Melillo students earn statewide STEM honor

Two teams recognized in challenge to improve future space exploration

Two teams of Melillo Middle School students were recently recognized in a statewide STEM competition aimed at improving space exploration.

Melillo's Space Explorers and Galaxy Explorers teams each earned Best in Show designations at the Texas Space Grant Consortium's Spring 2025 Build the Moon Challenge.

With NASA going back to the moon, crews will need infrastructure to support astronauts during their long-duration missions. In the Build the Moon Challenge, young researchers are tasked with creating their own concrete mixtures to build and develop future lunar habitats using lunar regolith simulant.

The lunar surface is covered with a fine-grained rocky material called regolith. Scientists can use this material to help build the infrastructure needed for future missions. This process is called In Situ Resource Utilization (ISRU).

Led by their coach Nicole Ram, a previous Texas Space Grant Consortium program participant, the Space Explorers and Galaxy Explorers created a landing pad, a brick wall and lunar habitat designs with their lunar simulant concrete mixtures.

"They love being a part of the Artemis generation," said Ram, who serves as a math teacher at Melillo. "What competition are we going to compete in next year?"

Open to students in middle school or junior high (grades sixth through ninth), winning teams may be eligible to receive grant funding through the TSGC's Build the Moon Challenge.

Part of the University of Texas Institute for Geophysics, the Texas Space Grant Consor-

tium is proud to support programs like Build the Moon to help engage, educate and inspire the next generation of students.

One unidentified Melillo team member told TSGC officials it was hoped the Build the Moon Challenge could serve as a launchpad to a career in the space field later in life.

"I would love to work for NASA one day," said the student. "And being exposed to NASA's projects at a young age is allowing me to gain some type of experience for my future career."

Build The Moon applications are set to open again in the fall.

Beverly Hills pool remains closed

Closure due to lifeguard shortage; city offers \$500 incentive

With local students now entering their second month of summer vacation, the city of Houston has yet to open the swimming pool at Beverly Hills Park, citing a national lifeguard shortage.

The pools at the city's Sagemont and Wilson Memorial parks each opened the first week of June after weeks of delay.

This marks the third consecutive year the city has faced such staffing issues. (The city's swimming pools were completely closed the summers of 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.)

At press time, it remained unclear if the Beverly Hills pool would open this year or not. Houston Parks and Recreation Department officials merely said that additional swimming pools will open as more lifeguards become available.

Dobie grad receives Legion of Merit

Jonathan Carter honored for service as U.S. Coast Guard captain

Highlighting the final sea-going chapter of his Coast Guard career, Capt. Jonathan Carter was awarded the Legion of Merit on June 5 for his two years of service as skipper of the USCGC Stone.

The award was presented to Carter during a change-of-command ceremony at the cutter's home base in Charleston, S.C.

Stone had recently returned from a 108-day deployment in the Eastern Pacific during which the cutter seized 45,600 pounds of cocaine with an estimated street value of \$517 million. The seizure amount was a record for a single Coast Guard cutter on a single deployment.

Carter, a 1995 Dobie graduate, was presented with the Legion of Merit by Vice Adm. Nathan Moore, commander of the Coast Guard's Atlantic Area sector. Carter was cited for "exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services."

One of the nation's highest military honors, the Legion of Merit acknowledges exceptional contributions and dedication to the military and the nation.

Carter, who earned his commission in 2000, is currently transitioning to a new assignment at Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington. He was recently selected to serve as team leader for the implementation of Force Design 2028, a sweeping plan to dramatically enhance the role of the Coast Guard, especially in matters of na-

tional security.

During the change-of-command ceremony on June 5, Carter was formally relieved by Capt. Anne O'Connell, who became the fourth commanding officer of Stone, a 418-foot Legend class national security cutter with a crew of 120. Legend class cutters are the most technologically advanced ships in the Coast Guard.

