Sullivan's hurricane meeting scheduled for July 7 at UHCL

Houston City Councilmember Mike Sullivan wants the Gulf Coast area to be aware and prepared for the forthcoming hurricane season.

Sullivan, in collaboration with the City of Houston's Public Works and Engineering Department, Harris County's Office of Emergency Management, the City of Houston's OEM, the Houston Fire Department, the Houston Police Department and Transtar, will hold a town hall meeting at the University of Houston-Clear Lake campus to discuss hurricane preparedness and contingency plans for the 2009 hurricane

"I view it as my responsibility to the constituents to get this information out," Sullivan said.

Representatives from the aforementioned city departments and county branches will give presentations on their 2009 plans and will be available to answer questions from the public. In addition to information being given at the town hall meeting, fliers, DVD instructional material and other such literature will be available on

"Every year we learn and make improvements to our operations," Sullivan said. "I want my

district to be ready and well-informed should we experience another hurricane this year.'

The town hall meeting will be held Tuesday, July 7, in the Forest Room at UHCL, located at 2700 Bay Area Blyd, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. The Forest Room is located in the Bayou Building.

The organizations involved decided to hold the meeting in the most vulnerable area of district E, an area which extends as far north as Kingwood, and as far south as Clear Lake.

Sullivan believes that the organizations involved with their hurricane planning are adequately prepared, and wants to inform the public in the area of the services that will be provided should another hurricane make landfall in the Houston-Gulf Coast area.

"This time around, different agencies are truly cooperating with each other for the good of the region," Sullivan said. "We want to be helpful to anyone we can be."

Sullivan will host a similar meeting Tuesday, July 21, at San Jacinto College South to discuss flooding in the South Belt area.

July 4th parade honors military

The annual South Belt Fourth of July parade and fireworks show will take place Saturday, July

Now in its 22nd year, this year's parade, titled Honoring Our Military, will be a salute to U.S. troops both past and present.

In keeping with this year's theme, multiple military vehicles will take part in the parade. Confirmed vehicles include machinery operated by U.S. Army Reserve and U.S. Marine Corps personnel, according to Maj. Mark Williford of the U.S. Army 75th Division.

Williford attempted to make arrangements with BAE Systems in Sealy to also provide a mine-resistant, ambush-protected prototype vehicle to participate in the parade. His efforts, however, were unsuccessful. Southeast Volunteer Fire Department Chief

Chuck Tylka said he, too, will provide vehicles for this year's event. The department will have three fire engines and one ambulance taking part in the parade. Tylka further said the department will provide

three recently purchased military trucks. The three vehicles are Vietnam-era, U.S. Army supply trucks purchased by the department for highwater operations.

Referred to as "deuce and a halves" by military personnel, the vehicles are 2.5-ton, diesel, six-wheel-drive trucks.

The Houston Police Department and the Har-

ris County Precinct 2 Constable's office will also be participating in the annual event.

The parade will begin at 10 a.m. at Beverly Hills Intermediate and wind its way through the community to San Jacinto College South. Participants, however, are encouraged to arrive early, as the lineup will begin at roughly 9 a.m.

Awards will be given to both commercial and noncommercial entries, and vehicles/floats will be judged on patriotism and originality.

All community and nonprofit groups may participate in the parade at no charge, unless they wish to be eligible for a prize. There is a \$50 fee for commercial entries, and noncommercial entries may enter the contest for \$25. Entry forms are available by e-mailing the

eader at mynews@southbeltleader.com. The forms are to be filled out and returned to the Leader office, 11555 Beamer, or faxed to 281-

The deadline to register for the parade is Friday, July 3. Those registering after Thursday, July 2, however, will need to call the Leader at 281-481-5656. If no one is available at this phone number, call 281-948-2714.

Later that evening, residents are invited to El Franco Lee Park at Hall Road and Blackhawk Boulevard to watch this year's fireworks display. Funded by the annual South Belt Spectacular Cookoff and the supplemental June 13 cookoff, the show will start at 9:30 p.m.

Green bank breaks ground

Nigel Harrison, First Community returning to South Belt area

Despite funding and loan issues that are revolving around banks in the current economic times. First Community Bank is coming back to South Belt with a new location.

Nigel Harrison, CEO of FC Holdings, Inc. broke ground on June 26 for a new First Community Bank. The bank is the first of its kind in many ways. Once the bank is completed, not only will it be

the first step back in southeast Houston for First Community Bank, but it is also one of the first Gold LEED-certified banks in the area. The plans for the bank have been analyzed by

the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design as a Gold-ranked building. LEED rankings come in the form of a grading scale from one to 100, with strict prerequisites before grading can begin. "Certified" ranking is 40-49 points, "Silver" is 50-59 points, "Gold" is 60-79 points and "Platinum" is 80 points and up.

Scoring is based on a number of factors, including water efficiency, materials and resources, indoor environmental quality and innovation of design.

"The groundbreaking ceremony had a nice turnout," Harrison said. "I'm glad to get presence back in southeast Houston."

Harrison feels that the decision to construct a

'green" building was prudent. "Aiming for the building to be green was the

right thing to do, considering the times," Harrison said. "If it is possible, I will continue to strive to produce more green buildings.'

Within the next five years, Harrison plans to have another five to seven banks in the southeast Houston area, with more banks being planned for locations closer to downtown Houston.

Harrison, a banker who got his start in southeast Houston with numerous branches including one on Scarsdale Boulevard and one on the Gulf Freeway between Scarsdale and Dixie Farm Road, pulled out of the Houston area due to a purchase and noncompete agreement with Wells Fargo, which ended early this year. The reason Harrison came back to the area

was the ties he has to the community.

"We have a large customer base in the Southeast Houston area, and it was the right thing to do for the community," Harrison said.

Out of the numerous years that Harrison has been in the banking business, his philosophy has remained constant. "Our business is based on 'relationship bank-

ing," Harrison said. "That is when you treat everyone fairly. Without good and happy customers, you can't have a good bank." The facility is planned for the 12900 block

of the Gulf Freeway near Las Haciendas and the Metro Park and Ride on the east side of the freeway. It is expected to open at the end of this

This year, we had two cookoffs! Since


needed firework funds, the South Belt Spectacular committee held a second cookoff to supplement the needed funds.



HR 450, The Enumerated Powers Act, introduced by Representative Shadegg of Arizona, requires that each act of congress contain a concise and definite statement of the constitutional authority relied upon in the enactment of each portion of the act. It makes congress consider the constitutionality of every act they pass, and so state, before it is passed and thus eliminates congress from passing bills/

laws that are not constitutional.

It was introduced in January of this year and is currently in committee. It has been introduced into every congress since 1994 and has never made it out of committee for lack of support. HR 450 cur-rently has 45 co-sponsors, ten of whom are from Texas, but Pete Olson is not one of them. Why are there not 435 co-sponsors? Do we not live by the Constitution?
