Melillo students earn statewide STEM honor

Two teams recognized in challenge to improve future space exploration

were recently recognized in a statewide STEM competition aimed at improving space explora-

Melillo's Space Explorers and Galaxy Explorers teams each earned Best in Show designations at the Texas Space Grant Consortium's Spring 2025 Build the Moon Challenge.

With NASA going back to the moon, crews will need infrastructure to support astronauts

Two teams of Melillo Middle School students during their long-duration missions. In the Build the Moon Challenge, young researchers are tasked with creating their own concrete mixtures to build and develop future lunar habitats using lunar regolith simulant.

The lunar surface is covered with a finegrained rocky material called regolith. Scientists can use this material to help build the infrastructure needed for future missions. This process is called In Situ Resource Utilization (ISRU).

Led by their coach Nicole Ram, a previous Texas Space Grant Consortium program participant, the Space Explorers and Galaxy Explorers created a landing pad, a brick wall and lunar habitat designs with their lunar simulant concrete

"They love being a part of the Artemis generation," said Ram, who serves as a math teacher at Melillo. "What competition are we going to compete in next year?" Open to students in middle school or junior

high (grades sixth through ninth), winning teams may be eligible to receive grant funding through the TSGC's Build the Moon Challenge.

Part of the University of Texas Institute for Geophysics, the Texas Space Grant Consortium is proud to support programs like Build the Moon to help engage, educate and inspire the next generation of students.

One unidentified Melillo team member told TSGC officials it was hoped the Build the Moon Challenge could serve as a launchpad to a career in the space field later in life.

"I would love to work for NASA one day," said the student. "And being exposed to NASA's projects at a young age is allowing me to gain some type of experience for my future career."

Build The Moon applications are set to open again in the fall.

County reports 1st 2025 West Nile case Officials urge residents to take precautions to avoid contraction

Harris County Public Health (HCPH) has confirmed the first West Nile virus (WNV) human case in 2025 in unincorporated Harris County

(excluding the city of Houston). An adult male in eastern Harris County tested positive for West Nile virus and has made a full recovery. 'The confirmation of the first human case of West Nile virus in our community serves as an important reminder that mosquito-borne diseases are a serious threat in our area. We must take them seriously and protect ourselves and

our loved ones," said Dr. Ericka Brown, HCPH's

director of the Community Health and Wellness

Historically, the summer months have been the peak time for WNV transmission in Harris

In 2024, there were 57 human cases of West Nile virus illness reported in unincorporated Harris County, along with three total WNV-related deaths - one in Houston, and two in the


unincorporated part of the county.

"The surveillance program conducted by the Mosquito and Vector Control Division (MVCD) is essential for detecting the presence of West Nile virus in our community and helps guide efforts to protect our community members," said Dr. Courtney Standlee, HCPH interim director of MVCD.

If infected with the virus most people experience mild illness characterized by flu-like symptoms including fever, headache, body aches, and occasionally a skin rash and swollen lymph glands. West Nile virus infection in severe cases can develop into encephalitis, inflammation of the brain, or meningitis, inflammation of the membrane surrounding the brain.

Severe infections can cause high fever, headache, stiff neck, disorientation, coma, tremors, muscle weakness, and paralysis. Symptoms usually develop three to 15 days after infection with Continued on Page 2

Beverly Hills pool remains closed

Closure due to lifeguard shortage; city offers \$500 incentive

With local students now entering their second month of summer vacation, the city of Houston has yet to open the swimming pool at Beverly Hills Park, citing a national lifeguard shortage.

The pools at the city's Sagemont and Wilson Memorial parks each opened the first week of June after weeks of delay.

This marks the third consecutive year the city has faced such staffing issues. (The city's swim-

ming pools were completely closed the summers of 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandem-

At press time, it remained unclear if the Beverly Hills pool would open this year or not. Houston Parks and Recreation Department officials merely said that additional swimming pools will open as more lifeguards become available. **Continued on Page 2**

Carter recognized by USCG

Dobie grad receives Legion of Merit

Jonathan Carter honored for service as U.S. Coast Guard captain Highlighting the final sea-going chapter of his tional security.

Coast Guard career, Capt. Jonathan Carter was awarded the Legion of Merit on June 5 for his two years of service as skipper of the USCGC

The award was presented to Carter during a change-of-command ceremony at the cutter's home base in Charleston, S.C.

Stone had recently returned from a 108-day deployment in the Eastern Pacific during which the cutter seized 45,600 pounds of cocaine with an estimated street value of \$517 million. The seizure amount was a record for a single Coast Guard cutter on a single deployment.

Carter, a 1995 Dobie graduate, was presented with the Legion of Merit by Vice Adm. Nathan Moore, commander of the Coast Guard's Atlantic Area sector. Carter was cited for "exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services.'

One of the nation's highest military honors, the Legion of Merit acknowledges exceptional contributions and dedication to the military and

Carter, who earned his commission in 2000, is currently transitioning to a new assignment at Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington. He was recently selected to serve as team leader for the implementation of Force Design 2028, a sweeping plan to dramatically enhance the role of the Coast Guard, especially in matters of na-

During the change-of-command ceremony on June 5, Carter was formally relieved by Capt. Anne O'Connell, who became the fourth commanding officer of Stone, a 418-foot Legend class national security cutter with a crew of 120. Legend class cutters are the most technologically advanced ships in the Coast Guard.