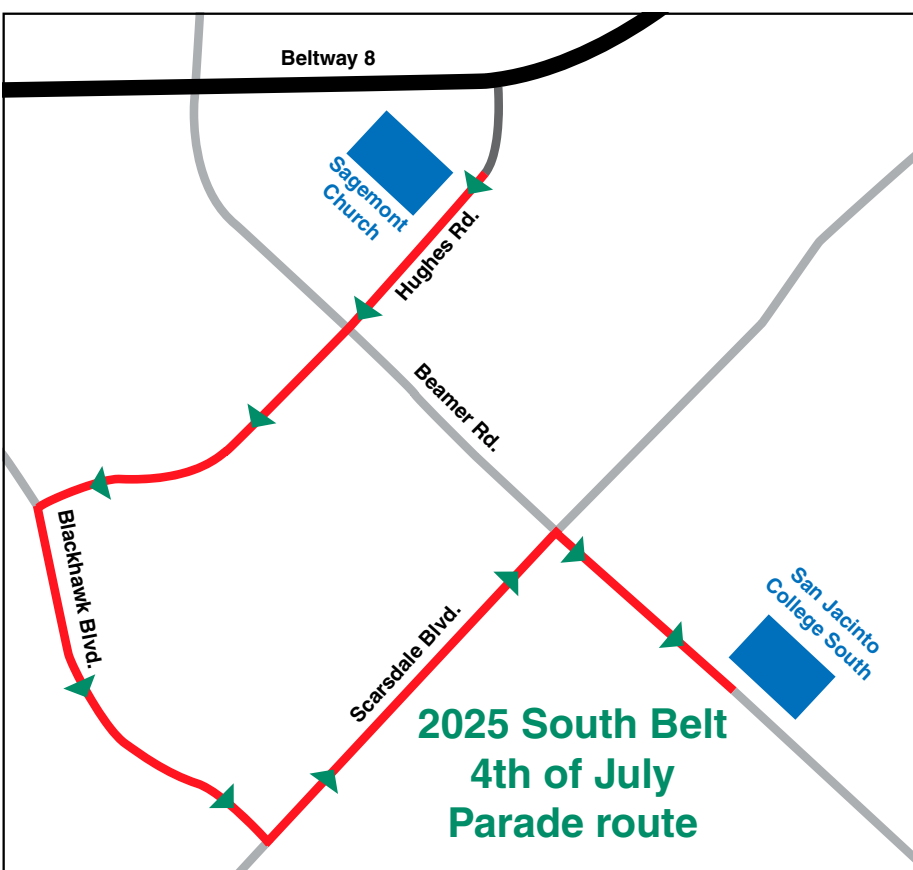
During Carter's two years of service aboard Stone, the cutter steamed more than 37,000 nautical miles, visited 12 ports across six foreign countries while overseeing numerous patrols in the Florida Straits, Caribbean Sea and Eastern Pacific. Carter was cited for supervising a variety of successful missions, including maritime homeland defense and counter-drug operations.

"Stone's patrols were truly unique," Carter said during the change of command. "Leading allied forces to safeguard U.S. sovereignty and disrupting transnational criminal networks are two missions that come to mind, for which I am extremely proud. None of it was possible without this exceptional crew. Serving alongside you has been the opportunity of a lifetime."

During the ceremony, Carter presented each of his crew a commemorative medallion.

On June 10, Stone was one of two cutters honored by the Coast Guard Foundation at its annual gala banquet in Washington. Stone and its sister ship, the USCGC James, were honored for de-

Fall high school 2025 sports prep soon begins at area schools

Time seemingly flies within the University Interscholastic League's annual extracurricular activities calendar as "fall" sport preseason practices will begin in less than a month.

July is almost always the slowest month by far in terms of the annual public school athletics calendar, but Aug. 1 will bring a fast change to all of that.

Volleyball will be served up first as the UIL will allow preseason practices to begin Fri., Aug. 1, with scrimmages then beginning Aug. 8.

The first day of the regular season is Aug. 12 for Dobie as the Longhorns will host Baytown Sterling at 6 p.m. on the main campus. Dobie will also play at Goose Creek Memorial Aug. 15.

For the first time in a very long time, the high school volleyball preseason has been extended courtesy of the UIL by a couple of days in order to allow more time for preparation leading into opening day.

In previous seasons, high school programs typically had seven practice/scrimmage days prior to the opening of the regular season. In essence, an additional two days have been added to the equation.

Preseason high school workouts for programs that participated in spring workouts such as Dobie may begin preseason workouts Aug. 11. Dobie will open the 2025 varsity

football season Aug. 29 at Clear Brook.

The UIL does not specify an official start date for team tennis or cross-country at the high school level, but both Dobie programs will begin preseason workouts later this month.

The Longhorn team tennis program has en-

joyed a terrific run of success under longtime head coach Manuel Moreno Jr., while the Dobie boys cross-country program will be looking to defend its 22-6A championship from a season ago.

Individual district champion Cruz Jasso will be joined by key returning

runners Jordan Roman, Johan Villavicencio and others in a bid to repeat the successes of a season ago.

The Dobie girls cross-country program will reload a bit within the program after 2025 senior Lauren Garza, one of the greatest runners in program history, graduated.

But longtime head coach Mo Hickman seemingly always finds a way to put together an exceptionally competitive program.

Key dates involving Dobie High School students include Aug. 13. Sophomore class students are invited to attend a back-to-school orientation

at the main campus from 9 to 10 a.m.

This will allow students who previously attended Dobie9 to familiarize themselves with the layout of the main campus.

The first day of classes for high school students within the Pasadena ISD is Aug. 14.

