediate academic team jumped from second to first place at the Region XIV Pentathlon Championship after it was discovered a student's test score had not been counted.

15 years ago (2007)

A benefit was held for 12-year-old Thompson student Justin Penton-Shaulis who was victorious in his nine-month battle with cancer.

Marie Flickinger, publisher of the South Belt-Ellington Leader, and Larry Wilson were announced as winners in the San Jacinto College Board of Regents election. Flickinger ran unopposed for Position 3.

Wilson, an attorney and municipal judge for the City of Deer Park, defeated Tony Ogden and Larry Curry for Position 4. Each was elected for a two-year term.

Clear Creek Independent School District voters approved a \$183 million bond.

The bond was approved by 73 percent of the voters and was to pay for the district's planned fifth high school, two new elementary schools, an intermediate school and major renovations at the district's two ninth-grade centers.

The bond passage raised the district's tax rate 2 cents per \$100 of taxable property value, bringing it to \$1.32.

10 years ago (2012)

Houston Mayor Annise Parker announced Southwest Airlines would pay the estimated \$100 million cost for the five-gate expansion at Hobby Airport needed for the international flights. Under the proposal, the city would own the expanded facilities without taking on any debt. In return for its investment, Southwest would pay no rent for its use of four of the five new international gates. Southwest would also use the customs facility rent-free.

A Houston police officer was relieved of duty after being charged with driving while

intoxicated after leaving the annual South Belt Spectacular Cook-off on Saturday, April 29. Officer Jose Ayala was officially charged on Tuesday, May 10, after blood test results determined he had a blood alcohol level of 0.082. He had initially been detained for suspicion of drunk driving.

According to police, Ayala left the cook-off in a white Corvette shortly after midnight and was stopped by Precinct 2 deputies after he was witnessed driving recklessly, almost hitting an officer who was directing traffic. Once detained, Ayala identified himself as an HPD officer, and Houston police were called to the scene. Ayala reportedly admitted to drinking four beers and two shots of whiskey between 8 and 11:30 p.m. and agreed to take a blood test.

San Jacinto College softball back to nationals

Two elusive wins away from a national championship in 2021, the San Jacinto College softball program has earned its chance to complete the quest this go-round.

Getting outstanding pitching throughout, the Region 14 champion Coyotes swept past three opponents at the Mid-South A District Championship Tournament May 13-15 at San Jacinto College's south campus.

The Mid-South crown delivers an automatic bid to the National Junior College Athletic Association's Division I Softball National Championship, set for May 24-28 at the Pacific Avenue Athletic Complex in Yuma, Ariz.

San Jacinto followed a similar path a season ago, winning the Region 14 regular season and Mid-South District crowns before also claiming three straight wins to reach the national semifinals in Arizona.

San Jacinto lost two straight games from that point but finished third in the country, a program-best.

Kelly Saenz, in her 19th season at the helm of the program, claimed 2022 Region 14 Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Coyotes to regional and conference crowns in back-to-back seasons for the first time in program history.

The reward is a sixth

trip to nationals in Saenz's career, and she couldn't be prouder of her program.

"This particular group is special because it's the first time we have won the region and conference titles in back-to-back years," Saenz said.

"They may have given me a few gray hairs along the way, but there's no group that I've ever been prouder of. The pitching was outstanding for three days, and we also came up with offense when we had to have it."

San Jacinto College

entered the tournament as the top seed but trailed in two of the three games and was in a scoreless tie in another before rallying to win each time.