During Carter's two years of service aboard Stone, the cutter steamed more than 37,000 nautical miles, visited 12 ports across six foreign countries while overseeing numerous patrols in the Florida Straits, Caribbean Sea and Eastern Pacific. Carter was cited for supervising a variety of successful missions, including maritime homeland defense and counter-drug operations.

"Stone's patrols were truly unique," Carter said during the change of command. "Leading allied forces to safeguard U.S. sovereignty and disrupting transnational criminal networks are two missions that come to mind, for which I am extremely proud. None of it was possible without this exceptional crew. Serving alongside you

has been the opportunity of a lifetime. During the ceremony, Carter presented each of his crew a commemorative medallion.

On June 10, Stone was one of two cutters honored by the Coast Guard Foundation at its annual gala banquet in Washington. Stone and its sister ship, the USCGC James, were honored for de-

King: Texas state revenues are plateauing

My colleagues at the Baker Institute and I have been closely monitoring the trends in the revenue sources that fund our state government. After decades of robust growth, we are now seeing clear signs that many of these reve nue streams have leveled off — and in some cases, are beginning to decline.


According to the State Comptroller's Monthly State Revenue Watch, state revenues fell by 4% in FY2024 This marked the first year-over-year decline since the Great Recession in 2009. Through the first nine months of

the current fiscal year, revenues are up by just 0.17%. Moreover, the Comptroller, in his most recent revenue estimate to the Legislature, projected that revenues would remain essentially flat throughout this biennium.

You can find detailed trendlines for the various revenue sources in our report on the Baker Institute website. One aspect I suspect will surprise many of you is just how dependent the state has become on federal funds. These inflows spiked during the pandemic but are now receding.

I am afraid that the halcyon days of large State budget surpluses may be a thing of the past.

Elected officials share their words

Bettencourt delivers "eight pack" Sabina Fuentes of property tax reform package

Texans asked for property tax relief, and Sen. Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) has successfully delivered through the authorship and Senate Sponsorship of eight bold property tax rate reform measures passed during the 89th Legislative session. The comprehensive, bipartisan reforms are designed to reduce tax burdens by increasing fiscal transparency and accountability among local governments. They improve public access to tax rate data, require clearer ballot language for tax elections, and modernize the property tax appraisal and protest process. The legislation also includes targeted relief for disaster victims, seniors, and disabled homeowners, as well as measures to limit excessive debt service taxation. All of which have gone into law, adding to SB 4, SB 23, and HB 9 property tax exemptions that will be voted on the public this November 2025 election. These reforms will have a measur-

able impact on millions of Texas property taxpayers," said Bettencourt. "As I always say, what gets measured gets fixed! We are demanding correcting inequities, and ensuring local governments are transparent about what's really happening on tax

One of the most immediately noticeable changes is how voters see bond and tax rate elections on the ballot. Under SB 1025, effective immediately, all ballots for bond or tax rate increases will now display "THIS IS A TAX INCREASE" prominently at the top, eliminating voter confusing language and giving taxpayers a clearer understanding of the impact. Meanwhile, SB 1023. effective 1/1/26. will require taxing entities to publish their truth-in-taxworksheets with live links and full breakdowns of rate calculations, bringing real-time transparency to every local bud-

"We're making the system more responsive, more accountable, and most importantly, fairer for hardworking Texans," Bettencourt adds.

In times of disaster, taxpayers deserve relief, not automatic tax spikes.

Thanks to HB 30 (Rep. Troxclair), taxing entities will now only be allowed to raise rates based on actual, unreimbursed disaster costs, eliminating the current 8% across-the-board hike. And under HB 1392 (Bucy), Texans won't be penalized with fees or interest when tax offices are closed unexpectedly, a common-sense fix that protects good-faith taxpayers. Other reforms strengthen protections for vulnerable Texans. SB 2520 ensures that seniors and disabled homeowners receive the lowest possible frozen tax rate using a two- year lookback, while SJR 84, if approved by voters in November, would adjust a home's taxable value proportionally if the property is destroyed by fire, a lifeline for homeowners during devastating losses, which included SB 467 (Sen. Paxton).

To ensure long-term taxpayer savings. SB 1453 requires local taxing entities to set debt service rates at the minimum needed to repay bonds, with a supermajority and public notice reguired to go higher. This change promotes budget discipline while preserving public trust. Finally, HB 1533 (Rep. Chen) delivers long-overdue reforms to the appraisal and protest process, streamlining notices and procedures to make the system more accessible and responsive for the average taxpayer.

"This 'eight pack' of bills are smart,

taxpayer-focused changes that restore public confidence in the property tax system," Bettencourt adds. "From transparency on the ballot to fairness in the appraisal process, we are delivering solutions that matter." The new reforms simplifies how taxes are presented, calculated, and administered, especially for homeowners, seniors, and disaster victims, while holding taxing entities more accountable to the public they serve. "I want to thank House bill authors Troxclair, Bucy, Chen, Meyers for their support in passing these needed property tax reforms" Bettencourt ended.



In June 2023, coalition of local groups - led by Garcia's office and the nonprofit Hope Haven - conducted a massive sweep along the Gulf Freeway to provide housing to homeless in the area, as well as to clean up debris associated with such encampments.

The sites were scouted in advance by Precinct 2 Sgt. Ray Perez and Jonathan Spears, who serves as a housing navigator for the nonprofit organization Hope Haven. The pair combed the area five days a week for six months, reaching out to those in the area suffering from homelessness. After identifying problem areas and making contact with affected individuals, other agencies were brought in to assist, with the ultimate goal being to provide housing to drug use. the individuals.