At the Dobie9 campus, parent night will be held Aug. 11 beginning at 6 p.m., and the first day of freshman classes on campus is Aug. 13. That first day will include a shortened schedule from 7:15 to 11:35 a.m., and the first full day of classes is Aug. 14.

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Brooks Jr. feels at home with Houston Cougar football

Jason Brooks Jr. is back on the field and feeling healthy ahead of his graduate senior year of football at the University of Houston, and the Cougars are counting on Brooks, a Dobie graduate, to make a big difference up front heading into the 2025 season.

Once a three-year starter for the Longhorns at left tackle, Brooks settled in as the starter at left guard during the spring workouts as Cougar head coach Willie Fritz and his staff have made a concerted effort to revamp both the offensive and defensive fronts with a huge second season in the Fritz era beginning Aug. 28 at home against Stephen F. Austin.

As of late spring, the Cougars had returning starters David Ndukwue at left tackle and Demetrius Hunter at center. Three transfer portal players, including Brooks at left guard, Dalton Perryman at right tackle and right guard Matthew Wykoff were working together up front.

Brooks began his collegiate career at Vanderbilt and then played portions of three seasons at Oklahoma State. Perryman is joining the Cougars after being at Texas Tech, while Wykoff formerly played for the Cal Bears.

In today's college re-

cruiting landscape, the perceived quickest way to fix a deficiency or build depth is to score players through the transfer portal.

Fritz and his staff obviously felt as though an upgrade was needed along the offensive line, and Brooks is one of those guys getting an opportunity to make a difference while playing closer to home.

"I really like the flow and the continuity and teamwork that we've been able to show to this point," Brooks said.

"A big part of it is always just being out there on the field and being able to work together.

"While five different guys are responsible for doing their job on a given play or a given series, it's equally as important to work together as a group, know your responsibility and just perform."

A Class of 2020 Dobie graduate, Brooks played the final of his three varsity seasons in 2019 under then head coach Kevin Berneathy, helping guide the Longhorns to a 9-2 overall record.

Brooks originally signed with Vanderbilt coming out of high school, but exited the Commodore program after one season.

He joined Oklahoma State University prior to the start of the 2022 season, playing in 11 total games as a sophomore.

A second-team Academic All Big 12 honoree in 2023, Brooks started the first seven games of the campaign before an injury setback.

He missed the 2024 season due to injury and announced his inclusion into the transfer portal before joining the Cougars.

Brooks earned his bachelor's degree while at Oklahoma State and plans to make his mark in real estate once he is done playing football.

The Cougars have had a handful of offensive linemen drafted into the NFL in the past several seasons. Whether he is

drafted next April or signs on as an undrafted free agent as former Longhorn standout Johnathan Baldwin did earlier this spring with the Green Bay Packers, Brooks plans to make enough of an impression in his final season with the Cougars to give himself a chance to play profession-

ally.

"For me it's all about staying healthy and being out there on the field for my team," Brooks said.

"I think I've shown in the past that I can perform at a high level on the interior of the offensive line. That's my goal this season, is to go out there and put some good tape together.

"We have something good going on here at Houston. We've had some good competition going on, are in tune with what the coach and staff is looking for us to do out there on the field, and I think it's all going to add up to a good run.

"It's my final season of college football and I'm looking forward to the opportunity to show again what I can do. It's exciting to be back home, and I'm looking forward to the opportunity to be able

to play in front of family and friends while helping the Cougars reach some of our goals."



Thompson still seeing success as big part of Mississippi College program

never shied away from simply doing whatever is necessary whether it be in the classroom as an outstanding student or as an exceptional performer in the weights.

"I'm just trying to represent my program in the best way that I know how, and to also make myself and my family proud along the way," Thompson said. "I have had incredible support both in the classroom and out here on the field with my coaching staff, and we are all working together to achieve the same goal. We finished third in conference this year as a program, which was great for us. Next season we'll try to push it further. Coming to Mississippi College was a great decision for me and I look forward to what I can achieve these last two competitive seasons."

"Coach Fitzmorris actually was on staff as an assistant at Dobie while I was playing here, so obviously it's an honor to be able to come back to a program that I love so much."

"I'm willing to do whatever I can to be of help to both the coaching staffs and the athletes as we all work together to have success as Longhorns. I certainly won't take it for granted."

While there are no current openings on the football staff, both Fitzmorris and Davis admit that the eventual goal is to find a spot on the football field for Davis as a coach.

He's thrilled to be working with Jones and the Longhorns' basketball program, and was on hand assisting with the summer group as Dobie competed

in a recent Texas Association of Basketball Coaches Showcase.

Davis has also been volunteering his time assisting with the strength and conditioning program at the school ahead of his official start with the district Aug. 1.

Davis' twin brother, Jeremy Davis, is set to begin his second season on staff at Alvin High School as the twins have now found their way within the high school coaching ranks.