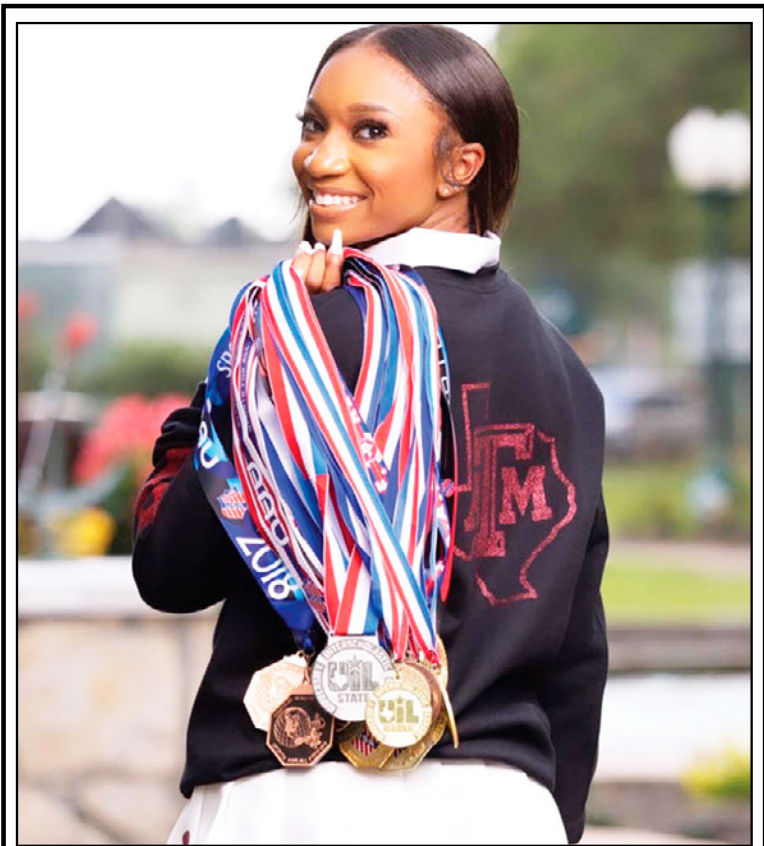
The locals fell behind Paris 1-0 in the opener before scoring four times in the fifth inning en route to a 4-1 win.

her four-year career was one of the most productive Lady Longhorns in program history. No offense to any players who excelled before her, but Onozie's numbers back up

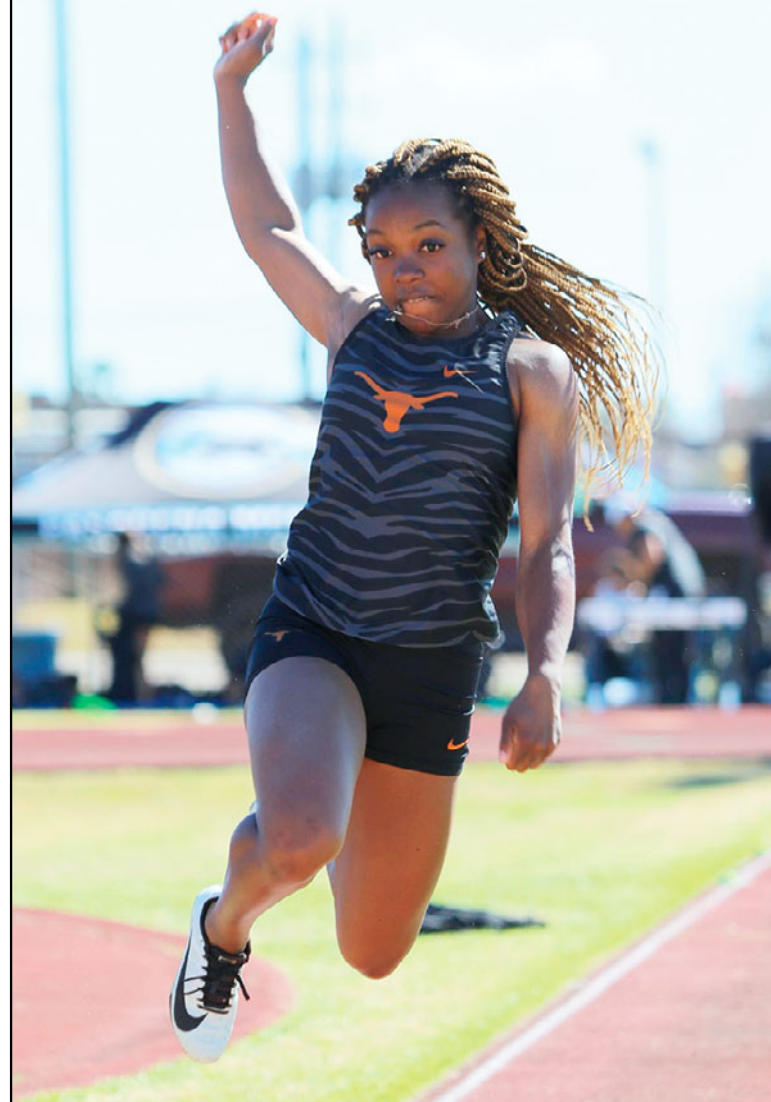
her legacy.