Jacoby Davis, who along with his brother played youth league football with the Southbelt Dolphins as the family resided in the South Belt area, says he feels as though his professional career, while in its early stages, has come full circle.

"Just being around the athletes at Thompson intermediate, I knew that I wanted to get involved with coaching," Davis said.

"Now, being able to be a part of the staff at Dobie High School is special to me and my family. I couldn't think of any other place that I'd rather be. I'm looking forward to what I hope is a long career with the Longhorns."

"When you are growing up, you can't really dream of something like this happening. But things happen for a reason, and I've been given a great opportunity to be able to lend my skills and some of my thought processes to the student athletes today."

"I'm looking forward to getting started. Even being out there with the basketball guys during the TABC event, it was great to be able

to work together to achieve a common goal. That's all we're here to do. It's very exciting to be a Longhorn, and I look forward to coming to work every day."

Jeremy Davis, who played quarterback among his positions while at Dobie and also played varsity basketball and reached the regional round in the weights in track and field, graduated with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Lamar University and went on to earn his master's degree in business administration.

During his first school year at Alvin in 2024-2025, Davis coached the tight ends on the football field and also led the Yellowjackets' junior varsity

boys basketball program while teaching sophomore world history.

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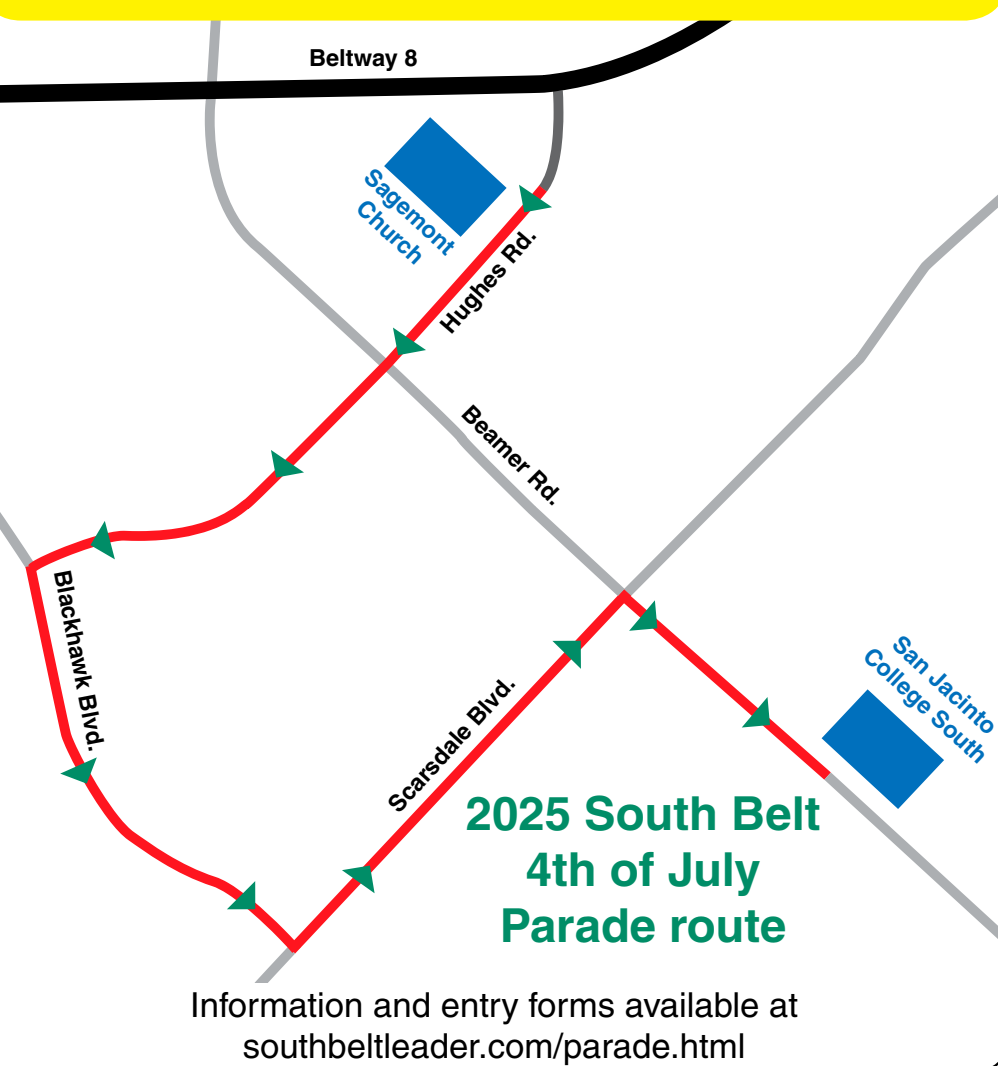

Halfway through her journey collegiately, Thompson admits she could not have asked for anything more than what she has received at Mississippi College.