With a second straight Big South conference tournament crown in hand after an 8-4 win May 15 over Longwood, Campbell (37-17) is headed to the Knoxville Regional, where host Tennessee awaits to take on the Camels May 20. The double-elimination tournament, which runs through May 22, also features Oregon State and Ohio State.

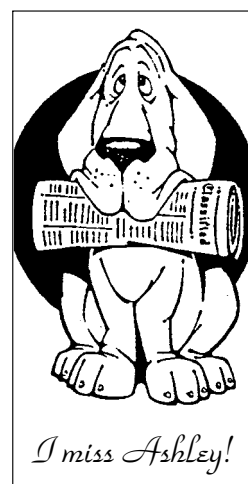

 the taxable valuation, the City of Houston may have to adjust our tax rate to comply with the property tax revenue cap. A higher taxable value may result in tax rate reduction.
 "In view of the increase in property value and to provide relief to senior citizens and the disabled, I will be proposing in a separate measure in June, to increase the over 65 and disabled tax exemptions from \$160,000 to \$260,000," Turner said. "In FY2023 alone, the full

impact of the cap will result in a loss of \$282 million. Since hitting the cap in FY2015, the full cumulative impact of the cap is \$1.4 billion."
Public safety
 "This proposal leaves the City of Houston in a better position as we face these economic uncertainties and at the same time upholds my priorities with public safety at the forefront, fully funding five cadet classes each for fire and police," said Turner. (Current police count is 5,117 with five classes expected to graduate by the end of June.)
 Like all major cities in our nation, Houston has experienced an increase in violent crime because of the COVID-19 pandemic which is why Turner enacted the One Safe Houston Crime Reduction Initiative. One Safe Houston is a comprehensive violence reduction initiative that links research-based strategies to improve public safety and reduce the harms caused by violent crime focusing on four (4) key areas:

- Violence Reduction and Crime Prevention.
 - Crisis Intervention, Response and Recovery.
 - Youth Outreach Opportunities.
 - Key Community Partnerships.
- The mayor initially advanced \$5.74 million for overtime, adding 125 police per day. Although not a part of this budget, he will be advancing an additional \$5 million in ARPA funding to HPD to continue this overtime initiative.

- Other initiatives**
 In addition to One Safe Houston initiatives, Turner has also outlined plans to do the following:
- Bring online, new and renovated libraries and multi-service centers to our communities.
 - Improve and upgrade neighborhood parks through my Love Our Parks Complete Communities Initiative. Phase one of this program targeted five parks in under-resourced communities which enhanced neighborhood pride. Phase two adds five additional parks to continue this program. (Phase 1 included: Malone Park, Our Park, Henderson Park, Delce Park, and Woodruff Park. Phase 2 includes: Irvington Park, Hobart Taylor Park, Lincoln Park, Evella Park, and Independence Height Park.)

Conclusion
 In closing, the Fiscal Year 2023 Proposed Budget is the mayor's seventh consecutive budget that is balanced.
 The city has addressed

Pension Reform in 2017 that reduced its unfunded liability from \$8.2B to \$1.5B.
 It has also addressed OPEB Reform that was effective January 2022, that will reduce the city's Net OPEB liability to half over the next 30 years - from \$9.1B to \$4.5B.
 The city has authorized significant pay raises to the three employee groups including 6 percent for fire, 4 percent for police, and 3 percent for municipal employees.
 It has also brought all of its employees to a minimum of \$15 per hour.
 "Our fund balance is strong, with \$138 million above the required 7.5 percent of expenditures less debt service/PAYGO and the Budget Stabilization Fund is fully funded," Turner said. "This will leave the city in a much better position as we go into the hurricane season as well as preparing the city for the looming economic uncertainties."
